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CHAIRMAN BORST: We will call the meeting of 1 the Indiana Horse Racing Commission July 14, 2025, 2 to order. First of all, thank you Hoosier Park for 3 all of this. Again, we feel like we're on stage. 4 5 But we can't dance. We can't sing. So you're going to have to put up with this for the meeting. 6 We have three members. I don't know. 7 Commissioner Estes, are you on the phone? 8 9 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Yes, I am. 10 CHAIRMAN BORST: Good. So we've got three 11 Commissioners here and two Commissioners on the 12 phone. So we're going to have to do the roll call 13 vote. 14 First item on the agenda is approval of memorandum from March 7, 2025, meeting and the 15 16 executive session memorandum. We need a motion and 17 second. 18 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: So moved. 19 COMMISSIONER MCCUAIG: Second. 20 CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you, Becca. Been moved 21 and second. All those in favor say "aye". No, no, 2.2 no, roll call. I caught myself. 23 MR. PENNYCUFF: Roll call, please. Chairman

2 CHAIRMAN BORST: And that was from last year, 3 right?

MR. EGGIMAN: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN BORST: The HIWU? But there haven't been any for this year. That's interesting.

MR. EGGIMAN: Nothing settled, no.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Oh, settled.

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: I have a followup question. Where do those monies flow to?

MR. EGGIMAN: Those fines, any fine goes back to HISA and HIWU as part of their budget.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. Next on the -- if no other further questions, we don't have to vote on those.

Next is the 2025 Community Giving Report presentation from Harrah's Hoosier Park and Horseshoe Indianapolis. Joe, are you handling that or is -- we've got to get you on there. You can have one of these if you like. Your wing man's coming here.

JEREMY MEDLEY: Hello, everyone. I'm Jeremy
Medley, director of marketing here at Harrah's
Hoosier Park. I know I told you, I've talked about
this before, but for anyone who doesn't know, kind

of a quick recap, as of August, I will have been with Harrah's Hoosier Park for 14 years. Started out as a part-time guest services representative.

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I was born and raised right here in Anderson.

I've lived here my entire life. So because of that, I'm obviously familiar with many of the challenges we are facing in this community, Madison County and Anderson in particular.

So let's take a look at the impact our property has made in 2025. So at this point in the year we have contributed 289,000 to community initiatives. And of that, 207,000 or 207,000 went directly to organizations in Anderson and Madison County.

Some of our key focuses this year have been housing, support for survivors of domestic violence, (inaudible) security, human trafficking, prevention, recovery and more. We've donated \$15,000 to CASA; \$7,500 to Habitat for Humanity of Anderson. We also gave \$7,500 to the Indiana Coalition for Domestic Violence, \$10,000 to the Willow's Place Women's Shelter, \$7,500 to Outfitters for their clothing assistance programs, and \$5,000 to the Gathering of Queens for their food pantry. That's just a portion of the

organizations we've supported in those areas this year. All very good organizations doing a lot of good work for our local community.

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We know there are a lot of families in our community who desperately need assistance in the coming and meeting the expectations or the standards that they desire for themselves. And it's essential they have the access to the resources they need to thrive.

So this is something I touched upon last year. Something that remains a major area of focus for us. That includes, you know, education and employment opportunities, career development programs, especially these things for our local youth, very important. We've donated \$15,000 to the Madison County Community Foundation to help fund their scholarship programs. We've contributed \$10,000 to the Hopewell Center, \$10,000 to the Leadership Academy of Madison County, \$7,000 to the Combat Ministries Youth Program, and \$5,000 to the Ivy Tech Foundation.

Going in hand with that, you know, working to improve the quality of life for the people of Madison County, health and wellness has been a major focus for us and continues to be so. We have

1 | currently invested over \$30,000 in programs

2 | supporting both physical and mental health needs.

3 On top of that, we've dedicated an additional

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\$10,000 in senior care supporting organizations

5 | like Community LTC, Community Long Term Care, and

Lifestream. I think that is an area that -- I

7 | think I spoke a little bit about this last year.

8 | It kind of tends to get overlooked, our older

generations. It's a group that often falls through

the cracks and needs assistance. And we've been

very proud to help, to help support that.

Our commitment does go beyond donations though. We're proud to host and to participate in events that drive real change. This month we'll once again be hosting our Empire of Hope fundraiser for the Standardbred Transition Alliance.

We've also hosted multiple Red Cross blood drives. I believe we have one coming up within the next month or so here actually and diaper drive, Friends for Paws animal shelter drive basically collecting equipment, collecting items for a number of the local animal shelters. And we are currently preparing for a canned food drive.

Earlier this year we assembled 200 Easter baskets for families in need. That was something

we coordinated with the Anderson Police Department
to dispatch with. We are currently gearing up for
a back-to-school drive to provide essential
supplies for local students.

In the area of equine giving, beyond Empire of Hope, we will be supporting the Harness Horse Youth Foundation this year, Agape's equine therapy program, the Sweet Liberty Rescue Ranch. All of these organizations are doing incredible work creating that special bond between horses and people in meaningful ways. Very proud of that work there.

I hope this gives you a clear picture of where we are with our ongoing commitment to our community, our gratitude for the partnerships we've built with so many of our local organizations.

We're very proud to be a part of Anderson and Madison County. And we continue to look forward to continuing that work through the rest of this year and beyond. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thanks Jeremy. Question: Do you think you could send that list? It didn't make our booklet. We just got the big numbers is all. For some reason, we didn't get the individual. If you could send that to the office, and they could

1 | send that to us.

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JEREMY MEDLEY: We could absolutely do that,
yes.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thanks because you have a lot of good stuff there. I can't remember it all.

JEREMY MEDLEY: We sure could.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any other questions for Jeremy for Hoosier?

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: The blue boxes indicate, the blue boxes indicate what you project for the last six months of this year?

JEREMY MEDLEY: For our equine spend, yes, that will be projecting the upcoming Harness Horse Youth Foundation donations, the Standardbred Transition Alliance I believe is part of that projection, the Sweet Liberty Ranch, Agape and New Vocations are included in that.

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: But will there be additional community contributions?

JEREMY MEDLEY: Oh, absolutely, absolutely, yes. We got some of those earmarked. We found that, you know, once you get into the fall and winter quarters, you will have more emergent crises that come up. So we don't want to earmark the totality of everything, but, yes, we are absolutely

committed to fulfilling our commitment to the 1 community absolutely. 2. 3 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: How does this level of 4 commitment this year compare to last year? 5 JEREMY MEDLEY: At this point in time, I think we're -- I don't have the exact numbers for year 6 over year at this time as far as, like, July goes, 7 but I would say it's about the same, if not a 8 9 little more for this time of year. I do not know 10 that though for year over year. 11 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Will there be a review 12 of all this at the end of this year. 13 JEREMY MEDLEY: Absolutely, absolutely, yes. 14 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: Jeremy, do you 15 know off the top of your head what your annual 16 target giving number is for Hoosier? 17 JEREMY MEDLEY: Yes. Yes, our annual giving 18 number is \$430,000. 19 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: So that's the 20 target that you hope to hit by the time December rolls around? 21 2.2 JEREMY MEDLEY: Oh, we will absolutely hit

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that, yes.

Anybody on the phone questions? Thank you.

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JEREMY MEDLEY: No problem. I think I should probably hand this mic back.

CHAIRMAN BORST: There you go. We've got more mics coming. Give one to Joe. There we go. Okay, Joe, you must be going to do Horseshoe.

JOE MORRIS: Horseshoe. Yeah. Good morning, Joe Morris with Caesars Racing. With it being a race day at Horseshoe, I had to leave a few people behind to make sure we got open there today. So happy to get this update here today.

Our target number at Horseshoe is 525,000 a year. And we've exceeded that every year since the new Caesars has come in. Year to date we have given 332,000. Of the 332, 92 percent of that has been either to equine, Shelbyville, or Shelby County charitable organizations, and there's been over 50 checks handed out to date.

On the equine side we're at 37,000. Shelby County is 216. Shelbyville is 52,000. I've got the top five organizations that we've given to: 55,000 went to the Shelby County United Fund for You; 46,400 went to Shelby County Boys and Girls Club; 26,000 to the Shelby County Police Canine; 20,000 to Arc of Shelby County; 20,000 to Dinner

Before Bedtime. So those are the highlights on that.

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And as I said our target, our, the number we're supposed to hit or go over is 525,000. And we will exceed that, again, for this is the sixth season of new Caesars. So happy to be a part of the whole thing, just, you know, great to be part of that community down in that area.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions? This was a good graph you did here.

JOE MORRIS: I apologize for the lack of the list. We certainly have them. I sent that stuff to David and didn't put it in. So that's on me. I'll make sure I send the list so you can see each and every donation.

CHAIRMAN BORST: I think we'll let you off on this one. We'll give you, we'll give you a bye.

JOE MORRIS: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Thanks. Any other questions on Horseshoe?

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Ouestion?

COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: I'd just like to say that I think the community commitments in both these communities is so important and should be

sustained and looked at ways to even expand possibly but at least it's much appreciated. 2 3 it's very much a part of the overall big picture of

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4 what you all bring in both communities. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. Well, don't need a vote on that so we'll move onto the next one is the seasonal race meet updates from the racetracks. Ι quess Hoosier is up here first.

GABE PREWITT: Morning, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners. Gabe Prewitt, racing general manager here at Hoosier Park. I think we have a good update. From my perspective, we've completed 69 of our race days. Started off in a little bit of a turbulent environment. Handle in the US first couple of months of the year was down 20 percent harness racing.

So we opened up mid March. A little bit of a horse shortage to start off, a crisis mode. We had several cards where average field size is six and a half, seven. We fought our way through that. first couple of months, it seemed like every time we would stabilize, we'd add another day of the week so we would stretch ourselves that much more. So battled through that.

The last nine weeks we've been up double

1 digits in handle each week so that's good. Overall

2 | for the meet we're up 19 percent. One of only, the

3 only track that I know that's up on the harness

4 | side this year.

think so far so good.

So handle is right at almost 59 million so far through 69 days. Last year through the first 69, it was a little less than 50 million. We've had \$12 million handles. I think the record here is 14. So that's been a good start. And, yeah, so I

CHAIRMAN BORST: Good. Any questions, Commission members?

GABE PREWITT: The only other update I'd like to add is we have moved post time forward a little bit. It was 6:15. We're up to 5:30 now. One of the things by placing our races to try an increase the handle, we found we were getting a little late at night. So for the benefit of everyone, our horsemen, our horse players, staff, we decided to move post time to 5:30 so up 45 minutes to hopefully get everybody out a little sooner.

CHAIRMAN BORST: So is that, you say you have done that?

GABE PREWITT: We start tomorrow.

CHAIRMAN BORST: You start tomorrow.

GABE PREWITT: Start tomorrow, just a little time.

CHAIRMAN BORST: It will be interesting to see.

I think earlier in the year we missed a lot of fertile territory. Earlier in the year we have a lot of Thoroughbred tracks now. Delmar, Saratoga are going a little late some days. So we'll be into that market a little bit more than I would like, but I think in the long run, it will be a good thing. I think it's exchange. We found the last couple of races at night were a couple of our worst bet races. So I think by moving it up at night overall will be a good change.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Well, you're 9 million ahead so far at this point.

GABE PREWITT: We have a little room to work with.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Go a little bit more even.

GABE PREWITT: Exactly.

22 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any other questions for Gabe?
23 I quess not. Thanks.

GABE PREWITT: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Go to Horseshoe. Eric

escaped. He got to come to the meeting.

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ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah, it's a direct order from my boss over there.

So, anyway, a great update from Gabe there. I have good news on our end too. Right now as we sit here today, our handle is up a little over five percent. And I can tell you we're feeling really good about that because we had just a really rough spring. You know how important turf racing is to us. Coming into Indiana Derby Day we were down so many turf races that I think the number was 88 in 2024 at the time, and we were somewhere around 49 this year. So we had a really rough stretch. We lost our whole week of Caesars stakes week and all that.

So to be up in handle right now is really a great story especially because the Thoroughbred industry right now is trailing about five percent overall in this year. So we're sitting in a really good spot. As soon as the weather turned, we really turned it on.

I'm not sure if anybody got to be with us last week. I know a lot of you did for the Indiana Derby, just a fabulous day, record handle of 9.1 million. That beat the 2024 record of 8.1

million. Just for frame of reference, the 2019 that number was 4.1 million. So we're up about 125 percent over the last five, six years.

It wasn't just the total handle. I think everybody got to see, it was just a great day on track, not just the size of the crowd, but our on-track handle was up, our live racing was up 13 percent. We were up 48 percent in our simulcasting. A lot of that had to do with a really large handicapping contest where people come in from out of town, and they just by nature bet quite a bit more. So a lot of good things going there.

This Saturday we've got a really big day coming up, about \$750,000 in purses on our Quarter Horse day. We've got four stakes finals. First race post time is 10:45. You know, Quarter Horse racing here has really grown and has improved to a point where it's competitive with just about anywhere in the county. But, anyway, Saturday four stakes, when you start giving away almost a million dollars in purses in one day, it's quite something to note.

The only thing I would like to mention is, and I'm not sure if everybody saw it. If you haven't,

you can go to Bloodhorse.com and just search

Horseshoe Indianapolis. If you have seen it, I'll

at least repeat for those who haven't. But there's

a really, really, nice story that came out. In

fact, on Indiana Derby Day a reporter for the

Bloodhorse came out and interviewed myself and Tony

Martinez, our track superintendent.

And the main part of the story was our 2024 track safety record. And if you haven't, were not aware the Jockey Club used the same metrics over the whole industry on the Thoroughbred side for measuring track safety. And I'm proud to say we're the number one racetrack in the country as far as safety in 2024. It really works out.

You know, we all celebrate handle and revenue, but I think we all know safety is number one. The number that they got to before that is really something to be proud when you're -- I've never seen one like that. I asked Joe. He hadn't seen one that low either.

We run about 1200 races a year. You know, we're getting up to 10,000 starts between the two breeds. And between Tony really being great at his job, Andy Hershey, and our vet staff being very careful with horses that may or may not need the

day off, and then last our company has put a lot of
money into equipments and good equipment. And Tony
doesn't lack for any of that. In fact, I'm going

to ask for an aerator after this.

So but something to be really proud of. We've had a very good -- I'm knocking on wood but our 2025 results right now are pretty darn good too and heading in the right direction. So if you see him around, pat him on the back. We're all really proud of what he did.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions for Eric? The Derby was great. It was fun to see all those people, like you say, as hot as it was. You know what the main topic at our table was? We were worried about you getting sunburned out there on the rail.

ERIC HALSTROM: Too late.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Seriously that was the topic, we were worried about you.

ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah, by the time I figured it out, it was way too late.

CHAIRMAN BORST: It was too late. It was great. I told them, I said it took me forever to park in the garage. I looked at all the license plates. It's amazing. There was Oregon. There

was New York. There was New Jersey. I mean, all over. That was really great.

ERIC HALSTROM: You know, if you recall a few years ago, we had the awning approved.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Yeah.

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part of us and the horsemen. And that's changed a lot of things. It's just given us more options. We're already talking about what we can do next year for more shade because if you think back to a couple of years ago, that 40 by 40 tent that we had out there, there was people, you know, like, standing elbow to elbow in that 40 by 40. Well, now we've got 260 by 40. And they were elbow to elbow, which was you couldn't have done this a few years ago for the on-track experience. So really great day. We'll make it better next year too.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Yes, it was. Okay. Anything else? I guess not. I guess you can stay right there. We'll move to our next item which is the request for the 2025 capital expenditure substitutions. The first one Horseshoe Indianapolis request to amend the expected 2025 capital improvement list and substitute with alternate 2025 purchases.

Yes, sir. Chairman Borst, in 1 ERIC HALSTROM: March we had several different pieces of equipment 2 3 approved. And we still had about \$65,000 sitting out there that we just weren't ready for in March, 4 5 but we found another piece of equipment that we think will help our turf course. It's a top of the 6 line aerator for Tony to use at the end of the meet 7 and then in the spring before the meet that 8 9 actually digs a little bit deeper than the ones we've rented or tried to use ourself. So it's a --10 11 it will stimulate turf growth. And the more you 12 can get an even surface out there, the safer it 13 comes to be. So this will also keep us from -- you 14 know, we rented from several different places and 15 never really found one that we thought was 16 suitable. 17

So I'd appreciate the approval of an aerator to finish our substitute capital for 2025.

CHAIRMAN BORST: I saw that Horseshoe will cover the difference between --

ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: -- what the budget was and the overage there, which was a good thing to do. Any questions?

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: You have rented, and

you found those to be not suitable.

ERIC HALSTROM: Right.

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COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: And this piece of equipment since you're private -- in government we were never allowed to do this -- are you able to rent your piece of equipment when it's sitting, or would you ever consider it?

ERIC HALSTROM: We -- that's a good question because I'll tell you what we have. We actually own an aerator, but the times are too short. And they don't get deep enough. And they don't pull the plugs the way we have want. We've rented a couple that even have longer ones, but what I'm finding out is unless you have the substance to that time, the longer they get, the more they break.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: And I get that. This is probably specific for your industry.

ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Or is this a turf from golf courses?

ERIC HALSTROM: Well, I would assume that golf courses use something similar, you know, fall or whenever their getting towards the end of their season.

1 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Because you use this 2 seasonally what I heard you say --3 ERIC HALSTROM: Yes. 4 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: -- spring and fall. 5 I'll leave it alone, but I'll plant that seed since you're private. That's an expensive piece of 6 equipment for what you're doing and how often you 7 will use it. It will age out before it will get 8 9 worn out. So my question, my comment to you is you 10 ought to talk to somebody about potentially gaining 11 back some of your \$17,000 that you put in it in a 12 rental to other turf managers. 13 ERIC HALSTROM: Very interesting point. 14 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Knowing that business 15 a little bit. 16 ERIC HALSTROM: Because you're correct. Wе 17 will only use this two days a year. COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: It will sit. 18 you'll store it outside, I assume. 19 20 ERIC HALSTROM: Well, we have a beautiful maintenance shed and barn. 21 2.2 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: So it will be stored

CHAIRMAN BORST: He can be your broker, I guess, and find people.

ERIC HALSTROM: See, it's paid for itself today.

CHAIRMAN BORST: There you go. Do we have any questions before we vote on this?

MR. ROTHENBERG: Hey, Eric, I just have a real quick question. Maybe you could just spend 30 seconds on this. So the other Eric, Eric Smith, was telling me about this cool piece of, like, radar equipment that you have that is dragged over the track.

ERIC HALSTROM: Correct.

MR. ROTHENBERG: Could you hit that for, like, 30 seconds because it's nothing I ever heard of.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR PITMAN: And that's related to part of your track safety protocol, correct?

ERIC HALSTROM: Yeah, I'm glad you brought it up. I was trying to be brief, but I'm glad to tell you. We're going to be first track that does this. And we found a vendor who actually works in, like, the asphalt and gravel world where they do below surface readings. And it's way over my head. He

tried to explain. And I didn't even -- two seconds in, I was out.

But we're now using it. It's the first racetrack surface. And it's a piece of equipment. There's two of them that sit on the back of our harrows. And they take readings of the depth of our cushion, not the base. But it can get in the point where you can see where the base and where that works, but this is to see -- and we believe and I think a lot of people believe, that a very uniform cushion is part of what makes a racetrack most safe.

And it will give you a heat map. He showed it to me on his phone. And more data will be coming in, but essentially where it was blue, we try to keep that at six inches. In the blue area, that's exactly where we want it to be. On this map, it was pretty darn good near the rail and whatnot.

As you started to get out, some would turn green a little bit, which meant it was more like five or something like that. You get to where it washes out. You could see some spots where it was more like four or whatever it might be. But it's a simple tool for Tony to bring out more material in the areas where he sees something that's not

1 consistent. So very new to us, but I believe that this 2. 3 will be something that will help Tony a lot. You 4 can't -- you can go around with a measuring stick. 5 That takes a long time, and this can give you something pretty quick. 6 7 CHAIRMAN BORST: Got to stay in the cutting edge. Like you say, safety is most important. 8 9 ERIC HALSTROM: Yes, sir. 10 CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. I guess we need a 11 motion and a second. 12 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: So moved. 13 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Second. 14 CHAIRMAN BORST: Been moved and seconded. questions? Seeing none, go to roll call. 15 16 MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst. 17 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye. 18 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty. 19 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye. 20 MR. EGGIMAN: Commissioner Estes. 21 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye. 2.2 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood.

COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye.

COMMISSIONER MCCUAIG: Aye.

MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCuaiq.

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CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. It passes five to nothing.

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Okay. Next on the agenda is consideration of Harrah's Hoosier Park's request to amend the expected 2025 capital equipment list and substitute with an alternate 2025 purchase. Joe Morris.

JOE MORRIS: Joe Morris with Caesars Racing.
We have 748,000 for 2025 approved. You remember
that list was created back in 2018. So prices have
certainly changed quite a bit since then. We had
three John Deere tractors. We bought -- there was
five for this year. We bought two last year. And
they were on the 2018 list at 109. They actually
cost 130. So some of this stuff moves around a
little bit. But on the 748, we have some
substitutions we would like to put in. Our new
total will be 751, and Harrah's Hoosier Park will
put in the difference.

Two of the tractors we bought last year are gone. And there was some other winter equipment we didn't need. What we'd like to get is two diamond harrows and a conditioner. With winter training here, that equipment we drag behind the tractors just takes more of a beating. You know, back in '18, we were never open in the winter. So we're

1 | needing to add to and replace that stuff quicker.

2 | Also a 16-foot float could have used this Saturday

3 | night with that rain storm we had here. The water

was literally blanketing over the side of the

track. And a float is the best way to get rid of

that. We'd like to get that.

There's a portable power washer we'd like to get just to be able to do equipment, sides of barns, other buildings. Our old one is worn out. A jetting machine, again, with winter training, we have horses here 12 months out of the year. More horses, our plumbing gets clogged. With the sand that they move, this jetting machine can go down under into the pipes, and we can jet that added material out with it.

We'd like to get a couple of powered wheelbarrows. That's for our employees. In the winter, as we're getting stalls ready after horses have shipped out, we always have to bring in more dirt material to bring those stalls back to level. That's heavy for a person to move by hand. The powered wheelbarrows, now they're just steering a wheelbarrow. They can go right to the stall and put it in.

Then we'd like to get another SUV for the

- 1 | backside. We have one out there now that's got
- 2 | some age on it. We have a purchaser. The ISA will
- 3 | buy that for a dollar. And then they can use it on
- 4 | the back stretch to move people around during the
- 5 races on that.
- 6 So that list I just gave you is 228,000, added
- 7 onto the \$523,015 that's already approved, it's
- 8 751,015. On the actual schedule was 748,369. So
- 9 we think those are good additions that we need for
- 10 track safety on the track side of it and for our
- 11 | employees.
- 12 CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Any questions for
- 13 Joe? Makes sense. As we always say, you don't buy
- 14 | it just to buy it.
- 15 JOE MORRIS: That's right.
- 16 CHAIRMAN BORST: In 2018 when we did this, who
- 17 knows.
- JOE MORRIS: And there's a committee we put
- 19 | together that goes through and comes up with these
- 20 | substitutions.
- 21 CHAIRMAN BORST: Get the stuff we need.
- 22 JOE MORRIS: Yeah.
- 23 CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. Do we have a motion
- 24 | and a second to approve of the substitution?
- 25 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Move to approve.

- 17 | Fund Advisory Committee expenditures approved and
- 18 | submitted by Fund committee members as well as the
- 19 | Community Center update. Who's going to handle
- 20 | that one? Joe gets this. It's the Joe Morris
- 21 | show. We'll give you a seat there so you can just
- 22 | sit there.
- JOE MORRIS: Joe Morris with Caesars. I'll
- 24 | start with the Community Center. Site work's
- 25 complete. The rain has probably pushed us back six

to eight weeks. There was actually a pond there
for a good portion of the six to eight weeks. The
footers are all in. This week the rough plumb gets
done, and the pad gets poured. So that will be
done by the end of the week. The trusses and the
outside walls are on site. And it's scheduled to

be up next week. So that's good.

The project is on budget. And the new opening, and I am being pressured by Joe Davis. He wants that thing up by the Christmas party that the HBPA has in December. So we do believe we'll be good for first, second week of December to open it. Other than all the rain we've had, we're in good shape there.

So the other project we have going down there is on our, the barns we winterized back six seasons ago that we did in our first time. And we're putting some Big Ass fans in there. That is the name of the company. And the electric work is all done there. The fans are on site.

Today, actually, they sent rods that they hang from the ceiling with. The rods weren't right. So the new rods are coming in today. Those will all be in by the end of this week. So those are the ongoing construction we have going there.

Then just a quick overview: At Horseshoe next year we'll go light in this fund and probably spend 40 or 50,000. And the last four years after that, we will have 302,000 a year to exhaust that 12.5 million. You remember we really front loaded that. We had to have those new stalls. We needed the dorm room.

So we've spent it -- the canopy, I mean, for those of you that were there on Indiana Derby Day, I mean, that's one of the coolest things in racing. Just as an aside, I told the Chair, and the Chair said, well, you better tell Gus, it was his idea. We do an attendance there now. I have security do the attendance because I overcount things. So you don't want me counting. We had 5100 people there on Indiana Derby Day. Great crowd. We just started it this year so we don't have a comparison.

We do it here. And we've been doing it -this is our second year here. We had 3300 people
here for Fourth of July, which was just a great.
And that didn't include the line of cars on that
road out there or the line of cars on that road
there. But we have been tracking those from you
bringing that up before. So we'll have historical
data over time.

1 And then at Hoosier, we're at with five years to go, find the number, it's seven hundred and, I 2 3 think it's 740,000 a year we still have in that fund to be able to spend here. So we're in a 4 5 little better shape up here as far as the last five years. But what a great tool that fund has been 6 that Caesars put up at the beginning of this thing. 7 And that fund does renew itself in 2030 for another 8 9 \$25 million over the next ten years going forward. 10 So good shape on both. 11 CHAIRMAN BORST: Any questions? Yeah, it 12 looked like there was some sticks sticking up --13 JOE MORRIS: That's exactly what I thought. 14 CHAIRMAN BORST: -- at the Community Center. 15 JOE MORRIS: We can see our sticks. 16 CHAIRMAN BORST: There were sticks sticking up 17 at the new Community Center. COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Is that a slab on? 18 JOE MORRIS: It will be a slab, yeah. 19 20 slab is getting poured this week. We're doing the 21 rough plumb right now, and Thursday Friday they're 22 pouring the whole slab. 23 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Do you have a CM on

JOE MORRIS: Yes. We have Chris Duke. He's

the job?

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- 1 | actually the president of the Quarter Horse, but he
- 2 | has a, I call it a barndominium business because
- 3 | it's basically a barndominium, but he's the one who
- 4 | has done all the work.
- 5 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Who's checking all
- 6 | the electric and plumbing in the slab before it's
- 7 | poured?
- 8 JOE MORRIS: Done through the city.

- 18 | again. Poor guy. We appreciate you. We were glad
- 19 when they hired you, and you've more than lived up
- 20 to your reputation.
- 21 JOE MORRIS: Good team. It's about good
- 22 | teams. So this is something I shared with Deena.
- 23 | It's the 25th year that Caesars has done this.
- 24 | That's what the report looks like. I mean, it's a
- 25 | pretty big report. And it's just kind of neat they

do this.

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Now, some of you who've been there would remember Kiersten Flint. Kiersten was the head of marketing here at Hoosier Park. Kiersten was who we worked with when I did the original operations plans. She created those vessels and put those together.

She still lives in Indiana, but she is the head of the corporate social responsibility side of Caesars now. So she goes to Vegas and does it, but it's really, I mean, Caesars does a lot. We were talking about our community giving here. They give a lot of money out over the course of a year and want to be a part of every community that they're in.

As I said, this is the 25th anniversary.

Tom Reeg, himself writes the note and sends it in to all the employees to share that with them. I hadn't shared this before. But, you know, the hero, the volunteer hours that Caesars does over the empire in the course of a year, 93,000 volunteer hours to their different communities.

You go to the, you know, just a quick table of contents here, it's people plan at play is what they call it, but you go down through. It's

1 creating the best experience for our team members,

2 | celebrating our team members, commitment to health,

3 | wellbeing and safety, extraordinary impact on our

4 | communities, empowering partnerships, our

5 | commitment to suppliers, our climate commitments,

6 | water conservation and management, waste reduction

7 | and landfill diversion, nature strategies. For

8 | players, extraordinary destinations and offerings,

9 | reasonable business operations, protective

10 | information on security and the social side of

11 | that. \$72 million in total investments into our

12 | communities as a whole on Caesars. Just a big part

13 of what we do.

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Over 50,000 team members, 50 destinations across 18 states, 32 jurisdictions now where we have Caesars digital, which is the Racebook and the Sportsbook. So that helps the handle out across, 61 million square feet of air conditioned space, 46,000 hotel rooms and suites, 500 owned or managed food and beverage outlets.

Just I find it fascinating to look at how big and how much they do with all of this.

And then you get to the racing, it is a part of the whole thing. Also we have -- I'll just find the sheet. We have over 6200 races a year,

1 130 million in purses out to our horsemen. It's
2 really worth a read at some point, you know, if you
3 have time just to see all that goes on; 37 million
4 in breed development organizations, 3.6 million
5 state, city, and county wagers. That's just on our
6 racetracks on that side of it; 128 -- 130,000 just
7 in racing equine charitable giving over the course

So it's just something I wanted to share with you and put in. We're proud of the corporate social responsibility that we do as a group. And it's just way bigger than you would expect, you know, just seeing the Indiana part of it. That's all that was. It was just a little infomercial, but it's something we're proud of and wanted to share with you so you could see what we do as a total group.

CHAIRMAN BORST: I'm glad you did. I did read through it last night. It's impressive. It takes a while, 50-some pages.

JOE MORRIS: Yeah.

of a year.

CHAIRMAN BORST: But, no, it's amazing. I hadn't remembered seeing it before, and I thought, did I miss that.

JOE MORRIS: That's the first time I've sent

1 it. I probably should have before. But I shared

2 it with Deena. She said, good, you're going to 3 share it with the whole Commission.

But basically they're looking just to shift that date to the other date so that there could be some synergy between the two tracks --

CHAIRMAN BORST: Somebody. 6 Second. 7 COMMISSIONER MCCUAIG: CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. Roll call vote. 8 9 MR. PENNYCUFF: Chairman Borst. 10 CHAIRMAN BORST: Aye. 11 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCarty. 12 COMMISSIONER MCCARTY: Aye. 13 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Estes. 14 COMMISSIONER ESTES: Aye. 15 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner Levengood. 16 COMMISSIONER LEVENGOOD: Aye. 17 MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioner McCuaig. 18 COMMISSIONER MCCUAIG: Aye. 19 CHAIRMAN BORST: Thank you. 5-0 passes. 20 Okay. Next on the agenda is just an update on 21 rulemaking. 2.2 MR. ROTHENBERG: Yeah, I know, I noticed

23 there's a lot of anxiety behind making motions and 24 secondings today. So this is just a report that 25 won't need to have that.

If you remember back to October of last year, we started rulemaking process on rules under 25-1-47. As of today, hopefully those have been sent to the AG's office, and now the governor has 30 days to either accept the rule and make it a rule or come back to us. I don't anticipate there will be any problem. I was going to review the rules from October, but I'm not going to do that.

Presently we are working on new rules. Some of the rules actually update the rules that haven't been updated yet. Interestingly enough, this is how long this process sort of takes.

The main gist of these rules though, we are trying to consolidate rules that have a lot of redundancy. For instance, Rule No. 4 has to do with associations, which are the racetracks. Rule No. 4.5 has to do with associations for flat racing, which is the racetrack. If you look at those two rules, about 90 to 95 percent are duplicate. As you can guess, there's similarities. So the main gist of this round is to try to get those rules that are in 4.5 that aren't in 4 incorporated in 4 and just eliminate 4.5.

That's the same with Rule 5 and 5.5, licensees. Once again, we are taking anything from

the flat tracks that pertain to jockeys, jockey
agents, things like that and moving them into Rule
4, which is basically the rule for here at Hoosier
Horse Park or Harrah's, Harrah's Hoosier Park,
sorry, and then eliminating 5.5. So we get rid of
some rules. It streamlines things and makes it
easier.

There a couple of other rules that we're going to amend, including some suggestions from some horsemen's association, other horsemen, and just some clean-up rules that we need to just straighten out.

So what I anticipate is that within the next probably week to week and a half sending out those rules for just informal feedback, right, from the Commissioners but also from the racetracks and the horsemen's associations. And you see how long it kind of takes to go through this process. My hope is that within just a couple weeks after sending those out, we get feedback, and we can start with the actual formal rule promulgation.

We're also this year readopting a bunch of rules that don't need to be changed in both 4 and 5. So there's a couple different processes going on there.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Anybody have any questions about any of that? If you do, good luck. All right. Next is an update on HISA. Matt, I guess you get to be the HISA expert.

MR. EGGIMAN: Yes. Thank you, Chairman. I'll keep this update to the litigation that's occurring on the act itself. There are three cases from three different circuits that sought review from the Supreme Court over this past session of the Supreme Court. The court sort of held onto making any sort of a decision on those cases until they settled a different case that sort of involved the same constitutional provisions as the case, the cases that HISA is arguing.

And just last month the court did rule on that case. So there has been some movement then with the three cases. They did decide to take them, the Supreme Court did. However, they sent them back to their circuits and said basically, hey, we just settled the issues you're arguing in your cases. So go back to your circuits, argue again and have the court rule based upon this new case.

So what does that mean? Basically we have probably another year or two down at the circuit level for these cases. Then the side that doesn't

prevail has the option to seek Supreme Court review again. Of course, that could take another year or so.

So looks like we're going to have at least one or two or maybe more race meets in Indiana where HISA still is the law but still unsettled so who knows after that. Of course, Congress could always act and amend the portions of the law that are being argued in the courts, which as some of you remember, they did so, like, two and a half years ago when one particular aspect of the law had been declared unconstitutional by a court. But, again, you know, with the current Congress who knows. So right now it's sort of, it will be business as usual for at least the next year or two.

CHAIRMAN BORST: Okay. That's the way we have to live. Next is the delegation of authority to conduct racing business to the Executive Director.

MR. PENNYCUFF: Commissioners, each year there are matters that arise during the race meeting that require quick turnaround and quick decision making. Because the Commission may not meet often enough for these immediate matters to be handled, Commission staff routinely makes the request that the Commission delegate authority to the Executive

CHAIRMAN BORST: You were as good at this as you were selling cars. So there you go.

Also this marks our Executive Director Deena Pitman's last meeting unless we have some emergency thing before August 29th, unless we can convince her to stay, but I don't think that's going to happen. But, yeah, we just have to thank you for 32 years of service and all that you've done.

You're leaving here better than you found it. And

that's the way you want to do things in life.

You've been great to work with. She's always on top of things. I mean, you had to go through COVID. You had to go through a couple sales, Caesars sales. There's been a lot to go through. You've had a lot of personal things to, but for all of us, thank you very much. We appreciate it.
