The primary 24-hour SO<sub>2</sub> standard was established at a level of 0.14 parts per million (ppm) on April 28, 1971 ([36 FR 8186](#)). The primary 24-hour standard was not to be exceeded more than once per year.

On May 14, 1996, after reviewing available science, United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) concluded that the primary 24-hour SO<sub>2</sub> standard provided the requisite level of public health protection, and, therefore retained the original standard ([61 FR 25566](#)).

On June 2, 2010, U.S. EPA revoked the primary 24-hour SO<sub>2</sub> standard and established a new primary 1-hour SO<sub>2</sub> standard ([75 FR 35520](#)).

All areas of Indiana met the primary standard at the time it was revoked by U.S. EPA.
