INDIANA GAMING COMMISSION BUSINESS MEETING MARCH 23, 2021

The Indiana Gaming Commission Business Meeting was stenographically taken down by me, Dianne Lockhart, RMR, CRR, a Notary Public in and for the County of Marion, State of Indiana, virtually via Microsoft Teams in Indianapolis, Indiana, commencing at the hour of 2:11 p.m., March 23, 2021. The following transcript is a true and accurate transcript of the proceedings held.

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CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Hello, everyone. I'm sorry for the delay in our connection today. This is the March 23, 2021, meeting of the Indiana Gaming Commission.

We'll start with the call to order. This meeting is hereby called to order.

Mrs. Tait, would you kindly read the roll of the Commissioners.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Sure.
Chairman McMains.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Here.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Vice Chair Fine.
We're -- we will skip him for now, having some technical difficulties.

Commissioner Williams.
COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Yes, here.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Commissioner Dudich.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Here.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: And Commissioner Cohen.

COMMISSIONER COHEN: Present.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Great.
CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: A quorum is established.
Commissioners, have you had an opportunity
to review the minutes of the last meeting? Are there any additions or corrections to the minutes as written?

Hearing none, what is your pleasure?
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion for the approval of the minutes from the last meeting of the Commission.

COMMISSIONER COHEN: I second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you. It's been properly moved and seconded to approve the minutes (audio glitch).

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
Executive Director Tait, you have a report for us?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: I do. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Good afternoon, everyone. We have welcomed one new staff member since our last meeting and also a legal extern, so J.P. Mattingly joined the Commission as the EGD compliance manager on

December 21st. He joins us actually from Caesars Southern Casino and brings over 21 years of gaming experience. He also has experience in law enforcement and quality assurance. He attended IU Southeast and Ivy Tech. So we are -- we are thrilled to have J.P. join us.

We also have a legal extern, Kim Wrigley. She joined us on January 14th. She has a Bachelor's of Science in Business Management and Criminal Justice from IU Southeast. She's currently attending IU McKinney School of Law and is expected to receive her Juris Doctorate in May of 2022 .

She is also an extern for the Marion County Prosecutor's Office and has a load of experience working as a legal assistant, a campaign assistant and a research assistant all while being a full-time law student, so we are thrilled to have her and appreciate all of the work that she's been doing for our legal division this semester.

Our investigations division has completed reinvestigations of the following licensees: VICI Properties, Majestic Star Casino, Rising Star Casino, SportsHub DFS, and Yahoo DFS. These
confidential reports are in your materials. Director Brown is also present should you have any questions.

We've added 15 individuals to our statewide exclusion list and granted 24 waivers since our November meeting. Information concerning these actions are in your materials and they will be posted to the Commission's website.

So that concludes my report. There are a few other matters on the agenda where I will be chiming in, but as for now, $I$ am finished and am happy to answer any questions of the Commissioners.

None?
Okay. Well, Mr. Chairman, I think, you know, to be as efficient as possible, we have been getting oaths ahead of time by people who intend to or may be asked to address the Commission. So I will read off the list of people who have, you know, attested to the oath that is on file with the Commission for the purpose of this meeting.

But, first, I'm pleased that there are a few of them that are our elected officials, so we have Mayor Jerome Prince, Mayor Duke Bennett,

Representative Alan Morrison and then maybe Senator Eddie Melton, so we're pleased to have them join us today.

Other presenters include Cathy Rossouw, Chris Soriano, Gary Stage, Greg Gibson, Ilkim Hincer, Jahnae Erpenbach, Kathryn Jenkins, Kay Fleming, Mike Rich, Mike Galle, Nick Casiello, Jim Allen, Jon Lucas and Tom Reeg, so as I said, Mr. Chair, all of these people have filed the oath to be able to address the Commission.

CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: Thank you, Sara.
Is there any old business to come before the Commission today?

Hearing none, new business.
Greg, are you going to present to us?
MR. SMALL: I am. Thank you very much.
Commissioners, before you are Orders 2021-3 and 2021-4. These are companion orders.

These orders seek ratification of Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2, both entered on March 2, 2021. These orders were issued pursuant to Resolution 2012-151.

Resolution 2012-151 grants the Executive Director the authority to exercise the powers and duties of the Commission under Indiana Code

4-33-4-1 and 4-35-4-1 if the Executive Director finds that a situation requires, is a matter of urgent circumstances, and the failure to act would be impractical, burdensome or not in the best interests of the public or the gaming industry. The resolution further allows the Executive Director to exercise the powers and duties of the Commission not specifically prohibited from assignment by law or resolution. The Executive Director must obtain consent from one Commissioner before exercising such authority under the resolution. In this case, Chairman McMains provided that consent to both orders.

Lastly, the Executive Director must report the action taken under the resolution to the Commission at the next business meeting for ratification or other action taken by the Commission, which is the purpose of the ratification orders currently before you.

Order 2021-1 approved a transfer of ownership between Spectacle Entertainment Group, LLC, and SHRE/SHRI, LLC, parent company of Seminole Hard Rock International, LLC, which is the 100 percent owner of Hard Rock Gary.

Pursuant to Indiana Code 4-33-4-21, a casino owner's licensee must apply for and receive the Commission's approval before an owner's license may be transferred, sold or purchased.

Further, pursuant to 68 IAC 5-2-2, licensees that are not publicly traded companies must comply with certain requirements before transferring an ownership interest, including the filing of a transfer of ownership application and a suitability investigation.

On or about February 25, 2021, the Commission received a waiver request from Hard Rock Gary in association with the transfer.

In December 2019, the Commission completed a background and financial investigation of Hard Rock Gary, including all key persons. As SHRE/SHRI is in the direct line of ownership of Hard Rock Gary, its key persons have previously been found suitable and are licensed by the Commission, it satisfied the requirements for a transfer of ownership under 68 IAC 5-2.

It was determined that there was little to gain from requiring new applications for the transfer since both parties have recently been investigated and found suitable by the

Commission, and all key persons are currently licensed in good standing.

Moving on to Order 2021-2. This order is a settlement and release agreement between the Commission and Mr. Ratcliff.

Pursuant to 68 IAC 13-1-18, settlement agreements entered into by and between the Commission and its licensees must be approved by the Commission as the ultimate authority for the agency and entered pursuant to Commission order.

Following the Commission entering certain orders on December 23, 2020, administrative actions and civil actions were commenced by both Mr. Ratcliff and the Commission.

The Commission, in entering into this settlement, determined that it was not prudent to expend valuable public resources to achieve the same outcome.

The effect of Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2
resulted in the immediate and complete divesture of Mr. Ratcliff from ownership in entities associated with casino owner licensee Majestic Star Casino, LLC.

Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2 fulfilled the mandate of the Commission as set forth in the

December 23rd orders.
Approving Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2 also allows a very important economic development project to move forward for the benefit of the State, the City of Gary and Majestic Star Casino employees and their families.

Lastly, approving Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2 is in the best interests of the public and the gaming industry and is within the authority granted via Resolution 2012-151.

Per Resolution 2012-151, the Commission must ratify the orders currently before you.

I'm happy to take any questions. Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thanks, Greg.
Any questions for Counselor Small?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure with regard to proposed Order 2021-3 and 2021-4, which ratifies, as I understand Mr. Small, Orders 2021-1 and 2021-2; is that correct?

MR. SMALL: That is correct, Chair.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion that the Commission adopt Orders 2021-3 and 2021-4 as presented by staff.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Is there a second?
COMMISSIONER FINE: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: It's been properly moved and seconded to adopt Orders 2021-3 and 2021-4.

Is there any further discussion on the motion?

Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
Thank you, Greg.
MR. SMALL: Thank you.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Hi, Chairman, sorry, it's Sara. I got kicked off, but $I$ am back now, and I -- it sounds like you all just adopted Orders 2021-3 and 4?

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Yes.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: So if you don't mind, before we move on to the next order of business, I did want to give a quick update to the Commissioners on the Spectacle investigation, if that's okay, before we move on. Perfect.

Okay. So since -- some of this is
repetitive, so I apologize. So since the November business meeting, as you know, staff has worked very hard to enable the Gary casino project to continue under difficult and unprecedented circumstances.

Spectacle failed to meet the deadline imposed by the Commission regarding the divestiture and it appeared the parties were unable to reach an agreement on how to comply. Upon observing this at the end of January, we required Hard Rock and Spectacle to participate in mediation, which was one of our last remaining tools.

We're pleased that the mediation was successful and the parties were able to reach agreement, which you just ratified. That satisfies the Commission's initial concerns.

You know, I immediately then rescinded the pause on the inland project and dedicated Commission staff and resources towards an expeditious opening.

I'm pleased to say that the transition from boat to land is going smoothly. This project is so important to the City of Gary, to the State and to Majestic Star employees and their
families.
And the parties should be commended for their efforts, which resulted in this project moving forward. I think you'll hear from the parties a little later on, potentially, about some -- some timing on opening, so I won't steal their thunder. And they're here today to be available for any questions and to present to you all.

I'd be remiss if $I$ didn't publicly acknowledge both the IGC's legal team at Lewis Wagner, including Tom Funk, and IGC consultants Walt Stowe and Mike Hile.

The IGC was placed in the very unfortunate position to respond to numerous court filings. We also took the extreme step of filing our own significant disciplinary action for revocation of a level one licensee. We were represented by wise and capable counsel and we are very appreciative of the hard work of many.

In addition, I wanted to publicly thank Sam Ardery of Bunger \& Robertson out of Bloomington. He served as the IGC's appointed mediator. I think now that he's had time to sleep, he will forgive us for appointing him to this job. He
took on a very challenging mediation and managed a process professionally and with strong commitment to identifying a solution, so we -- we gave Sam a tight timeline, and we are so appreciative of his exceptional efforts. So thank you for the opportunity to give that quick update.

Next on the list we're going to move on to patron matters, and Dustin Moloy. And I need to give Dustin a hard time because hopefully his second baby doesn't come during the middle of this meeting.

You're due in two days, is that right,
Dustin?
MR. MOLOY: We've still got two days, but if I do jump up out of here, you'll have to excuse me. Greg has been forwarded a copy of my materials in the event $I$ need to sprint out of here, but we've made it this far, so I think we'll be okay. But I appreciate you bearing with me.

On another note, my two-year-old is home from day care, so if you hear any shouting, no need to be alarmed. She's a little bit crazy, so I'm sure we all have experience with that this
past year. It's just been a little bit wacky around here.

But, anyways. Members of the Commission, good afternoon. You do have before you Orders 2021-5 and 2021-6. Both of these orders concern petitions for removal from the statewide exclusion list. These petitions were received from petitioners Jill Moore and Chemise Johnson, respectively.

Both of these individuals were present for a telephonic hearing in which a Commission attorney was present, where the burden was placed on each petitioner to prove by clear and convincing evidence that she should be removed from the exclusion list.

A Commission attorney then prepared Findings of Fact and Recommendation for each petition, where he recommended both Moore and Johnson be removed from the exclusion list.

Adopting the Commission staff attorneys' findings would have the effect of granting Moore and Johnson's petitions for removal from the exclusion list.

If you have any questions regarding these orders, I'd be happy to answer them.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Commissioners, you probably also had a chance to read Dustin's materials.

Any questions for Dustin regarding Orders 2021 No. 5 and 2021 No. 6?

Hearing none, what's your pleasure?
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I would make a motion the Commission consider Order No. 2021-5 and No. 2021-6 as presented by staff.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you. It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-5 and 2021-6.

Any further discussion on the motions?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
The motion carries unanimously.
Thanks, Dustin.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: And, sorry, this is Sara again. I don't know if this happened when I was kicked off, but I should note that Vice Chair Fine was able to join us, so he is -he is present on the call for the meeting.

So, Dustin, you are still up. If you want to go ahead and present license renewals for the Commission consideration.

MR. MOLOY: Absolutely.
Commissioners, you have before you Orders 2021-7 through $2021-11$ concerning the renewals of the following suppliers: Amelco; IGT; Halifax; Zuvid; Data Financial; Incredible Technologies; Tony DeLeon and Associates; Interblock; TCS John Huxley; Genesis Gaming Supply; Midwest Game Supply; SG Gaming, and Patriot Gaming, as well as the following casinos: Indiana Grand, Hoosier Park and Ameristar. And, finally, the following sports wagering vendors: Roar Digital and PointsBet.

Each of the aforementioned licensees has submitted a timely request for renewal of his license along with the required payment.

Approving Orders 2021-7 through 2021-11
would have the effect of renewing the license of each of the respective licensees for a period of one year.

Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Dustin.
Any questions for Dustin?

Hearing none, Commissioners, is there a motion to approve Order 2021-7 through 2021-11? COMMISSIONER COHEN: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion that Orders 2021-8 through 2021-11 be adopted -- I'm sorry, 2021-7 through 2021-11. CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: Thank you, sir. Is there a second? COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Second. CHAIRMAN McMAINS: It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-7 through 2021-11.

Any further discussion on the motions? Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Thank you, Dustin.
So next up we will go ahead and welcome
Garth Brown to present permanent licenses to the Commission.

So, Garth.
MR. BROWN: Thank you, Executive Director Tait.

Commissioners and Executive Staff, you have
before you Orders 2021-12 through 2021-15, which would approve permanent supplier licenses for GAN UK Limited, Surveillance Systems Integration, Inc., Sportradar Solutions, LLC, and Amelco UK Limited.

You also have before you Order 2021-16, which would approve the permanent sports wagering vendor license for Penn Sports Interactive, LLC.

All of the applicants have submitted the required applications and received temporary licenses issued by the IGC. Commission staff conducted background and financial investigations on each applicant, along with their substantial owners and key persons. Commission staff found no derogatory information that would negatively affect any of the applicants' suitability. Staff's final reports were included in your confidential Commission meeting documents.

Approving Orders 2021-12 through 16 would grant permanent licenses for the previously mentioned applicants, each subject to yearly renewals.

I'm happy to answer any questions you would have on those.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Garth.

Any questions for Mr. Brown?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I would move the approval of 2021-12 through 16.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you. Second? Sara seconds.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion to approve Orders 2021-12 through 2021-16, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
MR. BROWN: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Sara.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Thank you. And next we will invite Angeline Parshall to present the sports wagering service provider licenses to the Commission.

Angeline.
MS. PARSHALL: Thank you, Executive Director Tait.

Good morning, Commissioners and Executive Staff. You have before you Orders 2021-17 and

2021-18, which would approve the permanent sports wagering service provider licenses for IMG Arena and Genius Sports, respectively.

All of the applicants have submitted the required applications and have received a temporary license issued by the IGC. Commission staff conducted background and financial investigations on each of the applicants, along with their substantial owners and key persons. Commission staff found no derogatory information that would affect the suitability of the applicants. Staff's final reports are included in the confidential Commission meeting documents that have been provided to you.

Approving Orders 2021-17 and 18 will grant a permanent license for each of the previously mentioned applicants.

I'm happy to answer any questions you may have.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Angeline.
Commissioners, any questions?
Hearing none, what is your pleasure?
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a motion to recommend to the Commission approval of Order 2021-17 and 2021-18 as
presented by staff.
COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-17 and 2021-18.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing one, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

I think I got turned around.
Hearing no further discussion, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Thank you, folks.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: So next we will move on to disciplinary actions, so Angela Bunton, if you would like to present those to the Commission.

MS. BUNTON: Good afternoon, Commissioners and Executive Staff.

You have before you four settlement agreements concerning disciplinary actions against licensed suppliers; twelve settlement agreements concerning disciplinary action against casinos; one disciplinary action against
corporate; and nine settlement agreements concerning disciplinary actions against sports wagering operators.

Order 2021-19 is a settlement agreement with Everi Payments totaling $\$ 3,000$.

Order 2021-20 is a settlement agreement with NeoGames Solutions totaling \$2,500.

Order 2021-21 is a settlement agreement with NRT Technology totaling $\$ 3,000$.

Orders 2021-22 and Order 2021-23 have been withdrawn.

Order 2021-24 is a settlement agreement with Surveillance Systems Integration totaling \$2,500.

Order 2021-25 is a settlement agreement with Ameristar East Chicago totaling \$1,000.

Order 2021-26 is a settlement agreement with Belterra Casino, including two counts, totaling $\$ 3,500$.

Order 2021-27 is a settlement agreement with Blue Chip Casino, including four counts, totaling \$7,500.

Order 2021-28 is a settlement agreement with French Lick Resort Casino totaling $\$ 2,000$.

Order 2021-29 is a settlement agreement with Hollywood Casino, including seven counts,
totaling $\$ 41,500$ and the submission of a corrective action plan for count seven of the settlement agreement.

Order 2021-30 is a settlement agreement with Hoosier Park, including five counts, totaling \$9,500.

Order 2021-31 is a settlement agreement with Horseshoe Hammond, including four counts, totaling $\$ 108,000$ and the submission of $a$ corrective action plan for count three of the settlement agreement.

Order 2021-32 is a settlement agreement with Caesars Southern Indiana, including six counts, totaling $\$ 21,500$.

Order 2021-33 is a settlement agreement with Indiana Grand, including five counts, totaling $\$ 23,500$.

Order 2021-34 is a settlement agreement with Majestic Star Casino, including two counts, totaling \$5,000.

Order 2021-35 is a settlement agreement with Rising Star, including three counts, totaling \$9,000.

Order 2021-36 is a settlement agreement with Tropicana Evansville, including two counts,
totaling \$4,000.
Order 2021-37 is a settlement agreement with Caesars Holdings, including three counts, totaling $\$ 6,500$.

Order 2021-38 is a settlement agreement with Churchill Downs Interactive Gaming, including two counts, totaling $\$ 2,500$.

Order 2021-39 is a settlement agreement with DraftKings, including three counts, totaling \$6, 000 .

Order 2021-40 is a settlement agreement with PointsBet Indiana totaling $\$ 4,000$.

Order 2021-41 is a settlement agreement with Roar Digital, including two counts, totaling $\$ 5,500$.

Order 2021-42 is a settlement agreement with Rush Street Interactive, including two counts, totaling \$9,500.

Order 2021-43 is a settlement agreement with Unibet Indiana totaling \$3,500.

Order 2021-44 is a settlement agreement with the off-track betting facility Winner's Circle Clarksville, including three counts, totaling $\$ 47,500$.

Order 2021-45 is a settlement agreement with
the off-track betting facility Winner's Circle Indianapolis totaling $\$ 1,000$.

Order 2021-46 is a settlement agreement with the off-track betting facility Winner's Circle New Haven totaling $\$ 1,500$.

Relevant details for each settlement agreement have been provided in your meeting materials. Details on the settlement agreements will also be available on the Commission's website following the meeting.

Mr. Chair, this concludes my presentation.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: And, Mr. -- thank you, Angie.

Mr. Chairman, if it -- if the Commission is inclined, I'm happy to invite the general manager of Horseshoe Hammond, Kathryn Jenkins, to address the Commission regarding count three of Order 2021-31 before you all take action.

Is that the will of the Commission?
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Yeah, okay. So, Kathryn, I'll go ahead -- or, Commissioners, do you want to invite Kathryn to address you first or would you like to ask her questions?

Susan, you are muted.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Why don't you ask her if she has any remarks, Sara.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Okay. So, Kathryn, if you have opening remarks, please go ahead.

MS. JENKINS: Okay. Thank you. So, yes, we are very sorry about the -- about the underage incident that we had.

In 2017 we invested in Veridocs, which is an identification validation system, and we have been without incident since 2018.

We did have a young man who had a fake ID that was a really good fake ID who was able to enter the casino. I wanted to let you know that Veridocs is not a foolproof system. About 3 percent of all IDs are rejected by Veridocs. It could be something of a scratch on the bar code, it could be a bent, it could be any -- any number of things that would make it fail. So then our policy, our proof process was for us to dip it twice and then the security officer checks out the ID to make sure that it's valid and then makes the decision whether or not to allow access.

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What we've done since we've had -- the day
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we found out about the underage getting into the casino, we immediately changed our process, this was on November 28th, to require that a manager or supervisor come and check that ID themselves to then allow access.

Since then, in March we decided to change it so now anybody that appears to be under the age of 30 who fails Veridocs will not be allowed in regardless of anybody on the property's decision. The only person that can allow access would be a gaming control officer who is on site.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Ms. Jenkins.
I have one question. Is it likely that you have other folks that have slipped through this system that you're aware of?

MS. JENKINS: My hope is no. I can't -- I can't really speak to it. If we knew it, we would certainly report it.

Again, it's not foolproof. When -- when Veridocs denies it and then a security officer looks at it, it's no different than many properties who don't have Veridocs that just do a visual inspection of the identification, so I can't speak to whether or not it's happened. I do believe in human error, but I know we do
everything we can to ensure that we just allow people that are of age on property.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I have a question for Ms. Jenkins.

I'm not sure I understood what you said. I thought you said that the fake ID was good and -and the young man got through the system, but then it was my understanding that he didn't get through the system, that he was allowed in by your officer and I -- multiple times, I believe; is that correct?

MS. JENKINS: Yes. Yes. He failed the Veridocs system and then he passed our process, so what happens after they dip the ID, they have to ask questions and visually inspect the identification. Then he was allowed access to the property.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: And I would like for you to verify how this got caught, because obviously it didn't get caught within your system.

MS. JENKINS: Yes. It got caught in Illinois. The Gaming Control Board in Illinois, an officer inspected the ID and the officer realized it was fake and called the IGC.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: And so you've got a new system in place that you are confident will avoid this kind of problem?

MS. JENKINS: Yes. Anybody that appears to be under the age of 30 that does not -- their ID does not pass the Veridocs system will automatically be turned away, so we won't even have the opportunity for human error there unless an IGC officer wants to approve access, so they would have to inspect the ID and then allow special access for that one particular person, so anyone under the age of 30 that doesn't pass will not be walking through our doors.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: And that's someone that visually appears to be under the age of 30 ; is that right?

MS. JENKINS: Correct.
COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Does that satisfy the staff's concerns?

MS. JENKINS: I would like to add that we're one of the only -- not every property has a system at all, so they're just -- just visually inspected, so we do have one extra step that other properties may not have, and taking that extra step to ensure that we do not allow
underage, and so I feel like we have one extra step rather than just visual inspection.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Angie, when I was listening to your presentation, you indicated that a corrective action plan. Has staff received that yet or is it still forthcoming?

MS. BUNTON: It's still forthcoming. I usually give them a couple weeks after the approval of the order.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Okay. So, Kathryn, you all will be submitting the corrective action plan, putting in writing your new policy. IGC staff will have an opportunity to review that. And, Commissioner Williams, we're happy to keep you in the loop regarding that process and a review of that submission. MS. JENKINS: All right. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER FINE: Can I ask one follow-up question? So I want to understand this. So you have a piece of technology to identify when IDs are not true, not valid, and when that happens, then you allow an individual to override the technology.

MS. JENKINS: Yes. Yes.
COMMISSIONER FINE: Why would you do that?

I mean, why wouldn't you just let your technology work and move on?

MS. JENKINS: So it's not a foolproof system. For instance, my ID right now happens to be bent and so the stamp, the bar code is not reading correctly, so $I$ would not pass.

COMMISSIONER FINE: Do you have another ID?
I mean, it seems like you have the technology but you're not using it, so you're letting -- you're letting the system fail.

MS. JENKINS: I don't know that $I$ agree with that. We run it, and then we have another step, another process in place where we visually inspect the identification, so, again, not every ID will pass, so 97 percent pass, 3 percent don't. And some of those can be for various reasons. It could be dirty, it could be -- it could be rubbed off on the back, so if a seven-year-old walks in and it didn't pass and we visually inspect the ID and the person appears to be of age, then we would make a decision whether to let them into the casino (audio glitch). CHAIRMAN McMAINS: If you're not speaking, please mute your microphones. MS. JENKINS: Does that make sense?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Have we taken action on the young man with the fake ID? Has he been excluded and all that's done?

MS. JENKINS: Yes, there's a criminal investigation that was processed with the IGC. That's the information $I$ have now. I believe something happened in Illinois as well. He's been -- we're trying to figure out how to eighty-six somebody that's underage from our property, but we'll make sure that he's -- he's within the process that we're able to do.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman --
COMMISSIONER COHEN: I have a question for Ms. Jenkins. For the 97 percent that do pass the Veridocs system, what additional steps are taken to -- in your process to make sure that person is using their true and proper identification, not a fraudulent, forged or someone else's identification?

MS. JENKINS: That's a great question. There's a visual inspection of the ID upon arrival, just as -- just as you would do if they were entering a nightclub or anything else, so we -- we check the ID, run it through the system, look at the ID and then allow them access.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Ms. Jenkins, what kind of training do the security personnel receive on ID review or identifying that potential IDs may not be before even the Veridocs, or if the Veridocs wasn't working, you mentioned there's the visual inspection, what kind of training, either initially or ongoing, is conducted in order to ensure that they're up to speed on ID -fraudulent IDs that might be out there?

MS. JENKINS: Yeah, absolutely. We have actually really great training processes in place. And just to let you all know, we're running everybody through yet another advanced process -- or another advanced training. I'm going to -- let me look at my notes real quick. I have it written down for you guys. One second.

I can send you the exact training if you'd like, but there's a -- there's a book we can access that the security officers all have in place and then they go through what each ID looks like, what to look for as far as the -- the markings and all of that.

Now, I did talk to our gaming enforcement officer here, they have something, a black light, which we're also going to provide to all of our
security officers at the podium so they can look for any water marks. He also looks at -- so Molina, our officer, looks at microprinting, which $I$ guess is like a -- like a magnifying glass. I think that would be a bit much to put on a security officer. However, if we have anybody that we're that concerned about, we'll call our officer to go into that level of detail. CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Sara, when corrective measures are put on paper and -- and gotten to Angela and the Commission, could you distribute those to the Commissioners, please?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Sure, I'd be happy to.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Any further questions, Commissioners, for Ms. Jenkins?

Thank you, Ms. Jenkins. MS. JENKINS: Thank you. CHAIRMAN McMAINS: I have one for Angela. Angela, I understand that Orders 22 and 23 were withdrawn, is that correct, of the original agenda?

MS. BUNTON: Yes, that's correct. CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Okay. Commissioners, any
other questions for Angela on her presentation?
Hearing none, is there a motion to approve Orders 19 -- 2021-19 through 21 and Orders 2021-24 through 46?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: So moved,
Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Second?
COMMISSIONER COHEN: Second.
CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: Thank you.
All in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
Thanks, Angela.
MS. BUNTON: Thank you.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Thanks, Angie.
So before I invite Greg to present the next order, I would like to offer the Commissioners a little bit of context about the settlement agreement, as I believe it's one of the more important ones that we have entered into during my tenure.

Regarding the Spectacle investigation, it's
ongoing. As noted previously, staff was pleased that the remaining parties were able to alleviate our most pressing concerns, but I'm disappointed it was after many months of very significant pressure, and, frankly, an embarrassing display at our December meeting.

Much is still unknown. Both Spectacle and Lucy Luck know the concerns of IGC staff and the continued risks that could impact suitability. I am hopeful that we are entering a stage following many dark months where we're moving forward, and I am hopeful that the parties later today will provide the Commission with assurances regarding that path.

However, with that being said, staff still believed it was essential to address one violation by Spectacle Entertainment. And before you is an agreed-to settlement on that one violation alone. Staff retains all ability to take action regarding our past or future findings. But, never has a casino owner's licensee failed to comply with a Commission order. Specifically, an order issued by you in December was not complied with for 53 days. If this was left unaddressed, we would be sending a
dangerous message to not only the public but also to our other licensees that we regulate.

I'm very proud of staff and the Commission's efforts to uphold our key statutory tenet to ensure integrity of gaming in Indiana, and that cannot be effectively done without the strict regulation.

So with those comments, I'll invite Greg to present order 2021-47.

MR. SMALL: Thank you, Executive Director Tait.

And, Commissioners, before you is Order 2021-47. On December 23, 2020, the Commission -the Commission issued Order 2020-168 whereby Spectacle Entertainment Group, LLC, and Mr. Roderick Ratcliff were ordered by the Commission to remove Mr. Ratcliff individually and as trustee of his trust from the ability to exercise control, management or voting related to Spectacle, including amending the trust agreement by replacing the current trustee with a person acceptable to the Commission.

Order 2020-168 became effective on January 8, 2021. Spectacle failed to ensure that all parties to Order 2020-168 complied with all
the requirements of that order.
Thereafter, on February 24, 2021, Spectacle was able to reach the agreements necessary to complete the disassociation of Mr. Ratcliff from Spectacle.

On March 2, 2021, the Commission issued Order 2021-1, which approved the transfers of ownership interest in Spectacle and the disassociation of Mr. Ratcliff. Fifty-three days had elapsed before Spectacle and Ratcliff came into compliance with Order 2020-168.

Spectacle has agreed to a settlement in the amount of $\$ 530,000$.

Thank you, Commissioners.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Greg.
Any questions for Sara or Greg?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion that the Commission approve Order 2021-47 as provided by staff.

COMMISSIONER FINE: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, gentlemen.
It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Order 2021-47.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying sye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Mr. Small.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: I'm going to go ahead and invite Dustin back up to present regarding occupational licensees.

Dustin.
MR. MOLOY: Thank you.
Commissioners, you have before you Orders 2021-48 through 2021-57.

Orders 21 -- 2021-48 through 2021-54 concern settlement agreements reached between Commission staff and occupational licensees where the licensee agreed to an unpaid voluntary relinquishment of his or her license in lieu of further disciplinary action.

Approving these orders would have the effect of ratifying the settlement agreement entered into by the parties. Orders 2021-55 through 2021-57 would deny
applications for occupational licenses to work in Indiana casinos. With respect to these orders, each applicant failed to disclose his or her complete criminal history, thus failing to meet the established standards for licensure. Each applicant was given an opportunity to withdraw his or her application from consideration for permanent licensure, but failed to do so.

Detailed information regarding these orders is contained in the confidential materials provided to you.

If you have any questions regarding these orders, I'll be happy to answer them.

Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Dustin.
Any questions for Dustin?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

The Chairman moves to approve Orders 2021-48 through 2021-54.

COMMISSIONER FINE: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-48 through 2021-54.

Any further discussion on the motion?

Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
MR. MOLOY: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: You're up, Dustin.
MR. MOLOY: Continuing on here. Good afternoon, Commissioners, again. You have before you Order 2021-58 concerning a felony waiver application submitted by David Rohrer.

After the application was received, a hearing was conducted --

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Hey, Dustin, sorry. Let's pause really quick. So your presentation previously, did that include -- that included Orders 2021-55 through 57; correct?

MR. MOLOY: That was 2021-48 through 2021-57.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Okay. So, Commissioners, I think you need to entertain an order to approve Orders 2021-55 through 57 as well before we move on to the felony waiver. CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Sara. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Yeah.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Commissioners, is there a motion to approve Orders 2021 -- should that be 2020 or 2021, Sara?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: 2021, sorry.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: I'm sorry. An order to -- is there a motion to approve Orders 2021-55 through 2021-57?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: So moved.
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: So moved.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-55 through 2021-57.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
The motion carries unanimously.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Okay. Now you can
go, Dustin, to the next one.
MR. MOLOY: Okay. Thank you. Moving on to our felony waiver application.

Commissioners, you have before you Order 2021-58 concerning a felony waiver application received from David Rohrer.

After the application was received, a hearing was conducted and then a Commission attorney prepared Findings of Fact and Recommendation.

Additionally, through the delegation of authority found in Resolution 2020-83, Executive Director Tait issued Mr. Rohrer an interim felony waiver, allowing him to serve as a level three occupational licensee to work as a maintenance worker at Hollywood Casino.

Approving Order 2021-58 would have the effect of adopting the review officer's Finding of Fact and Recommendation and approve Mr. Rohrer's felony waiver request.

This concludes my presentation. Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Dustin.
Any questions for Dustin?
Hearing none, what is your pleasure, Commissioners?

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion to accept Order 2021-58 as presented by staff.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.
CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: Thank you.
It's been properly moved and seconded to
approve Order 2021-58.
Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
The motion carries unanimously.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Thank you, Dustin. You guys are all getting a glimpse into Greg's life with Sara, that I'm going to chime in before he presents the next order again.

So during my tenure, we have worked to identify rules deemed to be obsolete or unnecessary or overly burdensome. As risk-based regulators, we are also charged with remaining watchful of threats to the regulatory environment that could serve to undermine the integrity of gaming in Indiana.

So the proposed emergency rules which Greg will present to you momentarily are a reform package designed to enhance the public's trust in the industry through increased public disclosure of information regarding casino ownership, updated thresholds for when licensing is required, and more clear guidelines for reporting
material information to the IGC for those who perhaps need assistance in being more mindful of the high standards of disclosure upon which their suitability for licensure is dependent.

With the passage of this reform package, additional areas of regulation will also ensure greater accountability with regard to financial transactions, particularly those including currency, ordered divestitures and lobbying contracts.

The increased reporting and new procedures will enhance transparency and promote public confidence. The reform package also addresses other areas as well.

During the course of our review, we consulted with other gaming jurisdictions, and this set of rules includes provisions that are already industry standards. As is our practice, I offered the industry the ability to review these rules and offer feedback. Several operators and applicants offered support for this initiative, as well as very helpful feedback and clarifying language, which were incorporated into the document before you for approval today.

So, Greg, I will invite you to go ahead and
present Resolution 2021-59.
MR. SMALL: Thank you very much. And I have pretty short work to do here then.

Commissioners, before you is Resolution 2021-59. Pursuant to IC 4-33-4, 4-35-4 and 4-22-2-37.1, the Commission has the authority to adopt emergency rules. The Commission is authorized to adopt emergency rules if the Commission determines that the need for a rule is so immediate and substantial that rulemaking procedures under 4-22-2-13 and 4-22-2-36 are inadequate to address that need and that the emergency rule is likely to address that need.

In order for the Commission to fulfill its responsibilities under 4-33-4, 4-35-4 and 68 IAC, measures to enhance the accountability of privately held companies must be executed immediately. The Commission has also identified a number of rules applicable to all casino licensees that will likewise serve to support the integrity of the industry. The emergency rules cover those areas as well.

Approval of Resolution 2021-59 would have the effect of adopting the emergency rule. The rule will be effective for 90 days.

We've also included a signature page that would allow the rule to be extended for an additional 90 days, for a 180 day total. The emergency rule would become effective upon acceptance by the publisher for filing, if approved. And staff would begin working on promulgation of a permanent rule thereafter.

If the Commissioners have any questions, I'm happy to answer them. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Greg.
I might say that $I$ think this is a nice piece of legal work, Greg, nice job, and, Sara, appreciate you -- you folks giving attention to this matter.

Commissioners, any questions for Greg or Sara regarding this resolution?

Hearing none, what is your pleasure, Commissioners?

COMMISSIONER COHEN: Mr. Chairman, I move that Resolution 2021-59 be approved.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: So moved -- or seconded, sorry.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Resolution 2021-59.

Any further discussion on the motion?

Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
MR. SMALL: Thank you.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: All right. So Dustin $I$ think has the remaining agenda items, so if you want to begin with the transfers of ownership.

MR. MOLOY: Sure thing. Thank you.
Commissioners, you have three orders in front of you, 2021-60, 2021-61 and 2021-62.

Order 2021-60 and 61 involves an ownership transfer request between Indiana licensees Novomatic Americas Sales and Ainsworth Gaming Technology.

After receiving the transfer application, the Commission completed a background and financial investigation of both entities and relevant shareholders, finding that all were substantially compliant with Indiana statutes and regulations, and also finding no derogatory information that would affect any party's suitability for holding the interest in Novomatic
and Ainsworth.
Approving Order 2021-60 and Order 2021-61 would have the effect of approving the ownership transfer of Novomatic and Ainsworth.

I'll go ahead and continue with the other transfer application we received.

Order 2021-62 involves an ownership transfer request between Indiana licensees William Hill, PLC, and Caesars Entertainment, Inc. After receiving the transfer application, the Commission completed a background and financial investigation of Caesars, finding that it was substantially compliant with Indiana statutes and regulations, and also finding no derogatory information that would affect Caesars' suitability for holding the interest in William Hill.

Approving Order 2021-62 would have the effect of approving the ownership transfer of William Hill to Caesars.

If you have any questions on these transfers, I'd be happy to answer them. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Any questions for Dustin on Orders 2021-60
through 2021-62?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure?

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, I make a motion the Commission approve Orders 2021-60 and 61 and 2021-62 as presented by staff.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Commissioners.
It's been properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-60 through 2021-62.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
MR. MOLOY: Thank you.
For our last two orders, they involve casino financing, so you have before you Orders 2021-63 and 2021-64 which concerns separate requests from Full House Resorts and Boyd Gaming, respectively, for approval of proposed financing transactions.

In addition to seeking permission to act on the proposed financial transactions, both Full House and Boyd requested a waiver of 68 IAC's
so-called two meeting requirement in accordance with the Commission's authority pursuant to Resolution 2017-109.

The confidential details of the proposed financial transactions as well as Commission staff's analysis were provided to the Commissioners in their confidential materials.

In accordance with the procedures identified in Resolution 2017-109, Full House received interim approval on January 1, 2021, and Boyd received interim approval on March 10, 2021.

The interim approvals each contained the following provisions:

First, the terms articulated in the final financing documentation do not materially differ from the terms that were presented in writing for approval.

Second, the terms within the final documentation do not violate IC 4-33 or IC 4-35.

Third, each entity must provide the Commission with a legal opinion demonstrating compliance with IC 4-33 and 4-35.

Finally, the entities must close on all proposed financing before March 31, 2021.

Resolution 2017-109 requires that the
interim approval be reported to the Commission for final consideration or ratification or other direction.

If you have any questions regarding these matters, I'll be happy to answer them. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Dustin.
Any questions for Dustin, Commissioners? COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, if I may.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Dustin, with regard to the -- the Boyd and the Full House financing, I noticed there were mentions of LIBOR, and that is potentially going away, I believe it's in maybe two or three years, as an interest rate measure in some of these deals.

Do we know if the two entities have included language that will replace LIBOR once that goes away?

I know there's been some discussion at least in the financial markets to -- any new deals that are going on, to try to avoid LIBOR and other indices to use when it comes to interest rates.

Do you know if they have any language in
those agreements that will replace LIBOR, or would they get to that issue further down the road once LIBOR is discontinued?

MR. MOLOY: Yeah, commissioners, it's my understanding that they will get to that issue down the road. I would defer to Danielle Leek, the financial and background investigator who worked on this issue. I don't know if she is available at this meeting. But that is something that we could certainly look into and supply supplemental materials for your review if you'd like.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Yeah, if there's not anybody here, that's fine, just kind of thinking about that as that indice will be -- or that rate setting indice will be replaced in the near future. So yes, to follow up, that's fine. Just kind of wondering as those new deals occur, how that's being handled.

MR. SMALL: Commissioner Dudich, that's a great question and we will follow up on that and provide information to you.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Thank you both. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

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        CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, sir.
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Any further questions for Dustin?
Hearing none, Commissioners, what is your pleasure with regard to Orders 2021-63 and 2021-64?

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I move to approve 2021-63 and 4.

COMMISSIONER COHEN: Second.
COMMISSIONER FINE: Second.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, folks. It's properly moved and seconded to approve Orders 2021-63 and 2021-64.

Any further discussion on the motion?
Hearing none, all in favor of the motion, please signify by saying aye.
(Chorus of ayes.)
Opposed.
Motion carries unanimously.
MR. MOLOY: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you.
Mrs. Tait.
MS. RESKE: Mr. Chair, Sara's had a little bit of technical difficulties, she lost her connection, so I'm happy to do her part to keep things moving along.

The last item we have is actually a
presentation from the Spectacle Gary and Lucy Luck group. So hopefully we can get them situated so they can go ahead and make their presentation.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Ms. Reske, while they're getting ready, I think we agreed to allow a representative of a union to speak for two minutes; is that correct?

MS. RESKE: That's correct.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Okay. Shall we do that now?

MS. RESKE: Yes, I think that'd be great.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Okay. Let's do that now. Is the representative here?

MR. SMALL: Ms. Nalls, are you available?
MS. NALLS: Yes, I am.
MR. SMALL: Okay. Thank you very much. Please, Mr. Chair, go ahead.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Ms. Nalls, we'll be glad to hear your comments, and we ask that you keep your comments to two minutes, please.

MS. NALLS: Okay. Well, thank you so much.
Good afternoon. My name is Kasey Nalls.
I've been a server at Majestic Star Casino for 15 years. I'm here to speak to you because I and 25
of my co-workers at Majestic Star will lose our jobs on March 30, 2021, if we are not brought back to work or given an extension of our rights to return to work.

It is my understanding that Indiana's 2019 gaming legislation allowed for an inland casino as long as each Majestic Star Casino employee would be transferred over to the new Hard Rock Northern Indiana.

I'm not a lawyer, but this is what the law says: Each employee employed at the riverboat shall be offered a similar position at the inland casino -- at the inland location.

Majestic Star is now telling me and other employees who have been laid off due to the pandemic that we will not be transferred automatically to the Hard Rock and that we have to reapply for our jobs at the new facility.

It's not fair that this pandemic, this tragedy, is used as a loophole to be able to fire me and my co-workers. My co-workers and I have made many sacrifices and spent many holidays at this casino to provide for our loved ones.

Instead of telling us to reapply for our jobs, Majestic Star should recognize our years of
dedication by guaranteeing that we can come back to work.

Please support us and tell Majestic Star to extend our recall rights so that we don't lose our jobs on March 30, 2021.

Thank you so much for your time.
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, ma'am.
Appreciate your comments.
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Mr. Chairman, this is Sara. I was able to join by phone.

So, you know, next on the agenda is a presentation by both Spectacle Gary as well as Lucy Luck. I don't know who wants to start things off from -- from those individuals or if anybody wants to take a moment to address Ms. Nalls' comments to the Commission as well, so Jahnae or Mr. -- Greg, does anybody want to go first?

MR. GIBSON: Yeah, I'm here, Sara. It's Greg.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Okay. We will go ahead and turn it over to you, Greg.

MR. GIBSON: Okay. Thank you.
I'd like to open our presentation this afternoon by first thanking Chairman McMains and
the members of the Indiana Gaming Commission.
I'd also like to thank Executive Director Tait, Deputy Director Reske and Counsel Greg Small.

The last year has been tough for many, including and especially the hospitality and gaming industries. We've all been faced with tough decisions, and those serving in leadership have certainly been faced with the unexpected. For that and (audio glitch) thank you for your help and guidance.

I'm pleased to be here today with my partners from Hard Rock International and leadership from the cities of Gary and Terre Haute to update you on the Hard Rock Northern Indiana and the Rocksino Terre Haute projects.

I'd like to acknowledge our speakers in advance to keep the presentation moving efficiently. Today you will hear from Jim Allen, chairman of Hard Rock International; Jon Lucas, the chief operating officer of Hard Rock; Senator Eddie Melton, representing Gary; Mayor Jerome Prince from the City of Gary; State

Representative Alan Morrison representing

Terre Haute; and Mayor Duke Bennett of Terre Haute.

It's no secret that these projects have been on a unique and transparent journey. Many have been anxiously following our progress, our hiccups and our hurdles, and now our path forward. We have certainly had our ups and downs. Things have seemed to jump between crisis and celebration.

Well, today we believe is a time for celebration. We're here together to offer an update, not only to the Commission, but to the entire state on two important projects with a total value of over half a billion dollars. Projects like these don't come along often, and we're ready to show how Indiana investors and an international corporate brand can collaborate to bring these fantastic facilities to the State of Indiana.

With that, it's my pleasure to introduce my partner, Jim Allen, of Hard Rock International.

MR. LUCAS: This is Jon Lucas, chief operating officer. Unfortunately Jim was stuck in a meeting with the State of Florida, the governor and the legislature, so I apologize on
his behalf. He had intended to be here to talk to you all, but.

Good afternoon, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners, Executive Staff. We appreciate this opportunity to be before you, as Greg said, to talk about these exciting new projects. We want to focus on what we're doing going forward and share some information with you, but we are extremely excited about the future in Indiana and working with the State and the Commission and the local communities that we'll be in.

We anticipate a great partnership with Spectacle Entertainment. Certainly Greg Gibson and I have worked very closely over the last year to move this thing forward, and as Greg said, there's certainly been a few speed bumps along the way, but we believe they're behind us now.

As Executive Director Tait mentioned, I was going to talk a little bit about some dates for grand opening, and I know she didn't want to steal my thunder, but after discussions and consultation with Executive Director Tait, she assured me that the staff was ready, willing and able to assist us and achieve these dates, so we are in a position now to present those dates.

Our schedule is friends and family event with practice on May 11th, that's Tuesday, May 11th.

We'll be dark on May 12th in anticipation or to save a date in case there's some things we need to iron out or work through.

We'll do a VIP invitation-only event on May 13th. Then we'll do a guitar smash, which is our traditional ribbon cutting in the Hard Rock world; a media event May 14th, Friday, at 10 a.m., and we'll have a grand opening to the public 5 p.m. on May 14th.

And with that, I'd like to share a few photos that we have that we wanted to share with you and invite the Commissioners and the Executive Staff, if anybody wants to come by for a tour, we'll gladly do that. Our property president, Matt Schuffert, will gladly assist and share it.

I know we took Senator Melton, who's going to be speaking here shortly, through the facility last Friday. We are really moving along.

This is a picture of the front entrance. On the -- if you could back up one, yeah. On the right is a picture of the casino floor with the
tables set in place.
Move to the next slide. Here is the pictures of the buffet.

Can we go to the next slide. That's just a couple of pictures.

One thing that we wanted to assure the Commission and the staff is that we as a company, Hard Rock, have a culture of compliance and we're committed to addressing any Indiana Gaming Commission concerns and issues that -- regarding compliance and governance.

We have prepared a separate package that has in detail our policies, our procedures, our internal controls, our training guidelines and protocols as they relate to compliance and corporate governance, and many have been submitted to the Commission already. Those that haven't will be submitted shortly. And we assure you that we will have all pieces in place to establish a culture of compliance and regulatory and governmental adherence.

With that, I would like to turn it over to Jahnae Erpenbach, the chair and CEO for Spectacle Entertainment.

MR. GIBSON: Commission members, you can all
see that after hearing about Hard Rock's culture of compliance, why we sought out a partner like Hard Rock. The integrity of their compliance and ethical business practices offer a platform for a partnership and a brand that we are proud to bring to the State of Indiana. Both Spectacle Entertainment and Lucy Luck Gaming want to share these core values, and we believe they'll serve as a key component to our partnership now and on into the future.

With that, I'd like to introduce Senator Eddie Melton, representing the City of Gary.

SENATOR MELTON: Thank you. And thank you, Mr. Chairman and the members of the Commission, for allowing me to present to you today. It is truly an honor and a pleasure.

Well, as State Senator of Gary, I'm pleased to let you know that my community is extremely excited for the future of Hard Rock Northern Indiana and the project itself. It seems like it was just yesterday when we were here in the statehouse passing legislation for this actual project itself.

Although many have not been able to see the inside like many of us, the exterior details have
left many awaiting the positive outcome on what has to come. And there's certainly a great amount of anticipation.

I've had the opportunity to work with Spectacle over the years for some time now and I've been extremely pleased with the commitments they've had and continue to make by bettering Gary and the region and engaging employees and leadership team on boards of directors of nonprofits and making sure that that true support of good corporate citizenship is there.

And as we look to the future, I'm excited to explore new ideas as well about their partnership with the community and the state as we move forward.

I'm also looking forward to getting to know Hard Rock more and exploring ways the brand will help elevate part of this state.

During the legislative process, asking for the ability to move the license to a more productive location, I was encouraged by my colleagues in their action to help Gary move forward. This was an extremely important piece of legislation in 2019.

I do believe, along with my colleagues, this
project will not only be a positive attribute for my community but a game changer.

It's always been my hope that we continue to build off this project and not only grow the development of the footprint of Hard Rock Casino, but also look at the untapped resources within the Buffington Harbor area where Majestic Star Casino currently sits and utilizing that as more of a logistics park or light manufacturing, industrial work to grow the economic development in the City of Gary.

Although we're excited about the future, I have to acknowledge the trades unions as well and their hard work to keep this project on task, over $\$ 300$ million of project. That's significant and meaningful, that is going into investment in this community, but $I$ also want to go and acknowledge that $I$ have been working with Spectacle in ensuring that the workers that were laid off are starting to return back. I want to acknowledge Ms. Nalls and her remarks, and I agree, that that legislation, that language was written into State statute to ensure that those workers would go to the new facility, so I'm hoping that those remaining few workers, I
believe we started around 80 or so that were laid off and got that number down to about 20 plus, so I'm optimistic that something will be worked out hopefully in the near future.

So with that being said, I just want to say thank you. I'm sure you probably can hear in the background, we're still in session. I have to run back on the Senate floor, but I definitely wanted to come and show my support, my community's support for this new growth and opportunity and partnership with Spectacle and Hard Rock.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Senator
Melton.
SENATOR MELTON: Thank you.
MR. GIBSON: With that, I'd like to now introduce the Mayor of the City of Gary, Jerome Prince.

MAYOR PRINCE: Thank you. And thank you to everyone. Actually, $I$ want to start by thanking the members of the Commission and everyone who's in attendance before, but $I$ also want to voice my appreciation to the Commission particularly as you set forth in some pretty challenging work over the last few months, anyway, to keep the
project on track, and to that, we're extremely appreciative, and we certainly appreciate and respect the fact that you wanted to make sure that the interests of all parties are -- are protected, and that certainly includes the City of Gary.

You know, $I$ could speak a lot, and certainly for the sake of time $I$ want to just share some salient points. I'm glad that the Senator was on the conversation this morning, which I believe all of his comments $I$ would agree with a hundred percent, and to that extent, provided an excellent segue for me to just add a few more salient points.

And, you know, although our interests here in the City of Gary we believe is pretty apparent, there are some things that we want to highlight that present our advocacy, I would say, from a greater context.

And, you know, it starts with the catalytic investment of almost half a billion dollars over there in the City of Gary, but including that, there's some very finer points that we certainly are appreciative of, such as the $\$ 52$ million in construction contracts that have been awarded to
companies within Lake County, but certainly the $32,000,000$ of that -- rather, $32,000,000$ has been awarded so far to companies in the city of Gary, and of that total, also, I think $I$ would be remiss if $I$ didn't point out that $25,000,000$ of that goes to state and self-certified women-owned businesses, things that are completely consistent with the objectives of this administration, and certainly goes a long way to help benefit the economy of our city.

But in addition to that, we spoke -- or we heard from Ms. Nalls, who, again, I'm definitely appreciative of the Senator addressing her particular concern, because one of the benefits that we so absolutely receive here would be from an employment perspective. As I understand, there will be 400 to 500 full- and part-time employment opportunities created, and that's in addition to the 1,000 construction jobs that were created as a result of the other thing that $I$ mentioned earlier in terms of the thirty-two million being awarded to Gary contracts and companies for construction.

One other point, and this is certainly beneficial for the City of Gary, is that we will
continue to receive revenue from that operation, but in this instance, no less than six million dollars as a result of the long-standing LDA, but also the opportunity to receive . 5 percent in gross receipts from the new Terre Haute facility. And, again, those things -- or those factors, I believe, are going to help us, as we say in Gary, reimagine our city as a place to work, live and play.

But, lastly, and $I$ certainly don't want to take much of your time, I want to mention another integral part that $I$ think is extremely important, and that's the community engagement that we certainly realize and appreciate it and in many ways benefited from the relationship with Spectacle along that line. Collaboration, as I mentioned earlier, is something that we consider to be an integral part of our city and certainly is in the spirit of reimagining the city.

So far Spectacle has generated over 1,000 -or one hundred thousand, rather, dollars in donations from over ten local community organizations. They've insured that each of the top executive members of their staff -- or their team, rather, join a board of civic organization
groups here and -- on behalf of Spectacle, and we believe that that has provided them an opportunity to develop a fundamental understanding of the community at large, and just extremely important in terms of them becoming part of the fabric of the community.

Some of the organizations, and I'll close with that, that have benefited from that, one that's certainly close to my heart as a veteran, and that would be the Disabled American Veterans, but certainly I'd like to mention on the county perspective or the region, their contributions to the YMCA of Northwest Indiana.

And so, in closing, you know, I think it goes without question saying that we're certainly appreciative and grateful for the relationship that we've had and certainly the presence of Spectacle Entertainment, as well as Hard Rock, and we thank them for their vision and certainly for their commitment to the City of Gary.

I would be remiss at this particular time if I did not mention, again, the Indiana Gaming Commission, who I think has worked tirelessly to make sure that this project gets up and running, but certainly our state leadership, the
leadership of city and county council persons, but most of all, the community at large and the citizens of Gary I think have been tremendous and are prepared to continue to support this development in the hopes that it certainly increases more attention right here in our city.

So, ladies and gentlemen, I thank you for your time this afternoon. Most of all, I thank you for the work that you've done on behalf of the state and certainly here in the city of Gary. Thank you.

MR. GIBSON: Thank you, Mayor. Hard Rock and I both appreciate your help and friendship in this process.

Before I introduce the leadership representing Terre Haute, I'd like to take a quick moment to explain the name change from Spectacle Jack to Lucy Luck.

First, I felt that we needed to alleviate some of the confusion regarding the Spectacle brand. Some of the challenges faced by Spectacle Entertainment were assumed to be hurdles for Spectacle Jack, and that was just not the case.

And, second, maybe more important to me, I was able to give a little attention to my
daughter Lucy Jane.
Both of these projects are extremely important. The possibility of a gaming facility for Terre Haute is what drew me into this venture. I love Terre Haute, and I saw this as an opportunity to bring a transformational project to my community that will cultivate unlimited benefits and help the entire state.

Terre Haute's very excited about this project, and we're moving closer to getting started. We've landed a financing package with five Indiana banks that will bring additional economic value to the project, something that many told us we couldn't accomplish. I'm really excited that we'll be able to work with five financial institutions based in our home state to complete the Terre Haute facility.

As you receive an update from Representative Morrison and Mayor Bennett, please consider Terre Haute's journey and their readiness to celebrate the next phase of this important economic project.

With that, I'll introduce state Representative Alan Morrison.

REPRESENTATIVE MORRISON: Well, good
afternoon, everybody. First, I'd like to thank Executive Director Tait and the Commission members, appreciate this opportunity to be able to talk to you about Terre Haute. And seeing the pictures of the Gary casino gets me really excited about what -- what we're going to see in Terre Haute.

Actually, $I$ think it started back in the $90 s$. West central Indiana has been thinking about a casino in Terre Haute for a long time. And I can remember it was 2014 and $I$ sat in the -- the Office of our Convention and Visitors Bureau, David Patterson, excuse me, and I said we -- we need a casino sitting right here on 46 and 70 . Could you imagine how amazing it would be to see some lights ballyhooing and the excitement of having something that big in west central Indiana. And David said yeah, let's try to do this. This was back in 2014.

And so through the years, I worked with a handful of different people. Senator Ford was extremely important, and he shared a vision. We talked with a lot of our colleagues throughout the legislature. And, obviously, Mr. Greg Gibson
getting involved was a godsend.
And so now we -- we find ourselves here, and in 2019 we were able to pass that legislation and now we are close to the finish line.

The tourism aspect, the proximity of where we are in Terre Haute, west central Indiana, with Illinois being right there as well, we are kind of a hub for west central Indiana and that part -- and eastern Illinois, so it's so important for us to see this project through and ultimately produce what we said we would to the community.

And the community is very, very excited about it. One of the best things about this whole process was watching the Terre Haute community turn out. And -- and it's one thing for the people who are paid to come up here and push for -- excuse me, push for the project, the lobbyists, so to speak, but when the people who actually live in the community come down to the statehouse, turn out, and -- and work for, you know, a piece of legislation is so important, and that's what we saw from the people of Terre Haute.
And it's -- it doesn't -- I don't go very
many days without somebody asking me when is that project going to be done and when are we going to see those lights ballyhooing and a casino in Terre Haute, and I always tell them it's coming soon, we're working hard.

Greg is -- and Lucy Luck are great members and great partners for our community, and so we're looking forward to this project being done pretty quick, really.

I'd also like to thank, and Senator Melton pointed it out, my fellow legislators. No -- no gaming legislation is ever an easy lift, and it was tough. All gaming legislation is tough, and so -- but to get consensus from the -- in the House and the Senate and have the piece of legislation that we did, that we're able to move these two licenses and help our communities out was a great -- a great work of partnership. And it's going to, again, be a great -- a great project at the end of the day.

So thank you very much to all involved. I appreciate the time from the Commission, and I thank you and look forward to seeing you all in Terre Haute at our casino some day.

MR. GIBSON: Thanks, Representative

Morrison. To move along, I'd like to introduce the mayor of Terre Haute, Duke Bennett.

MAYOR BENNETT: Thank you, Greg. First, I'd just like to say good afternoon, everybody, and you know, appreciate the Commissioners and the Executive Staff. This is my second time in front of you, and I appreciate the -- this additional opportunity and just this is -- this project is so critical for our community and it's just exciting to be here today to talk about moving forward.

I want to thank Representative Morrison and Senator Ford and all the others that helped. You know, we spent quite a bit of time at the statehouse and talking to our legislators, knowing that this wasn't going to happen without their support, as Representative Morrison mentioned a few minutes ago. And it was a process. There's no question about that.

And the Gaming Commission did a great job of guiding us, you know, telling us what we needed to do and getting the support of the legislature and getting the governor to sign off on this.

And so now we've kind of been in that mode of what's the next step. Our community is really
transitioning in a lot of different ways. We've got a new convention center coming. Next year it'll be opening. And this casino just adds a whole new component as we look at changing our community, growing our community, continuing to diversify our economy. This is a whole new piece of that, and we eagerly anticipate getting this casino on line.

I would say a day does not go by that somebody doesn't stop me at the store or wherever and say when are they going to break ground on that casino, so I'm excited to be able to know that it's really going to come here very soon.

We had a Terre Haute Is All In campaign that the chamber spearheaded, and with the help of RJL Solutions went out and we got the referendum done, and, you know, you just look back on this and you see all the community support for this project.

Lucy Luck Gaming, in partnership with Hard Rock, has brought their vision to our community, and you can see by our community and the state's hard work that this is going to become a reality very, very soon, and we're grateful for their commitment.

When you look at the economic benefits, $\$ 175$ million construction project, 750 to 1,000 construction jobs, using local union trades, that's a big part of what we're trying to do here. The employment number, six to seven hundred brand-new jobs both full- and part-time, and local workforce development and training that will support and get those folks ready to serve. And the monetary benefit is what really the most important thing that I'm excited about, let alone all the people coming here, but what with the benefit we get out of that, about 4.6 million coming back to local government each year, another 2.6 million that's going to be coming to our school system and our regional development efforts, along with some additional funds for local government, $\$ 2.7$ million going into a community improvement foundation via our local development agreement, and then additional property tax and local option income tax, so when you look at the entire picture, there's so many people that are going to benefit from that locally and at the state level, and so thank you for making this real.

I'm thankful to Greg Gibson. I couldn't say
enough about him. He's such a giver to our community and to the state as a whole. We have a long history of giving back, and he's really stepped out and done something very significant that's going to have an impact for so many years to come, so I thank Greg for that, and thank the Commission once again for their help.

Hard Rock's going to be a major player in this. They're a solid company that's going to deliver a quality product.

And so at the end, $I$ can't say again how excited I am, but the people of our community are excited. We're ready to get going and looking forward to the groundbreaking coming soon. We're excited for Gary, but Terre Haute's now next in line here and we're almost to the finish line.

So thank you for your time, appreciate everything you've done, and we look forward to the future.

MR. GIBSON: Thank you very much, Mayor. Appreciate your comments. We -- just for the Commission members' knowledge, we -- my partners and I hope to choose a groundbreaking date very soon, hopefully maybe at the end of April, so we're working on that right now and excited to
get this project moving forward.
I appreciate you allowing us the time today, and our teams are ready to address any questions that the Commission members may have, and we look forward to the future.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Thank you, Mr. Gibson. Commissioners, what questions might you have for our speakers today?

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, if I may.

Mr. Gibson, thank you for presentation.
Very helpful. In terms of the relationship with Hard Rock and thinking about Terre Haute and -and Gary and Commissioner Gonso's comment -- or, excuse me, Commissioner Tait's comments earlier in the discussion, how's the relationship with Hard Rock and Spectacle going thus far and are you seeing things starting to jell and move forward to allow for that announcement of a groundbreaking and have strong management, just kind of update the Commission on how that relationship is going thus far if you can, sir.

MR. GIBSON: Absolutely. I feel good about that relationship, Commissioner. To be honest, we've gotten along very well through this whole
process. We obviously had the one hurdle we had to get over, and we were dealing with issues with our credit facility and our operating agreements and so there were a few issues there, but I've always gotten along very well with -- with Hard Rock and consider them partners. In fact, Jon Lucas and I have become good friends.

So, you know, I'm very optimistic about the future and moving forward in partnership.

MR. LUCAS: And this is Jon Lucas. I would echo those comments exactly. COMMISSIONER DUDICH: So from your point, Mr. Gibson and Mr. Lucas, you feel that the partnership that is in Gary right now in terms of the management and the coordination between the two entities, you feel that will be mirrored in terms of the relationship potentially in the Terre Haute facility where, again, strong investment, strong communities forged strong management to allow for that facility to be successful.

MR. LUCAS: Again, this is Jon Lucas.
Absolutely. The truth is it'll be an easier transition because, you know, this is an unusual situation that we're dealing with in Gary where
you have a facility that's operating and those people are moving over to the new facility and they kind of have to split their time between the existing facility and as we get closer and closer to the opening, they have to dedicate some of their time there, so it makes probably for some long days and long weeks for those people, but that's the only way it's going to -- both operations are going to be successful. They can't let their guard down at Majestic Star yet. We want to be successful when we open the doors. In Terre Haute we obviously won't have that challenge of trying to operate an existing facility while building a new one. We'll be doing it from the ground up, we'll have a team a hundred percent dedicated to that facility, so we -- we see the Terre Haute project as a little easier hurdle to jump over than Gary and Majestic Star.

And certainly it's not the first time we've done what we're doing in Majestic. We did it up in Ottawa, Canada, but it's a difficult challenge, truthfully.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: One final question. Sorry, Mr. Commissioner. Is -- is there a
management agreement in place between Spectacle and Hard Rock with regard to Terre Haute?

MR. GIBSON: Currently there is not an executed management agreement. Jon and I are working on that agreement right now and hope to have something completed soon. COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS: Mr. Chairman, I am really excited about what I'm hearing about Gary, and that looks like it's well under way.

And obviously in Terre Haute, the political enthusiasm, the community enthusiasm, all of that work has been done. I'm hoping that this relationship in Terre Haute gets formalized very quickly. And it -- it seems to me that that management issue is really a missing piece, and I would hope that by the next meeting, that we have -- we have a signed agreement. I mean, I think it's time. We've been asking for quite some time to get all those ducks in a row, and so for my part, I would be anxious to see that formalized by the time we meet next, which $I$ think is toward the end of May.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Sara, do we have a
license renewal coming up before then?
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: We do. You know, licenses are up for annual renewal. I believe that we issued the license on May 15 th regarding the Vigo County owner's license, so it would be subject to renewal then, so, yeah.

And I just want to also kind of clarify just to make sure everybody's on the same page. With respect to -- to management and casino experience, I think, you know, if I -- if I may speak on behalf of Commissioner Dudich as well as Commissioner Williams, that our concern is that Lucy Luck comply with the rules that have been on the books for 25 years in the state of Indiana, which is you've got to have gaming experience to be an applicant and to move forward with -- with a casino project in Indiana, and so however that's accomplished by Mr. Gibson, whether that's with a management agreement similarly to what he has up in Gary or if there's another way he can -- can meet that requirement in our rules, you know, we would be open to that, so to echo what Commissioner Williams said, you know, perhaps there is, you know, a -- a time frame coming up upon which, you know, Mr. Gibson should
strive to figure out that missing piece that we have before us.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Mr. Gibson.
MR. GIBSON: Director Tait --
CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Mr. Gibson, message received?

MR. GIBSON: Message received. We'll work on that process quickly.

COMMISSIONER DUDICH: Mr. Chairman, if I may. Mr. Gibson, I just want to make sure, you mentioned a groundbreaking date, selecting a groundbreaking date in April.

Kind of thinking about the -- the time frame, you know, renewal in May, announcement of a groundbreaking in April for some future date, I think it -- speaking as a commissioner, just as myself, $I$ think it would be very helpful to -- as you solidify getting closer to that May renewal date and a groundbreaking date, that there be some update on the management discussions, whether it be through Executive Director Tait or whatnot, because $I$ think all of us have been in jobs where there's a great groundbreaking announcement, everybody gets excited, and then something starts to tail off that doesn't allow
for a project to move forward, so I think it'd be helpful if that announcement is made and the excitement around it, as Commissioner Williams said, if there's information that you have or updates that you have that you can pass along to the Commission that says here's where we are in this management discussion, that probably makes us feel a lot more comfortable heading towards that May date that the wheels are moving and that we're getting closer to some type of agreement, so just my experience being in different roles, announcements get made and then some things aren't tied up on the back end, so just whatever additional information or updates you might have, please feel free to pass them along.

MR. GIBSON: Absolutely. We'll definitely do that. We'll keep staff well informed of our progress.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Yeah, and I'll echo that, Commissioner Dudich. Greg's probably sick of -- sick of talking to me at this point, but, you know, staff, and $I$ know the Commission, we are very excited about this project. It is important to the state, it's important to the local community. I agree that some positive
steps have -- have been taken, and I agree that, you know, Greg has all the tools to meet all of the requirements quickly, so staff stands ready to facilitate and continue the open dialogue that we've had with Mr. Gibson this entire time. And I will pass that along to the Commissioners as well.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Mr. Gibson, thank you, sir. Thanks for all you're doing.

MR. GIBSON: Thank you.
CHAIRMAN MCMAINS: Mrs. Tait, any other business to come before the Commission today? EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: Well, we've sort of teased the next meeting. I don't know if we want to announce that since we just settled -settled on a date, if you want to, Mr. Chair, or we can update the website.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: I think we've tentatively agreed to shoot for May the 25th; is that correct?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TAIT: That's correct, yes.

CHAIRMAN McMAINS: Any other comments, Commissioners, before we adjourn today? Well, thank you, staff, Commissioners, and
members of the public for enduring the technical difficulties of these online meetings. They're difficult, obviously.
