So often in our data-driven educational worlds, the business of people is pushed aside. Educators are not always given the opportunity to express themselves fully in the classroom, as they have so many technical and achievement-based responsibilities to manage. Lindsey's core belief system is founded on the principle that education is a people-driven business that should focus on the product, on the human capital, much more than we currently do. This presentation will give educators at all levels insight into both her story of learning to be vulnerable in the classroom, and practical ways they, too, can exhibit vulnerability in their own buildings in order to foster the relationships with students that are necessary in order for students to feel the connections they need to feel so they never even consider committing an act of school violence.

Lindsey has been in education for fifteen years, the most recent seven, spent teaching high school English at Brownsburg High School. She currently holds a Bachelor's Degree in Secondary Education from Indiana University, and a Masters Degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Indiana Wesleyan University. She is the author of the 2020 book *Throwing Rocks*, a story about teacher trauma, and am a professional writer, editor, and speaker. Lindsey is currently under contract for her second book, which should be released sometime in 2022. She grew up in central Indiana, where she still currently resides with her husband, Jon, and her two sons, Jackson (12) and Andrew (5). When she is not teaching, writing, or speaking, she enjoys time with her boys, working out at OrangeTheory, reading, and some occasional crafting.
