Caseload

38,314 families and 66,054 children were authorized for this period.
115 of the above families and 224 of the children had TANF priority.
0 of the above families and 0 of the children had an AJS TANF-Impact referral.
39 of the above families and 90 of the children had a non-AJS TANF-Impact (Working Families) referral.
2 of the above families and 6 of the children had a SNAP (Working Families) referral.
5,382 of the above families and 5,505 of the children participated in the On My Way Pre-K program.
0 of the above families and 0 of the children had vouchers with CCDF Contract Centers.
5,162 of the above families and 7,878 of the children either had Homeless priority or identified as such.*
1,391 of the above families and 2,623 of the children had one or more disabled children in the household.*
0 of the above families and 0 of the children were in a household with family members in the military.*
1 of the above families and 1 of the children were part of a household with over \$1,000,000 in assets.*
4,543 families and 7,600 children were on wait lists at the end of the period.

Children

61.6 % of children were served in licensed care.
0.7 % were cared for by relatives.
Infants (under 1 year of age) constitute 4.8 % of all children served.
Toddlers (ages 1 to 2 years) constitute 22.3 % of all children served.
Children ages 3 to 5 years constitute 38.0 % of all children served.
Kindergarten-age children (age 5 years) constitute 0.3 % of all children served.
School-age children (ages 6+ years) constitute 36.3 % of all children served.
0.5 % of children had part-time vouchers.
5.1 % of children had vouchers for shift 2 care.
Children of Hispanic or Latino Ethnicity accounted for 9.9 % of all children served.

An average of 15.7 weekly hours were authorized for school-age children.
There were 1 new TANF-Impact referral children (1 families) added this period.
There were 0 new SNAP-Impact referral children (0 families) added this period.

Families

93.6 % of families received subsidies because of employment.
28.4 % of families had copayments, at an average of 8.9 % of income.
37.9 % of families had overages, at an average of 17.4 % of income.
The average family size was 3.6 and the average number of children served per family was 1.7.
87.9 % of families were headed by a single parent.
0.3 % of families were marked as TANF recipients and 1.4 % listed TANF as a source of income.
0.0 % of families were marked as SNAP referral recipients and 39.5 % listed SNAP as a source of income.
61.8 % of families were below the poverty level. 7.7 % of families were above 150 % of the poverty level.

Expenditures

The average cost of care for a month per child during this period was \$958 (subsidy + copay + overage).
Parents paid 12.7 % of the cost (4.4 % in copayments and 8.3 % in overages) and the program paid 87.3 %.
Average monthly expenditures for children under 1 year of age were \$1,342.
Average monthly expenditures for school-age children (ages 6+ years) were \$689.
76.5 % of total expenditures were for children under 6 years of age.

County Stats

Marion County accounted for the largest porportion of families served with 33.6 % of the caseloads.
The highest average cost of care was in Newton County at \$1,277 per child.
The lowest average cost of care was in Crawford County at \$442 per child.
Switzerland County had the greatest proportion of children served in licensed care at 99.2 %.
Steuben County had the greatest proportion of children served in LLEP care at 55.9 %.
Owen County ranks first in relative care statewide with 4.8 % of all children cared for by relatives.
Decatur County and others had the highest % of families with a service need of employment at 100.0 %.
Union County had the greatest proportion of TANF recipients, where 20.0 % of families receiving child care subsidies also received TANF income.
Martin County had the greatest proportion of SNAP recipients, where 76.9 % of families receiving child care subsidies also received SNAP/Food Stamps income.
