- The Board approves and governs the Continuum of Care making sure it operates properly








General Overview of CoC

- Vision: The IN BoS CoC's vision is to end chronic homelessness in Indiana.
- Mission: The IN BoS CoC Board of Directors' (Board) mission is to empower communities to end homelessness in Indiana.
- The Point-IN-Time count is a collaborative effort across the entire Indiana Balance of State Continuum of Care. This includes many varied municipalities, counties, agencies, and volunteers.
 - The Indiana Balance of State Continuum of Care contains 91 of the 92 counties in the state (excepting only Marion County)





Changes That Affect Our 2025 Count

Updates to the 2024 Data Standards

- Gender is no longer a required data field
- Sex is the new data point that must be collected starting on 10/01/25

Changes in the Unsheltered Count

- 2024 count was undercounted because some PIT services were not entered properly in HMIS
- IHCDA recorded and double checked all services for this year and the past two years

Unsheltered Chronically Homeless Population

- Previous PIT reports did not produce a number for this subpopulation, thus showing as 0 in previous years
- The issue has been fixed for the 2025 count to better represent this subpopulation. We will be rereleasing 2024 numbers with these corrections.





PIT count growth is consistent with that of neighboring states








Indiana BoS PIT and Indiana Statewide Population Growth

Growth in the PIT count continues to far outpace the overall population growth in Indiana










Indiana BoS PIT Count Changes Over 6 Years




The number of people sleeping in unsheltered locations has more than doubled in the last 6 years






Newly Available Chronically Unsheltered Count Is Rising








Individuals that Experienced Chronic Homelessness as a Percentage of a Region's Total Count








The number of people in emergency shelters has increased by 18.4% between 2019 and 2025















Veteran Status




Barriers to Housing



At 26%, Mental Health continues to be the most reported barrier by people experiencing homelessness








The total Point-IN-Time count increased by 24.5% while the number of people in households without children increased by 20%.






Number of Households

Percentage of People in Households





Households with children represent 10% of the total number of households. However, the people in households with children represent 25% of the total number of people counted.







Vanderburgh is the county with the highest PIT count relative to population density with 269 people experiencing homelessness per 100,000 inhabitants

Housing Inventory Chart Introduction

Housing Inventory Count and Chart

The Housing Inventory Count takes place on the night of the PIT

This count produces the Housing Inventory Chart which is then submitted to HUD RRH and the HIC

RRH beds are a 1:1 to the number of people housed by the project on the night of the count

The utilization rate for these projects will always be 100%





With a total of 9,355 yearround beds, emergency shelter beds make up the majority of project beds








With a total of 312 projects, Emergency Shelter projects make up a majority of all project types











Allen County has the greatest number of transitional housing beds in the BoS










Allen, Lake, Monroe, and Vanderburgh have the greatest number of PSH beds.






Why Beds May Not Be Utilized






Regional Utilization Rate

Of the 16 total regions, 8 have a utilization rate higher than the BoS average


Bed Utilization Rate (ES, TH, PSH)







On the night of the PIT there was an average of 46 available beds across the BoS








Available ES/TH beds

COORDINATED ENTRY





What is Coordinated Entry?

Coordinated Entry (CE) is the path by which people experiencing Category 1 or Category 4 Homelessness can be connected to housing programs.

- Streamlined and organized: It is a process designed to coordinate program participant intake assessment and a provision of referrals in an efficient manner.
- ✓ **Statewide:** It covers the entire BoS CoC (91 counties, divided into 16 regions).
- ✓ Required: It is required by HUD that all agencies with ESG and CoC-funded housing projects use CE.
- ✓ Household-Focused: It puts the needs of the individuals and families at the center of the process.





Introduction to the New Assessment Tool

In 2024, the IN BoS CoC began utilizing its own newly-developed Collaborative Housing Assessment Tool (CHAT) to gauge vulnerability and eligibility through CE. This new assessment is:

- Phased and Progressive Build rapport and collect only the information you need at a given moment
- Strengths-Based and Empowering More participant choice and emphasis on what participants can do to resolve their housing crisis, if possible
- Intentionally-Worded Language matters, so the scripts and questions have been carefully worded
- Data-Reliant Using data-informed decision-making to try and reduce structural gaps for people experiencing homelessness in the CoC

By designing its own process, the IN BoS CoC will be able to evaluate, monitor, and adjust the assessment process to meet the specific needs of Hoosiers experiencing homelessness.






CE (CHAT) Data

Over 8,500 CE Assessments Completed between 7/31/24 and 7/31/25

As of 8/6/25, there were just over 2,550 HH on CE Lists around the BoS

~1,150 HH scored a 12 or higher on the CHAT indicating high vulnerability






Housing Availability in Indiana

In Indiana, the Fair Market Rent (FMR) for a two-bedroom apartment is \$1,153. In order to afford this level of rent and utilities — without paying more than 30% of income on housing — a household must earn \$3,844 monthly or \$46,125 annually. Assuming a 40-hour work week, 52 weeks per year, this level of income translates into an hourly Housing Wage of:








Survival Budget Shortfalls


