Physical education activities

To play is to learn

Physical educationis not only a fun time for the kids, it is also a learning experience, even if they do not realize it. Play teaches teamwork, critical thinking skills, listening skills, curiosity, creativity, cooperation and understanding. A few of the activities that have taken place so far this year are the American gladiators, sandwich tag, and slip-and-slide kickball. Sounds like fun, doesn't it? And I'm sure the kids learned a thing or two.



Sandwich tag consists of teams of two, who take spots on the gym floor. All but one of the teams lays on their stomachs next to their partner. In the pair left standing up, the two split, with one being the tagger and the other being the one being tagged. So, the person being tagged can attach themselves to any team

laying on the floor by laying on the floor next to them causing the farthest person on that team to have to get up and becomes the person getting tagged therefore that person can lay down to another team and the game just keeps going. If a player gets tagged, they switch roles.

Slip-n-slide kickball follows the same rules as kickball, but the bases are small kiddie pools with bubbles in them. There are tarps with water and bubbles leading up to the pools the kids slide on into the pools. The kids not only play a game of kickball, they also get wet and bubbly! This is a real crowd-pleaser.





American gladiators is a lot like dodgeball, with a twist. There are two teams: one side has one player that has two pins they need to protect, while they are also trying to hit the players on the other side, which has the rest of the players on it, with a dodgeball. The object of the game is for the one player team to throw the ball and get the other team's players out while protecting their pins from being knocked down.

The other team's objective is to knock down the pins with their ball. If a player from the second team gets hit by a ball, they are out. The game is over when either both pins are knocked down or all the players on the second team are out.

EPCC children enjoy a variety of activities during the summer months. Once regular school is out, the summer school curriculum includes themed weeks which incorporate academics, visits from related community resources and fun activities.

The purpose of the summer remediation program is to help each child maintain the academic gains made during the previous school year until the fall session begins. Summer school is half-day, so the rest of the day is spent in regular therapy programs and summer fun such as outings, picnics and outdoor play.

COVID update

Our latest news

The COVID-19 vaccine is now mandatory for ISPHN employees. All staff have been fully vaccinated or submitted an exemption form by May 15, 2022. All fully vaccinated EPCC employees are not required to wear a mask when working in small groups where six-foot distancing can be maintained. Masks are optional when working alone in offices or in meetings where outside members are not present and social distancing can be practiced. Staff are still required to wear masks in patient areas. Children are now allowed to go on therapeutic leaves and limitations on family members for on-grounds visits have been relaxed. We are still seeing a few scattered positive COVID cases among staff. Vaccine boosters are optional for staff currently.
