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INTRODUCTION

The 2020 annual juvenile detention facility evaluations conducted by the IDOC, Division of Youth Services would normally consist of three on-site facility inspections; staff and youth interviews; and an audit of the state detention standards. Due to the covid-19 global pandemic, we conducted one on-site facility inspection, along with staff and youth interviews, an audit of the state detention standards, and conducted testing on the candlelight levels and ventilation in accordance to the standards requirement.

While the proposed Indiana Juvenile Detention Facility Standards are in the process of being promulgated, Detention Facilities had the option to be audited on three hundred one (301) current detention standards or the corresponding two hundred and thirty-seven (237) proposed juvenile detention facility standards.

Youth Care Center chose to be audited on the two hundred and thirty-seven (237) proposed juvenile detention facility standards in 2020, for their 24th annual detention inspection. Of the two hundred and thirty-seven (237) standards audited, sixteen (16) standards require mandatory compliance and the remaining two hundred and twenty-one (221) are recommended standards. Compliance with 100% of the mandatory standards and 90% of the recommended standards is required to attain "Full Compliance." <u>Again, Centers that chose to be audited on the proposed detention standards were only required to meet the expectation of the current detention standards with exclusively new requirements. The breakdown of each audit listed below is only reflective of the current standards.</u>

Education Services:	Residents are provided education in the common areas on both the male and female units. Monday- Friday from 8:15am-1:45pm with a break at 10:00am for staff and residents and lunch from 11:30am-12pm. Residents resume education at 12:15 pm. All residents complete the TABE assessment to determine where they are academically before they are assigned lesson plans by the teacher. We also provide a GED instructor that comes to the facility.

	mechanical and safety areas were inspected. It was ensured that staff
	had access to the Emergency Manual.
Youth Interviews:	One male and one female were interviewed.
Youth Responses:	Both youths stated that they had never felt unsafe and that the facility
	was clean and comfortable. One youth did mention that some of the
	sinks do not work. One confirmed that they had participated in a fire
	drill. One youth had suggestions for the facility to have better food and
	be allowed to have more showers. Any concerns were brought to the attention of the facility director.
Staff Interviews:	Two line staff were interviewed with one having control room
	experience.

Staff Responses:	Both staff described the procedures for an emergency evacuation/drill. Juveniles are released by control and the staff are trained on hot to get the juveniles to a safe place. In the event of loss of power there is a back-up generator and a key kept in control. They described the information kept in the permanent logs being count of all kids, showers, education, medical, movement, meals, and every fifteen-minute checks. Both went on to say that facility searches are performed depending on the need of it, but minimally done twice a week. Both confirmed that they received medical and mental health training and continue to receive it annually. Lastly, the described the procedure of dealing with youth detoxification. The youth are assessed before they enter the facility have to be medically cleared.

Youth Interviews:	One male and one female were interviewed.
Youth Responses:	Both youths confirmed that they had read their facility handbook and a copy was available to them upon request. Both felt they understood the rules and found them and the punishments fair. They had both had contact with a probation officer, court official, or attorney and said that their contact was made private. One did express concern about the phone being very static and hard to hear. Both said they knew the procedure for filing a grievance and understood they could appeal a denial. Neither youth had any comment the education program due to it being summer at the time.

Youth Interviews:	One male and one female were interviewed.
Youth Responses:	One youth stated that they did not like the food at all, while the other said that some days the food was good and other days not so much, but it was tolerable. Both confirmed that they had received all the necessary items during intake and that they receive clean bedding twice a week and clean clothing every day. Neither youth had any complaints or concerns about their medical or mental health. They both shared that they felt their medical and mental health were taken seriously, presented in a way that they understood, and was kept confidential. One youth even said that therapist was great.
