Indiana Providers Promoting Harm Reduction Strategies

So far this year, fourteen Vanderburgh County residents have died from fentanyl overdoses. Steve Lockyear, Vanderburgh County coroner, notes that fentanyl-related deaths have soared in the past twenty years. "Twenty years ago, when I was at the sheriff's office, we were not seeing any fentanyl deaths. We were looking at 20 overdose deaths a year. Last year, we were at 106 deaths".

In response to increasing fentanyl-related overdoses, Indiana counties are employing more harm reduction strategies. In Vanderburgh County, harm reduction methods are a combination of efforts from grassroots organizations and treatment providers. The Evansville Recovery Alliance, a local nonprofit organization, distributes fentanyl-testing strips and Narcan at no cost. CleanSlate Centers, a medication-assisted treatment provider, also serves the Evansville area. There are still significant barriers to medication-assisted treatment with many patients facing stigma and skeptics deeming the treatment "a drug for a drug". James Evans, area manager for CleanSlate Centers, debunks this misconception: "We're not enabling this. What we're doing is preventing withdrawals". Many experts at the forefront of the substance use and overdose crisis expect harm reduction approaches such as the ones in Vanderburgh County to be implemented more throughout Indiana. Indiana University Researchers Exploring new Substance Use Disorder Therapy Technology

Researchers from Indiana University received funding from the National Institute of Health to develop a new therapy for individuals with substance use disorders. The treatment involves a virtual reality with a "future self" avatar. IU School of Medicine Assistant Professor of Psychiatry Brandon Oberlin says, "this experience enables people in recovery to have a personalized virtual experience, in alternate futures resulting from the choices they made". A pilot study found that participants had a



positive experience with the virtual reality technology. Oberlin hopes that the technology will specifically target individuals in early recovery, because those in earlier stages of treatment typically face higher risk of relapse. He also wants to distinguish this technology not as a cure of substance use disorder, but rather a supplemental tool for psychotherapists. The technology will continue to be developed and tested by IU-affiliated startup Relate XR LLC and Indianapolis-based reality startup Half Full Nelson.

November 19, 9:30 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. EST


