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### INTRODUCTION

The 2021 annual juvenile detention facility evaluations conducted by the IDOC, Division of Youth Services conducted two on-site facility inspections; staff and youth interviews; and an audit of the state detention standards.

While the proposed Indiana Juvenile Detention Facility Standards are in the process of being promulgated, Detention Facilities had the option to be audited on three hundred one (301) current detention standards or the corresponding two hundred and thirty-seven (237) proposed juvenile detention facility standards.

Robert J. Kinsey Youth Center chose to be audited on the two hundred and thirty-seven (237) proposed juvenile detention facility standards in 2021, for their 25<sup>th</sup> annual detention inspection. Of the two hundred and thirty-seven (237) standards audited, sixteen (16) standards require mandatory compliance and the remaining two hundred and twenty-one (221) are recommended standards. Compliance with 100% of the mandatory standards and 90% of the recommended standards is required to attain "Full Compliance." Again, Centers that chose to be audited on the proposed detention standards were only required to meet the expectation of the current detention standards. Robert J. Kinsey Youth Center chose to also provide documentation on the extra standards with exclusively new requirements. The breakdown of each audit listed below is only reflective of the current standards.

Youth Interviews:	The facility tour was conducted by Leah Sand. This inspection focused on mandatory standards. Areas such as medical, janitorial closet, kitchen, visitation rooms, search areas, private interview rooms, youth rooms, youth living areas, personal and property areas, mechanical and safety areas were inspected. It was ensured that staff had access to the Emergency Manual.  Four youth were interviewed between both on-site visits.
Youth Responses:	The four juveniles were asked a series of questions pertaining to the mandatory and security standards. All of them felt comfortable and safe in the facility. One did comment on the temperatures either being too cold or too hot. This concern was told to the detention staff during the debriefing and handled accordingly.
Staff Interviews:	Two line staff were interviewed and one with control room experience.
Staff Responses:	The staff were asked a series of questions regarding mandatory and security standards. They were asked the process for controlling and storing flammable, toxic, and caustic materials. They stated that only supervisors and maintenance have access to the storage that they are kept in. They are able to use mechanical restraints with the supervisors permission but it is very rare occurrence that they do need to be used. During an emergency situation staff provide one-on-one support to a juvenile who is high-risk or disabled.

<b>Youth Interviews:</b>	Four youth were interviewed between both on-site visits.	
Youth Responses:	All of the juveniles interviewed were asked questions regarding safety, justice and order, and education standards. They all felt well about the facility's education program and are able to use an online learning program with their earned credits being transferred. All of the youth received a handbook upon admission and were able to have access to the handbook in each of the day rooms. They felt that they understood the rules and sanctions and thought them to be fair.
