Pharmacists and the Road to Recovery

A recent study from the New England Journal of Medicine discovered that pharmacists may play a vital role in facilitating patients' paths to recovery from opioid use disorder (OUD). The pilot study details the experience of 100 patients who visited a specially-trained pharmacist to receive buprenorphine medicine. Once stabilized on the medicine, patients were divided into two groups. The first group continued to receive care in the pharmacy, and the second group received care in a physician's office. Interestingly, the first group showed drastically higher rates of treatment retention at 89%.

These results may be indicative of pharmacies' roles in recovery. "Opioid use disorder is too often a lethal disease, and it kills by stigma and isolation. Widespread, equitable access to effective treatment is the answer. Our study showed that the pharmacy treatment model increases access, which benefits a diverse patient population and increases equity", said Dr. Josiah D. Rich, a professor of medicine at Brown University.

Innovative Approaches to Stigma Reduction Trainings

Sally Wasmuth, a professor of occupational therapy at Indiana IUPUI, has researched stigma within medical settings, primarily stigma towards individuals who use substances. Over the years, she has collected stories of those who have faced stigma for using substances. In partnership with Summit Performance Indianapolis, a theater company, she turns those stories into monologues. Professional actors act out the monologues, which are then recorded, and then the videos are showed to medical professionals.

The monologues are designed to showcase the diversity of people who struggle with substance use and the unique experiences they have. "We think that using narratives and using things like theater and film can help people receive the information or empathize with the stories because their guard is down", Wasmuth said. The results are preliminary but promising; most health care workers report having less negative attitudes towards people who use substances after viewing the videos. As the opioid crisis continues across the country, it is important to take innovative approaches to implicit bias training, as medical professionals treat people with substance use disorder in a variety of settings.


