Beginning January 2, the Reception and Diagnostic Center and Rockville Intake Units are now processing Birth Certificate requests upon an offender's arrival to the Department. By moving this process to intake, all offenders now have the opportunity to obtain their birth record prior to release.

On Wednesday, January 2, 2008, the Indiana Women's Prison Yarn Workers Group donated 281 crocheted hats and scarves to the Lord's Locker food pantry in Trafalgar, IN just in time for the severe winter weather.

The Pendleton Correctional Facility's "WHEELS FOR THE WORLD" wheelchair refurbishing operation sent out its last refurbished wheelchair shipment for the year. In all, the program repaired and shipped 232 wheelchairs in calendar year 2007, for shipment around the world to individuals in need.

Offenders in WCC's Inside-Out Dads Program sent video taped messages to their families expressing their plans and commitment to improving their relationships in the coming year.

PEN Products Central Office staff donated new clothes, new toys and food items for two families during this holiday season. The items were contributed by staff and were wrapped by female work release offenders.

On January 1, 2008, the Plainfield Correctional Facility initiated the first ever SOCAP program. The facility will be the first to serve as a treatment center containing a therapeutic community to help rehabilitate convicted sex offenders from throughout the state. SOCAP stands for the Sex Offender Containment and Accountability Program.

All facilities made extra efforts to afford offenders the opportunity to observe the Holiday season. The Indiana State Prison, offered offenders a variety of programs, including a Kwanza celebration on 12-27 and 12-28, a Native American Wounded Knee Celebration on 12-29, Eastern Orthodox Celebration and Feast on 12-29, General Christian Celebration and Feast on 12-23, Gary Diocese Bishop Dave Melzcek performed Mass on 12-25, and the offenders performed a play with a special appearance from Reno Hype a comedian on 12-25.

On Thursday, January 3, 2008, the staff of the Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility (PREF) toured Wheeler Mission, the Indianapolis Community Re-Entry Center, and Volunteers of America to become familiar with the environments to which male offenders return.

Several offenders at the Rockville Correctional Facility crocheted 228 stuffed bears. The bears were dressed in crocheted army vests and hats of desert camouflage for presentation to the families of the local National Guard Armory. Many members of the unit will soon be deployed with the 3rd battalion.

Rockville Correctional Facility celebrated its fourth CLIFF graduation on January 4, 2008 with 34 graduates. The guest speaker was Terry L. Jenkins and Director of the Adult and Juvenile programs for the Indiana Department of Correction.

The Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility (PREF) received a score in the green (90% range) on their monthly Progress Reports (PR's) and Re-Entry Accountability Plans (RAP's). These scores represent the hard work and dedication that the PREF Re-Entry Specialists have shown in their efforts to increase public safety and reduce recidivism.

Pendleton Correctional Facility Superintendent Stanley Knight reports that the Facility's "Shifting Gears" bicycle refurbishing operation restored 944 bicycles in 2007. Bicycles restored by offenders assigned to the program are donated to a variety of charitable organizations in the community. Superintendent Knight also reports that the facility's "Wheels for the World" wheelchair refurbishing operation recently completed 200 wheelchairs that have been designated for shipment to Russia. A special baby stroller was also recently completed by offenders assigned to the program to meet the body specifications of a disabled baby in the Republic of Haiti.

Miami Correctional Facility assisted the Miami County Emergency Management Agency Tuesday with filling sandbags to use to reduce flooding in Miami County. Twenty-one offenders used sand from two dump trucks to fill nearly 1,500 bags in about 90 minutes. The sandbags were used to help flood victims in Mexico, IN.

Branchville Correctional Facility's Maintenance Department along with an offender work crew manufactured 200 cutting boards for the Indiana Department of Natural Resources the Department of Agriculture. The cutting boards highlight and promote the different species of Indiana hard woods.

The Reception-Diagnostic Center teamed up with the Indiana Blood Center to host a blood drive on January 8, 2008. Twenty-four staff members took the time to donate blood to help save lives. In addition, RDC began the implementation of TABE testing for all adult male offenders on January 9, 2008.

Thanks to the quick response and professionalism of Officer Max Williams and LPN Peggy Wells from the Putnamville Correctional Facility for providing potentially life saving medical aid to a collapsed visitor.

Twelve offenders from Chain O'Lakes Correctional Facility, supervised by Officer Steve Yann, completed remodeling on Friday, Jan 11th of the I-69 Weigh Station. New tile was laid, rooms painted, lights installed, outside trim repaired and painted and landscaping was renewed. Over 3,000 hours were spent on this project.

The Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility began its second Inside-Out class collaborative with IUPUI this week. The class combines fourteen residents, eight IUPUI students, and one IUPUI professor in a School of Public and Environmental Affairs (SPEA) course concentrating on the topic of Punishment and Reformation. Participants interact and exchange topical opinions of the readings.

Pendleton Correctional Facility received a letter of appreciation from Villages President and CEO Sharon Pierce and the organization's Director of Development Linda Adams expressing thanks for the recent donation of winter clothing items and \$190.75 in cash that was collected to benefit the children served by their agency. Ms. Pierce and Ms. Adams indicated that the facility's gifts "will make an everlasting imprint on the life of a child sustaining HOPE for a brighter future". The facility also hosted a Region 4 Job Fair on Wednesday January 16th.

Volunteer recruitment was the topic of the Wednesday meeting of the Wabash Valley Correctional Facility Citizens Advisory Board. Board members learned that volunteers in such programs as Inside Out Dad's can make a positive difference an offender's life as he prepares to re-enter society.

A number of facilities celebrated Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday with special events. The Wabash Valley Correctional Facility enjoyed a visit from the Unitarian Universalist Church and Choir along with the African American Indiana University Choral Ensemble. The Pendleton Correctional Facility conducted a Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration Service that was attended by a number of outside volunteers and 128 offenders.

The Pendleton Correctional Facility administrative staff conducted a rewards ceremony to recognize Cash Spot Bonus recipients, SECC Champions, and "Years of Service" pin recipients.

Branchville Correctional Facility's INshape committee has begun its annual "Biggest Loser" contest. Contestants will be provided weekly tips and encouragement by the committee.

The Plainfield Correctional Facility held its first staff assembly of the New Year, which included a guest speaker from the administration of the Plainfield Aquatic Center who offered words of encouragement for INShape Indiana program.

Branchville Correctional Facility was selected for the BEST DOG TRAINER EXCELLENCE AWARD. The Second Chance at Life greyhound program CEO presented commendations to Branchville SCAL dog handlers and staff for their hard work and participation.

Correctional Industrial Facility held a "closing out" auction of the PEN Product's Food Industry Plant. The proceeds, totaling more than \$240,000, will go to the Department of Administration. Clearing out this food processing equipment will allow for the start-up of the new joint venture with Ready Built Transmissions, which will provide jobs for up to 300 offenders providing marketable skills and increasing post-release employment opportunities.

The Northeast Juvenile Correctional Facility conducted its first Inmate-to-Workmate congratulatory event. Two students who completed the first module received certificates.

Rockville Correctional Facility conducted a GED Graduation Ceremony, with refreshments provided by the Vocational Culinary Arts class.

Thirteen 13 female students from the Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility graduated from the Purposeful Living Unit Served. The evening consisted of a ceremony and a reception that followed with the students and their family.

The Wabash Valley Correctional Facility INShape committee hosted Healthy Sandwich Day and posted exercise tips along with healthy recipes for staff working to lose 10 pounds in 10 weeks.

Sixty (60) bicycles refurbished by offenders at Pendleton Correctional Facility were donated to the Cathedral Kitchen Breakfast Program and Pantry in Indianapolis.

The Northwest Indiana Community Advisory Board for WCC, ISP and Camp Summit met at WCC. A primary topic was how to better publicize the **ALERT** program locally.

The Logansport Juvenile Correctional Facility held a CLIFF graduation ceremony on for seven juvenile offenders. This is the 11th graduation from the unit since its December 2005 inception. There have been a total of 84 juveniles that have graduated from the program.

Putnamville Correctional Facility staff represented the facility's and IDOC's "green" efforts by displaying literature and video at a "Sustainability Expo" held at DePauw University. The Expo was a component of the university's participation in Focus the Nation, a nationwide dialogue and education forum focusing on global warming and its impact on our communities, economy and ecosystems.

Through a partnership between the Department of Correction and the Department of Transportation (INDOT), four residents of the Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility have completed on-the-job training with INDOT and upon release have been hired as full-time State employees. This opportunity is paving the way for future offenders to successfully re-enter society with gainful employment.

Indiana State Prison sent seven (7) care packages this week to staff deployed in the military.

The Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility assisted Workforce, Inc. with their Annual Post-Holiday Recycling Extravaganza. Donating recyclables allows Workforce, Inc. to continue to provide employment opportunities to men with felony convictions who have been released from the Indiana Department of Correction.

The Indiana State Prison Shifting Gears Program donated 23 bikes: 14 bikes to Elston Middle School, five to needy children, and four to Stepping Stones Shelter, which also received two bike racks.

Representatives from the Marion County Public Defenders Agency toured Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility. Several information sessions were conducted throughout the facility where key personnel answered the attorneys' questions and concerns.

Camp Summit recognized five students for successfully completing the Aramark Inmate to Workmate vocational program for food service. This comprehensive program is designed with students in mind that have expressed interest in food service as a career. To date, Camp Summit has had a grand total of 21 students successfully complete the Program.

Ms. Emily Slavens, a Culinary Arts graduate, instructed offenders at the Putnamville Correctional Facility on food preparation and placement. Ms. Slavens served as a guest instructor for Ms. Clevenger's Culinary Arts Vocational Training class.

Friday, February 15, 2008

Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility was featured on MSNBC's "Lockup" series. The show featured the day-to-day challenges of a maximum security juvenile facility. The show will air again on February 22 at 9:00 p.m. CST.

Approximately 70 members of the Young Presidents' Organization visited the Pendleton Correctional Facility. Participants toured the facility and then partook in a meal served in the Offender Services Building. Superintendent Stanley Knight presented an overview of the facility. Two offenders discussed the incarceration experience from their perspective. The YPO is comprised of Presidents and CEO's of various Indiana companies and corporations.

Madison Correctional Facility graduated their first class for the pilot project of Master Student/Master Employee. The class of 13 took the WORK ONE WorkKeys test with a 92 percent pass rate, whereas the general population pass rate was only 59 percent. Graduates received a three-month time cut in addition to the WorkOne certificates they received to help them find good jobs upon re-entry.

Thursday was graduation day for 60 Wabash Valley Correctional Facility offenders from the CLIFF program. Family and friends joined the celebration. Over 467 offenders have completed the WVCF program since its June 2005 launch.

Superintendent Jan Davis of the Madison Correctional Facility was arrested for the Muscular Dystrophy "Lock-Up" fundraising event. Her bail was \$1,300 and she raised a total of \$1,400! Staff and offenders from Madison donated \$1,220 and her former staff from Henryville Correctional Facility came up with the rest.

In recognition of Black History Month, renowned author Father Jerome Sanderson of the Greek Orthodox Church presented a lecture at the Putnamville Correctional Facility for the offender population. Father Sanderson highlighted the significant contributions of the "Saints of Africa" in the Greek Orthodox religion.

The Pendleton Correctional Facility hosted the second in a series of programs celebrating Black History Month. The featured speaker for the program was the Rev. William McGhee, Pastor of the Ark of Deliverance Holiness Tabernacle Church in Anderson. In addition, the facility offender choir performed. Some offenders presented selected biographical readings. Approximately 100 offenders attended the program.

The Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility was recognized by Gleaners Food Bank for the recent charitable donation. The \$200.50 donation was raised by the residents of PREF to assist with feeding the hungry of Indiana.

Madison Correctional Facility started the curriculum for their first Therapeutic Community. The GRIP unit (Growth, Responsibility, Integrity, and Purpose) opened last week with moving an initial 30 women into an existing building after minor renovations were completed. The unit will eventually hold up to 72 participants.

Offenders in the vocational program at the Indiana State Prison made 191 pine wood derby kits for the Boy Scouts of America.

The Employee Appreciation Committee at the Correctional Industrial Facility gave out over one thousand Candy Grams for Valentines Day collecting over \$700.00. Proceeds were donated to the employee appreciation fund. CIF is hosting a Coney dog/Nacho sale Thursday and Friday with the donations also going to the employee appreciation fund.

When food became lodged in another staff person's throat and prevented her from breathing, Mr. Jankowski performed the Heimlich maneuver, dislodging the food and allowing her to breathe again.

The Westville PLUS Unit held its first Marriage Enrichment Weekend. Nine offenders from the PLUS Unit and their significant others attended the seminar led by PLUS Unit volunteers, WCC staff and Central Office Directors.

Henryville Correctional Facility initiated a new offender work crew for the city of Austin. With the addition of this crew, Henryville has 22 work crews with five manned by DOC officers and 17 crews manned by civilian employees. All civilian crew supervisors must attend 30 hours of mandated training annually through the training officer.

Six members of the Kappa Delta Pi sorority went to the Providence Library at Pendleton Juvenile Facility to repair books. They donated supplies and seven boxes of books to the library. In addition, the sorority has gained a \$1,000 grant to use to support the library.

Officers from the Marion County Superior Court Probation Department toured Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility for training purposes. Several information sessions were conducted throughout the facility where key personnel answered the officers' questions and concerns.

The Logansport Juvenile Correctional Facility CLIFF Unit assisted the Salvation Army with food distribution. Distributions were made to several area food banks, rescue missions and day care centers.

The Indiana State Prison Emergency Response Team raised over \$650 for the Special Olympics Polar Bear Plunge.

Sandra Hawkins, Adjunct Professor Criminal Justice, Purdue University Calumet and 16 students were given a tour of the Indiana State Prison and were allowed to speak to an offender and ask questions. Correctional Industrial Facility held a celebration of Black History Month. The audience included approximately 80 offenders, facility staff and volunteers. At Pendleton Correctional Facility, Indianapolis Deputy Mayor of Neighborhoods Olgen Williams was guest speaker during a Black History Program. Commissioner Donahue also spoke at the event for offenders and volunteers from the community.

The Correctional Industrial Facility sold KFC dinners to the offender population. The proceeds went to the PLUS Program and a nearby charity.

The Edinburgh Correctional Facility held a Winter Graduation Ceremony to recognize GED graduates, Literacy and Life Skills completers, and Thinking for a Change completers.

Camp Summit recognized 35 students this week for successfully completing the Keys to Success Program.

Branchville Correctional Facility and Oakland City University held their Fall Deans' List Banquet for 52 offenders.

Congratulations to Lieutenant William Searing of the Reception and Diagnostic Center who was elected president of the Indiana Association of Hostage Crisis Negotiators (IAHCN) for 2008. The mission of the association is to provide training and networking between the FBI, State Police, Indiana Department of Correction, Sheriff Departments and local law enforcement. These organizations also lend support and knowledge to each other's departments.

Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility concluded its celebration of Black History Month with a closing program where a panel of local professionals and celebrities performed and answered questions posed by the students. The panel reinforced positive attitudes and behaviors and shared their personal paths to success. The program ended with Kevin Moore, Director of Juvenile Services, honoring the family and memory of Jerome Brewer, who died in the line of duty on August 1, 2007. The building will now be known as "The Jerome Brewer Recreation Center."

The South Bend Community Reentry Center coordinated its first ever Job Fair with a local staffing agency that represents a variety of local employers. Agency personnel visited the facility to interview offender applicants. Twenty-four offenders went through the agency's orientation and application process. Five offenders have already been placed into jobs and up to 10 more offenders are being considered for immediate job placement. Due to the success of the event, the staffing agency is interested in continuing to conduct periodic job fairs to fill their positions.

Five offenders at Westville Correctional Facility have completed the ACT program; transfers are in process to send them from long-term disciplinary segregation to maximum-security general population to complete the last six-month phase of that program. ACT is a step-down re-entry program to enable compliant offenders to return to general population first instead of releasing them from a special control unit directly to the streets.

Twelve E-Squad members from the Putnamville Correctional Facility took the "Polar Bear Plunge" for Special Olympics. The team raised \$1500 in donations and took first place by diving in and staying in the icy lake at Eagle Creek Park for 2 minutes 3 seconds.

The Indiana Women's Prison Outreach Program donated 30 handmade stuffed animals to "Operation DOC Cares." The stuffed animals will be sent to families of the IDOC employees serving our great country.

Each evening this week, Madison Correctional Facility's two offender city crews were dedicated to repainting the interior of City Hall. Last week, they painted the City's police department interior walls.

The Plainfield Correctional Facility held its "Black History is Our History" interfaith service, where over 70 offenders received a challenge to fight racism with love not hatred and intolerance. In addition, representatives from the Muslim and Christian communities addressed the need for religious tolerance and spoke of the common bonds between each faith's traditions.

The education department at Correctional Industrial Facility held a celebration of Black History Month. The program featured Northern Regional Director Rondle Anderson as the guest speaker, along with a facility choir, panel debate, and a trivia quiz.

Offenders at the Indiana State Prison enjoyed a concert by the Blood Brothers Band, a contemporary Christian band stationed out of the River of Life Church in Michigan City.

Thursday was graduation day for 14 Wabash Valley Correctional Facility offenders who successfully completed the PEN Products/U.S. Department of Labor Graphic Arts Apprenticeship Program, the first of its kind in the state. Keynote speaker, Commissioner J. David Donahue, said the recipients are demonstrating positive change as they prepare to re-enter society, extensively trained to seek a well paying job.

Recently, residents of the Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility graduated from a money management class taught by staff of the National City Bank. National City has agreed to a volunteer partnership with PREF to provide the class to help residents prepare for return to the community. The program is such a success that National City staff distributed a press release announcing the program and the recent graduation of residents.

Indianapolis Men's and Women's Community Re-Entry Centers participated in Indiana Business College's Criminal Justice Week. The Acting Superintendents gave talks on "Careers in Corrections" and the facilities hosted a job fair.

The Michigan City Police Department gave a special presentation to the students of Camp Summit Boot Camp on the many pitfalls of STG or gang involvement. The presentation is intended to help young people make sound decisions regarding resisting traditional STG temptations. While Camp Summit's STG problem is likely not as serious as many facilities, it is hoped presentations like this may help students to avoid making the problem any worse.

Pendleton Correctional Facility conducted a Volunteer Recognition Dinner to honor community service volunteers for their outstanding and dedicated service to the facility. Approximately 30 volunteers attended.

The Reception-Diagnostic Center continues its fundraising efforts for the 2008 Indianapolis Komen Race for the Cure to support breast cancer research. In addition to a \$500 monetary donation, 20 runners and walkers will represent the facility by participating in the April 19th event.

PEN Products awarded U.S. Department Labor Apprenticeship Certificates to 16 offenders at the Wabash Valley Correctional Facility. Each offender completed over 500 hours of classroom work and over 8000 hours of on-the-job training in the PEN Products print shop to earn the Offset Press Operator I Apprenticeship.

The PLUS (Purposeful Living Units Serve) Program at Westville Correctional Facility graduated its third class since the inception of the program. Nine graduates received their Certificates of Completion.

The offenders of the Indiana Women's Prison, Community Outreach Program made and donated 40 felt hats to the Soul Ministry meeting at Saint Mary's Catholic Church, for distribution with meals served to the homeless.

Members of Miami Correctional Facility's E-Squad and K-9 teams canvassed local neighborhoods, visiting about 400 homes and hanging the ALERT Notification System door hangers and explaining the system to interested neighbors. Correctional Industrial Facility staff also canvassed local neighborhoods, distributing approximately 500 notices.

Friday, March 14, 2008

The Indiana Department of Correction, in partnership with the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) and ARAMARK Correctional Services, recently registered fifteen of the Department's facilities in the DOL's apprenticeship program involving food service. The program teams ARAMARK's "Inmate to Workmate" program with the DOL's "Cook – Any Industry" apprenticeship program.

Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility recently conducted its monthly job fair, and the event attracted twenty-three candidates for several officer positions and other employment opportunities.

Plainfield Re-entry Educational Facility (PREF) held a fundraiser for the Sheltering Wing's Women's Shelter and St. Mark's Episcopal Food Pantry. The fundraiser was a collaboration of PREF staff and residents of the Toastmasters and Fatherhood programs. Kentucky Fried Chicken was sold to the residents of the facility, and each charity received a designated amount of money, with the remainder of the funds being allotted to the Fatherhood program.

Rockville Correctional Facility staff members participated in the Terre Haute Big Brothers Big Sisters Bowl-a-Thon and raised \$1300 for the organization. This was the first time the facility participated in the effort, in which five DOC teams participated.

The Indiana State Prison basketball team, coached by former NBA player Winston Garlard, was interviewed by the Northwest Times.

Madison Correctional Facility recently added two new Back Row Enterprises programs. One of the programs, Lifespring, provides substance abuse treatment to the offenders and to members of the community. The other, Turning Point Domestic Violence, provides support and education to offenders and the community about domestic violence.

Students from the Criminal Justice program at Ivy Tech – Sellersburg toured Henryville Correctional Facility. The students received information on many topics, such as control room operation to visitation procedures, and the students had the opportunity to ask offenders about the circumstances that brought them to prison.

Branchville Correctional Facility received another dog for the Shelter Puppies Offender Trained (SPOT) program. Offender dog handlers will house break and teach basic obedience commands to the puppies to suit them as family pets. To date, the SPOT program has saved twelve dogs from euthanization.

An Inside Out Dad graduation was held for five offenders on Sunday at Pendleton Correctional Facility. Family members were permitted to attend, and refreshments were served to the offenders and their visitors following the program.

The staff and offenders of the Indiana Women's Prison Community Outreach Program made 520 Easter gift bags filled with snack donations received from community contributions. The bags were distributed to the Homeless Initiative, children of offenders in the Family Preservation Program, and offenders at the facility.

Indiana State Prison received thank you letters from the children of Knapp School's Safe Harbor Program in Michigan City who received bicycles from ISP's Shifting Gears program.

A four-day seminar called "Freedom 101" was presented to twenty-six offenders at Madison Correctional Facility. The seminar incorporated humor, open discussion, and music to help offenders set new goals and was presented by two volunteer facilitators and eight other volunteers who served as group leaders.

Thursday, March 20, 2008

The Division of Emergency Respose Operations recently conducted an Emergency Squad Academy at the Correctional Training Institute. Each Emergency Squad from around the state participated in the five-day academy, and a graduation ceremony for the 63 participants was held at the conclusion of the program.

Wabash Valley Correctional Facility recently held its 12th Annual Community Service Recognition Program. The program recognized over 220 volunteers, community service providers, and interns who gave their time and skills over the past year to help offenders with rehabilitation and re-entry. Volunteers have averaged over 588 hours of service monthly.

Offenders in the Rockville Correctional Facility's Teddy Bear Club donated 59 crocheted bunnies, 16 blankets, and 14 other crocheted animals to the families of the Indiana National Guard's 139th Field Army Unit. This is the second donation to the unit, and it was prompted by of the unit's recent deployment.

Dr. Mann Spitler gave a substance abuse presentation entitled "Manda's Story" to the students at Camp Summit this week. The presentation chronicled Dr. Spitler's daughter and her battle with a heroin addiction. Afterwards, the students each prepared an essay on what the presentation meant to them, and the essays were incorporated as part of the substance abuse program.

Putnamville Correctional Facility recently held a graduation ceremony for 23 graduates of its Inside Out Dads program. Family members and staff were present alongside the offenders as they shared their learned parenting skills and commitments to becoming better fathers after their release.

Rockville Correctional Facility recently held a blood drive where 29 employees visited the Indiana Blood Center mobile unit. The drive collected 25 units of blood.

The Indiana Women's Prison Special Needs Workshop made and donated over 3,500 items to Teachers' Treasures, Inc., a store that provides free materials to teachers from schools demonstrating a poverty index of 40% or higher. The offenders made journals, bookmarks, bookbags, and flash cards, while other items were received by the community through the effort of workshop staff.

Due to the high amounts of recent rainfall, Madison Correctional Facility offered assistance to the Mayor of Madison to help with flood prevention and clean-up efforts. Thirty-five offenders from Madison's GRIP Unit filled over 500 sandbags for the city within a few hours.

Pendleton Correctional Facility's PLUS program recently conducted a food sale where offenders were permitted to purchase Church's Fried Chicken. \$996 was raised during the event, and proceeds were divided between the PLUS program and Sheperd Community Center of Anderson.

Several facilities are using the peer review process to solve issues they have experienced by using best practices from around the DOC. All staff are encouraged to embrace the process to improve effectiveness and continue the excellence demonstrated throughout the DOC.

The U.S. Department of Labor recently awarded eight staff from Indiana State Prison with Apprenticeship Certifications. Indiana State Prison is the only facility with staff, offenders, and PEN products working with the U.S. Department of Labor in the Apprenticeship Program.

Plainfield Correctional Facility recently held its first PLUS graduation for 28 offenders. Commissioner Donahue gave the keynote address, graduates gave testimonies, and the PLUS band played inspirational songs.

Edinburgh Correctional Facility recently held an art contest in celebration of Black History Month. The winning drawing was a collage of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Malcolm X.

Fourteen criminal justice students from Brown-Mackie College toured Westville Correctional Facility's PEN Products shops, the Education department, and the Westville Control Unit to observe and discuss the programs.

Indiana State Prison's Minimum Security Unit recently held a GED, Literacy, Life Skills, and Computer Business graduation. Commissioner Donahue, Director Burch, and Director Cox congratulated the honorees.

Calamari Productions finished up filming several episodes for the MSNBC series "Lockup" at Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility. The film crew captured the daily routine, programs, and life inside the facility, and the episodes scheduled to air later this year will focus on the Future Soldiers program, treatment, education, and staff.

Members of the Plainfield Re-entry Educational Facility's Toastmasters Urban Gavel Club presented checks worth \$200 to Sheltering Wing's Women's Shelter and to St. Mark's Episcopal Food Pantry. The donation was made possible by a fundraiser held earlier in the month.

Youths at Indianapolis Juvenile Correctional Facility participated in writing seminars as part of the facility's quarterly Fun Day. Several students wrote letters to American troops deployed in Iraq.

Two Camp Summit students were recognized this week by the Indiana Council of Teachers of Mathematics (ICTM) for excellence in math. Both received special certificates and were recognized at Camp Summit's community meeting.

The Grace College Collegiate Commencement was held at Indiana State Prison. 12 offenders received Associate's and Bachelor of Science degrees.

Correctional Industrial Facility held a "brief back" meeting to discuss the effectiveness of Employee Appreciation Week. The overall consensus was that everyone had an enjoyable week with good food and fun events, which included bowling, a jail program, a silent auction, and ice cream social.

Pendleton Juvenile Correctional Facility had 13 offenders recently pass the GED test, 3 of which passed with honors.

Crews from Camp Summit began construction on two homes in LaPorte for Habitat for Humanity. These homes are the 10th and 11th homes Camp Summit has helped to construct over the past several years.

PEN Products has made its first delivery of known origin firewood to Turkey Run and Shades State Parks. This pilot project employs 10-15 offenders at Putnamville Correctional Facility, and the wood is obtained from downed trees at Putnamville.

Indianapolis Parole District #3 held the first-ever Parole district job fair where 22 employers and 2 facilities of higher learning were represented. 301 parolees attended, and 22 were hired for employment, while 71 enrolled in school.

Ball State University and Grace College held graduation ceremonies at Pendleton Correctional Facility. 41 offenders graduated from the two institutions, 28 from Ball State University and 14 from Grace College. Deputy Mayor of Indianapolis Olgen Williams was the guest speaker.

Putnamville Correctional Facility's PLUS Unit donated \$200 to the Away Home Shelter in Greencastle. The Away Home Shelter provides housing to families who are homeless.

Offenders in the CLIFF program at Rockville Correctional Facility held an Outreach Program for local juveniles under the supervision of the Parke County Probation Department. The program consisted of a panel of CLIFF offenders and included topics regarding peer influence, family support/intervention, and aftercare.

Correctional Industrial Facility and Ball State University held their 4th annual graduation, awarding degrees to 143 men. Staff and guests were in attendance.

Wabash Valley staff sponsored a series of events all week to help 21 employees impacted by recent flooding. Over \$1,200 was raised, and a large quantity of cleaning supplies was donated to help facility flood victims.

Rockville Correctional Facility recently hosted a Bill Glass Weekend of Champions. Over 40 volunteers and 6 platform artists visited the facility during the two-day program.

20 offenders and 2 officers from Edinburgh Correctional Facility continued to assist the storm relief in Morgan County.

The camp theme was "The Wild Wild West," and activities were funded through community donations to the Family Preservation Program.

The program teaches 20 offenders to transcribe textbooks into Braille textbooks through collaboration with PEN Products, the Indiana Department of Education, the Center for Exceptional Learning, and the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

During its recent ACA audit, Branchville Correctional Facility was recommended for re-accreditation by passing 100% of all mandatory standards and 97.7% of the non-mandatory standards.

This week, 45 men graduated from the PLUS Unit at Westville Correctional Facility. The guest speaker was Mr. Edwin W. Vance, an integral instructor for the program and a volunteer at WCC for twenty years.

12 Indiana State Prison offenders and their spouses participated in the preservation and relationship enhancement program (PREP) last weekend. One of the offenders indicated, "The techniques and materials definitely have enhanced my life and my relationship."

Madison Correctional Facility sent 35 offenders to assist the City of Madison in preparation for this weekend's Regatta. Offenders cleaned up the waterfront and painted the judge's stand where Governor Daniels will be presenting the Governor's Cup at the conclusion of the weekend's unlimited hydroplane boat races and festival.

Henryville Correctional Facility celebrated the completion of its Anger Management Program by having a picnic for the 16 graduates of the three month-long program that focused on coping with anger and realizing alternatives to anger.

Pendleton Correctional Facility hosted an Independence Day Celebration for offenders. The cookout featured smoked sausage, sides, and soft drinks, and the band Beta Male performed.

The Deputy Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Public Safety and Corrections and the Assistant Director of the Louisiana Sheriffs' Association toured the Plainfield Re-Entry Educational Facility (PREF) to learn about re-entry in an effort to improve Louisiana's own transition programs.

Congratulations to Westville Correctional Facility for passing the annual ACA audit with a score of 100% on the mandatory items and 98% on the non-mandatory standards.

Rockville Correctional Facility held its first PLUS graduation with 19 graduates receiving certificates. Dr. Steven Hall was the keynote speaker. Graduates and guests enjoyed refreshments provided by the Culinary Arts class following the ceremony.

Staff at Putnamville Correctional Facility donated over 24 units of blood to the Indiana Blood Center. The Blood Center has a daily goal of 550 units, but this was negatively affected due to flooding and storm damage.

Mary Hulman-George, a benefactor of the retired race horse program at Putnamville Correctional facility, toured the Equine Management/Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation Program with representatives from the "Open Range Horse Rescue Center" in Colorado.
