RE: IPDC's budget request for 2021 session

### Background:

- IPDC went into the last budget session with a state appropriation of \$1,384,572;
- IPDC Board voted that IPDC would pursue a state appropriation increase to sustain the juvenile delinquency project that had been grant funded but had reached the end of the grant term.
- Additionally, the State Budget Agency directed that all agencies add 3% to their budget request to cover salary adjustments. (See Table I)
- Ultimately, IPDC was only appropriated \$1,551,693, which left IPDC \$157,834 short of being able to fund IPDC's juvenile delinquency work. (See Table II)

#### Table I

<u>IPDC Operations</u>: The Council requests a 3.3% increase over its 2018 personal services budget in order to continue its operations with its current staff.

# Recommendation for 2020 session budget request:

Indiana's state finances have been negatively impacted by Covid-19. Indiana's April revenue fell nearly a billion dollars below budget projections. State agencies have been asked to cut experiences and consider not filling empty positions. Larger agencies are being asked to consider staffing in case it may be necessary to lay people off.

In light of the state's fiscal crisis, it is important for IPDC to acknowledge the same in its budget request. However, it is also important to evidence vision and voice the continued unmet needs in public defense. To strike a balance, I suggest advancing the continued need for funding IPDC's juvenile delinquency work. However, we must be prepared that IPDC will not receive an increase at all and may have to ward off efforts to reduce IPDC's current appropriation.
