RE: Gary's 2011 Petition for Exemptions from State ImposedProperty Tax Caps

DATE: March 7, 2011

To Whom It May Concern:

In 2009 and again in 2010, the Distressed Unit Appeals Board, ofwhich you are an appointed member, has favorably decided with the Cityof Gary, Indiana, in its request to be exempted from tax capprotection granted to every other resident and property tax payer inthe State of Indiana. The result has been to tax the residents of Gary, Indiana fifty-percent (50 %) more in property taxes.

We have had two years to evaluate the social and economicimplications of this tax cap exemption and the results have beendevastating to the city.

The recent population count of the Bureau of the Census from the 2010census, reported that the City of Gary, Indiana experienced a 22percent drop in population.

In 2000, Gary had 102,746 residents but by the year 2010, that numberhad dropped to 80,294.

Early migration data from the 2010 Census Bureau, suggests that people of both racial groups moved out of the city of Gary to contribute to the 22 percent population decline reported last month by the 2010 census count.

This week the Census Bureau released township information basedon race and housing. That report shows that in Calumet Township,which consists of the city of Gary, Griffith and other outlying areas,White population declined by –6,530 or 19.9 percent while Blackpopulation in Gary declined by -16,874 or 18.9 percent.

In 2010, I presented the DUAB with a 1956 study conducted by Charles Tiebout showing the relationship of high property taxes toout-migration.

Tiebout proposed the idea that consumers actually shop aroundand compare their cost for public services before making a decision asto where they might reside. Property taxes become a consideration forpeople in deciding where they are going to live and what services theyreceive in exchange for their property tax dollars

The "Tiebout Hypothesis†was later tested by Dr. WallaceOats who found that in communities that have a higher tax rate thantheir neighbors, they will see a decline in property values as peopledecide to move and live elsewhere, reducing the demand for housing inthat community.

As a result of the DUAB vote in 2009 and again in 2010, Garycontinues to have a property tax rate 50 percent higher than any othercity in Indiana. We knew that people would be moving out of Gary ifDUAB ignored the pleas of the Gary taxpayers, and our observations and predictions were correct.

I would like to suggest that the DUAB NOT APPROVE an exemption for the city of Gary from state imposed property tax caps.

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By granting the City of Gary yet another year of exemption fromtax caps and creating a disparity in property tax levels between Garyand adjoining cities, DUAB runs the risk of creating a downward spiralin property values and continued outmigration from which the City of Gary may never recover.

According to the Bureau of the Census, the impact of thisout-migration of 22,452 Gary residents has resulted in:

Children under 18 8,766 -23.6 %

The decision to exempt the City of Gary from equitable propertytax caps has been devastating on the City of Gary. It has left thecity more destitute as the people who could afford to leave, havemoved, leaving behind more people on entitlement programs with ahigher concentration of poverty, unemployment and a higher need forsocial services and government programs.

The strategy to save Gary by taxing Gary residents more through taxcap exemptions has back-fired.

The DUAB needs to accept responsibility for their actions as acontributing factor to increasing the social problems for the City of Gary.

I would respectfully petition you, as a member of the DistressedUnit Appeals Board, not to extend nor increase our demographic andeconomic crisis. Senate Bill 105 will become law as soon as theGovernor signs it. It sets up a process by which the City of Gary cancorrect its financial problems in ways that the previous decisionscannot.

Please deny the City of Gary an extension for exemptions forproperty tax caps for 2011. The damage has been devastating to ourcity, our community, and to the welfare of our residents.
