Drug Overdose Trends from 2022

Early findings suggest that 2022 may have marked a turning point in the United States' opioid epidemic. Data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) demonstrate that drug overdose deaths peaked in March 2022, mostly due to fentanyl. The CDC announced in late 2022 that the average life expectancy in the United States dropped to its lowest point in two decades, in part because of drug overdoses and the increasing danger of street drugs.

Despite the grim statistics, 2022 was a pivotal year for policy change. Policymakers sought to address stigma and how to limit barriers to healthcare for individuals with substance use disorder. Naloxone, the life-saving opioid reversal drug, is now readily available over the counter at pharmacies, no prescription necessary. In 2022, corporations agreed to pay for the opioid crisis. AmerisourceBergen, Cardinal Health, CVS, Johnson & Johnson, and Walmart, all reached settlements that will go back to states and counties. Funds will support harm reduction efforts, prevention programs, and treatment.

Indiana Pregnancy Promise Program Annual Report

The Indiana Pregnancy Promise Program is a free, voluntary program for pregnant Medicaid members who use opioids or have used opioids in the past. This program is critical for Indiana residents because opioid use during pregnancy is increasing in Indiana, and treatment of opioid use disorder during pregnancy is highly effective.

In its annual report, the Indiana Pregnancy Promise Program presents important statistics about enrollment and service utilization. 64% of program participants enrolled

during the prenatal period, and 158 partner organizations were engaged in the program. About 78% of participants received OUD treatment services, and 72% received medication for OUD. To view the full report, CLICK THIS LINK.

Building Bridges Between Harm Reduction and Treatment for People with SUD

In recent years, there has been growing support for a harm reduction approach to drug policy, which emphasizes reducing some of the negative consequences associated with drug use through a variety of public health measures. Historically, this approach has been a core value of syringe service programs, expanding into other settings particularly as rising overdose deaths have made educating people about overdose risks and distributing naloxone more urgent.

This two-part workshop will explore how harm reduction is evolving, different interpretations of what harm reduction is (or isn't), and ways to build bridges between harm reduction services and the continuum of care for people who use drugs. Discussion topics will include how harm reduction providers are offering or connecting participants to various types of treatment, broadly defined, and how treatment providers are incorporating harm reduction strategies into their services.


