These services are arranged on case-by-case basis depending on need, available public transportation, and involvement with services such as Oaklawn mental health and/or Peer Support Professionals. Goshen PD officers are willing to assist with transportation on a case-by-case basis in Elkhart County.

Shelter administrators are working with Oaklawn Psychiatric Center to get all guests assessed and placed on the Coordinated Entry list for Region 2.

The Rescue Mission offers a Warming Shelter at 404 E Washington Blvd which is open to the public from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM, 7 days a week.

Just Neighbors - families who need shelter, call 260.458.9772. Once full, families will be directed to check in at The Rescue Mission between 4:30 PM and 6:30 PM to request emergency overnight services.

St. Joseph Missions Women's Shelter - single unaccompanied women who need shelter, call 260.426.7358 if you are in need of shelter. *Once full, women will be directed to check in at The Rescue Mission between 4:30pm - 6:30pm

*Part-time seasonal staff will be deployed amongst Just Neighbors, St. Joseph Missions Women's Shelter, and The Rescue Mission in order to provide additional bed nights during the Winter Contingency/Emergency Shelter Plan for unsheltered individuals.

The Rescue Mission located at 404 E. Washington Blvd. is offering Emergency Weather Bed Nights when the temperature is below 32 degrees Fahrenheit to men and women who need overnight shelter. Individuals must be at least 18 years of age to receive an Emergency Weather Bed Night. Individuals must be sober when they arrive and not have any active warrants.

If an individual believes they are ineligible for services at The Rescue Mission, they are encouraged to call 260-426-7357 ext. 156 between 2 PM and 3 PM to inquire about their status and explore other short-term options.

This Winter Contingency Plan was created to coordinate the homelessness resources in Region 4 to most effectively serve persons without a home during seasonal inclement weather. This document is meant to serve as a guide to better direct persons in need of these services.

OVERNIGHT SHELTER

Single adult individuals continue to be served by Lafayette Urban Ministry (LUM) and the LUM Emergency Shelter, which provides short-term, overnight shelter, meals, and showers for up to 48 adults each night of the year. Guests may obtain a pass for the overnight shelter when they leave in the morning or from 7-11a M-F in-person at the LUM Office, 420 N 4th Street, Lafayette, IN 47901. Guests are served at the overnight shelter every day from 9p to 7a.

Families with children are served by Family Promise of Greater Lafayette, which is accessible by contacting the Coordinated Entry agency LTHC Homeless Services at 815 North 12th Street, Lafayette, IN 47904. 765-423-4880

LTHC Homeless Services is also able to provide a limited number of overnight crisis beds for persons enrolled in their program, subject to availability.

The Winter Warming Station is scheduled to be open at midnight November 15, 2023 to April 15, 2024 at the LUM Office, 420 N 4th Street, Lafayette, IN 47901. The station is open every day from 9p to 7a and is designed for persons who did not sign up in advance or are not eligible for the LUM Emergency Shelter. The goal of the station is to provide a basic, safe place to warm up. Meals and showers are not provided, but the location is secure and staffed.

DAY SHELTER

LTHC Engagement Center provides day shelter for singles and families that are homeless, including three meals, showers, lockers, case management, employment assistance and other services. The day center is open every day 7a to 6:30p. Those staying at LUM and LTHC shelters are allowed to use the day room as a safe space from 6:30p to 8:30p, but the day-time resources are not available. When temperatures reach 10 degrees, all guests are allowed to access the safe space until 8:30p.

Additional warm locations for persons without a home include:

- NAMI / The Living Room / The Landing
- Recovery Cafe at the Bauer Community Center, 2300 Ferry Street, Lafayette, IN 47905, welcomes persons self-identified as in recovery (any type) Tue, Thur, Sat 10a-2p, and Wed 6-9p. A meal is provided, and peer support specialists are on-site. The membership bar is very low, and admission and meal are free. 764-609-0826

- West Lafayette Public Library, 208 W Columbia St, West Lafayette, IN 47906, does not have limitations on persons using their facility or materials. There is a time limit on the computer lab.
- Tippecanoe County Public Library, 627 South St, Lafayette, IN 47901, has a 2-hour limit on the use of the facility due to COVID-19, as well as a time limit on the computer lab. The library system has several branches for persons with transportation.

Howard County:

- ❖ In Howard County, there are no White Flag Shelters established for severe cold weather conditions. However, several local service providers offer Warming Center hours for unsheltered homeless in the County to utilize. In addition, a Street Outreach team (Helping Our Homies) connects with and provides needed supplies to unsheltered homeless.
- ❖ Who initiates planning efforts for severe weather conditions? The Director of Howard County Department of Emergency Management coordinates with local shelters, police and county law enforcement, and county government offices, including the Parks Department and the Health Department, when temperatures are or are projected to be very low (there is no certain temperature degree that initiates the process). The Director relies on information from the National Weather Center. Unincorporated towns in the county are also notified by Director. Assistance may be needed by not only the unsheltered homeless but citizens who have lost electricity.
- What places have warming center hours?
 - Kokomo Rescue Mission (Will initiate certain extended hours or offer overnight shelter if needed. No screenings and barriers removed unless problems arise)
 - Coordinated Assistance Ministries, Inc. (Will initiate certain extended hours. No screenings and barriers removed unless problems arise)
 - Senior Center located at the Girl Scout building (Warming center hours are typically until 6 pm). Local government is looking into installing a camera so the center can be unmanned and would be monitored by the Parks Department and/or police).
 - Turning Point System of Care has a 24/7 drop in center and will allow unsheltered homeless to stay there during severe cold.
 - The FSA Domestic Violence shelter will also accept homeless during extreme cold if there are beds available.
- ❖ How are unsheltered homeless unwilling to go into shelter assisted? Helping Our Homies provides street outreach in Howard County. They provide needed supplies such as tents, blankets, food, and hygiene items to those in need. When needed, they may be able to assist with a hotel stay.
- Staffing concerns: Shelters report adequate staffing during warming center hours.

- ❖ Supplies needed: If shelters or other community partners providing warming center hours report needing additional supplies such as food, cots, blankets, PPE equipment, etc., the Director of Emergency Management works to coordinate supplying the needs. The County has storage for items.
- Transportation strategies: City Trolley system runs until 6 pm M-F. Other options may be Howard County Connect or the police.
- ❖ How are Warming Center hours advertised? Director of Emergency Management prepares official media release. Information is shared via social media, radio, and emails, including the Region 5 Planning Council on Homelessness email network. Also, information is posted on the City website.
