But how does that translate to the criminal legal world? The speaker, who has significant experience both as a prosecutor and as a defense attorney, will discuss how negotiations are affected when one side is mandated to turn over all relevant information, both good and bad, and what defense attorneys are focused on when negotiating with prosecutors amongst other issues pertinent to criminal case negotiations. She will further discuss pertinent skills such as effective communication, active listening, and emotional intelligence.
