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INTRODUCTION

The 2021 annual juvenile detention facility evaluations conducted by the IDOC, Division of Youth Services included two on-site facility inspections; staff and youth interviews; and an audit of the state detention standards.

While the proposed Indiana Juvenile Detention Facility Standards are in the process of being promulgated, Detention Facilities had the option to be audited on three hundred one (301) current detention standards or the corresponding two hundred and thirty-seven (237) proposed juvenile detention facility standards.

Allen County Juvenile Center chose to be audited on the current three hundred one (301) juvenile detention facility standards in 2021, for their 25th annual detention inspection. Of the three hundred and one (301) standards audited, twenty-six (26) standards require mandatory compliance and the remaining two hundred and seventy-five (275) are recommended standards. Compliance with 100% of the mandatory standards and 90% of the recommended standards is required to attain "Full Compliance."

Facility Tour: Youth Interviews:	The facility tour was conducted by Shane Armstrong. This inspection focused on mandatory standards. Areas such as medical, janitorial closet, kitchen, visitation rooms, search areas, private interview rooms, youth rooms, youth living areas, personal and property areas, mechanical and safety areas were inspected. Two youths were interviewed on each visit. Responses are from both		
	on-site visits.		
Youth Responses:	Youth were asked a series of questions pertaining to the mandatory and security standards. Two of the youth stated they had been taken off grounds to attend medical appointments outside of the facility. There were taken to these appointments via a facility vehicle. All of the youth interviewed stated that they had been in a fire drill at this facility and that the drills can happen anywhere from one to three times a month. A couple of the youth complained of either being cold or warm. These concerns were gone over during the debriefing with the director.		
Staff Interviews:	Two line staff were interviewed with one of them working line and control.		
Staff Responses:	Staff members were asked a series of questions have to do with mandatory and security standards. Both staff members went over procedure of a fire drill. They said fire drills were simulated as if a real fire was occurring. They went on to explain that any disable, incapacitated, or high-risk juveniles would receive either one on one care or given special assistance in the event of an emergency. Staff then went on to explain that they receive training over their suicide		

	prevention program and that the doctor gives this training to them yearly. They described their unit logs having information about any	
	movement, grooming, mealtimes, any issues with a resident throughout the day, and fire drills.

All youth stated that they are checked in on regularly and room checks are performed, as well. All youth said that they had received their handbooks and were able to keep their copy. All the youth felt comfortable with education program in the facility and were about to transfer their credits and were able to use an online learning program.

Youth Responses:	Youth were asked a series of questions regarding food service and hygiene, medical, mental health, and program standards. All the youth said that they receive three meals a day at regular times with two of three meals being warm or hot. They all said that the food tasted okay. All youth stated that they knew how to request access to medical assistance. When asked if they felt like their medical and mental health was taken seriously and kept confidential, they all stated that they felt that it was.
