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
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Great Lakes Commission Funding

The Great Lakes are an environmental and economic asset for the United States and Canada. The lakes fuel a \$6 trillion regional economy and hold 90% of the U.S. supply of fresh surface water (roughly 20% of global fresh water), providing drinking water for more than 40 million people. More than 1.5 million U.S. jobs are directly connected to the Great Lakes and those jobs generate \$62 billion in wages annually. With so many people depending on this water source, it comes with a few drawbacks; more than 23 billion gallons of untreated sewage is dumped into the Great Lakes from the Great Lakes Basin.


To ensure that this vital resource is protected, the eight Great Lakes states created the Great Lakes Commission (GLC) in 1955 via the <u>Great Lakes Basin</u> <u>Compact</u>. In 1968, Congress provided its consent to the Compact and the interstate compact agency it created. The eight U.S. states and two Canadian provinces are represented on the nonpartisan GLC by a delegation of <u>government-appointed</u> <u>commissioners</u>. The GLC recommends policies and practices to balance the use, development, and conservation of the water resources of the Great Lakes and brings the region together to work on issues that Great Lakes Commission Funding, continued from Page 1



no single community, state, province, or nation can tackle alone.

Unless you are from northern Indiana, it may be hard to conceptualize the impact contamination in Indiana could have on the Great Lakes. This illustration is a great depiction of the <u>Great</u> <u>Lakes</u> Drainage Basin.

Funding deployed by the Indiana Brownfields Program within the Great Lakes Basin includes 49 sites in Allen, DeKalb, Elkhart, Kosciusko, Lake, LaPorte, Noble, St. Joseph, and Steuben counties. Indiana counties within the Great Lakes Basin are in portions of the Lake Michigan and Lake Erie drainage basins. Ranging from \$1,800 to as much as \$469,000, the sites within these counties have utilized over \$6 million for redevelopment and cleanup efforts.

CWAG Info and Announcement

The Indiana Finance Authority, through the Program, was awarded a five-year, \$2,000,000 Community-Wide State Assessment Grant (CWAG) by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) in 2022 to conduct assessment activities in five (5) geographic target areas in the State: the Cities of Evansville, Frankfort, Gary, Lafayette, and New Castle (Target Communities). Under this grant, the Program has allocated approximately \$390,000 for each Target Community for site-specific tasks that include performing assessments (Phase IIs), preparing sampling plans, and reuse planning, to determine whether further assessment, cleanup, or no action is required before redevelopment can occur. With these funds, the Program anticipates completing a total of 23 Phase II Environmental Site Assessments (ESA) and drafting 19 Remediation Work Plans (RWP).

The Program issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for environmental consultants in early 2023 and selected one firm for each of the five Target Communities. Working with local community representatives, the Program and designated environmental consultants began to identify sites within each respective Target Community. Through February 29, 2024, site-specific activities and accomplishments include:

- 31 applications received (Evansville (6), Gary (4), Lafayette (8), New Castle (13))
- 23 Phase I ESAs under contract or completed with State funds (Evansville (4), Gary (3), Lafayette (6), New Castle (10))
- 8 sites approved for Phase II ESAs by the Brownfields Program and U.S. EPA; 1 pending (Evansville (1), Gary (3), Lafayette (1), New Castle (4))



ASTM Phase I ESA Standard Reminder

On December 14, 2022, U.S. EPA published a final rule in the Federal Register amending the All-Appropriate Inquiries (AAI) Rule by recognizing ASTM E1527-21 as a method for complying with AAI and withdrawing the reference to ASTM E1527-13. The rule became effective 60 days from the date of publication on February 13, 2023. Under the final rule, reports written under the ASTM E1527-13 will only remain AAI-rule compliant until February 13, 2024. Since this date has passed, the Program will only accept Phase I Environmental Site Assessment reports that comply with the ASTM E1527-21 standard. The final rule is available HERE.
