

Readoption Review

Plan Review, Construction Permits, and Fees for Services 410 IAC 6-12

IC 4-22-2.5-3.1(c) requires an agency to conduct a review to consider whether there are alternative methods of achieving the purpose of the rule that are less costly or less intrusive, or that would minimize the economic impact of the proposed rule on small businesses.

Description of Rule:

The Executive Board may adopt reasonable rules on behalf of the Indiana Department of Health (IDOH) to protect or to improve the public health in Indiana. This particular rule requires a person to have a valid construction permit before they construct, install or modify any agricultural labor camps; child caring institutions, day nurseries and children's group homes; mobile home parks; recreational vehicle campgrounds; schools and youth camps.

Readoption Analysis:

1) Is there a continued need for this rule? Please explain.

Yes, there is a continued need to monitor the construction, installation, or modification of agricultural labor camps; child caring institutions, day nurseries and children's group homes; mobile home parks; recreational vehicle campgrounds; schools and youth camps in order to protect the public health in Indiana.

2) What is the nature of any complaints or comments received from the public, including small business, concerning the rule or the implementation of the rule by the agency?

Since the effective date of the rule, there has been no complaints or comments received from the public or small businesses concerning this rule or the implementation of this rule by the IDOH.

3) Examine the complexity of the rule, including difficulties encountered by the agency in administering the rule and small businesses in complying with the rule.

No complaints or comments have been received from small businesses about this rule or the implementation of it and the IDOH is not aware of any difficulties in administration of or compliance with this rule. It is difficult to see how the rule could be made easier to understand or implement.

4) To what extent does the rule overlap, duplicate, or conflict with other federal, state, or local laws, rules, regulations, or ordinances?

This rule does not overlap, duplicate, or conflict with any other federal, state, or local laws, rules, regulations, or ordinances.

5) When was the last time the rule was reviewed under this section or otherwise evaluated by the agency, and the degree to which technology, economic conditions, or other factors have changed in the area affected by this rule since that time?

The rule was reviewed by the IDOH and open to public comment prior to its readoption in 2016 and there have not been any significant changes with technology, economic or other factors in the area affected by this rule.
