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Empowering Students through Assistive Technology, Life Skills & Athletics

This school year, ISBVI is proud to expand our commitment to student success through enhanced assistive technology, a focus on the **Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC)**, and a robust **athletics** program.

Thanks to generous support from the **Lions Club** and the **Indiana Blind Children's Foundation**, students in grades 3 and up will receive laptops equipped with **Fusion software**, which includes both **JAWS** (screen reader) and **ZoomText** (magnification) this school year. Along with access to this software, an emphasis is being placed on keyboarding skills and increasing typing speed. These initiatives will help students build essential tech skills for academic success and life beyond ISBVI.

We're also excited to strengthen our Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC) offerings, especially in **independent living skills**. With an accessible kitchen and a dedicated **Family and Consumer Science teacher**, students will gain hands-on experience in cooking and kitchen safety—building confidence and independence. We continue to focus on all areas of the ECC, which include: compensatory skills, sensory efficiency, social skills, recreation and leisure, assistive technology, career education, orientation and mobility, independent living skills, and self-determination. To further extend this support, we will also be offering in-person and virtual webinars on several ECC-related topics, designed to help parents and families actively support the ECC at home. These will be led by our new Parent Engagement/Community Liaison (see p.4).

For students in grades **7-12**, our athletics program offers opportunities to compete in sports such as **track and field, goalball, bowling, wrestling, cheerleading, swimming, and forensics (speech)** through the **North Central Association of Schools for the Blind (NCASB)**. Our athletic teams compete in regular season meets and each season culminates in a conference championship. All athletes must have a valid **IHSAA sports physical**. For more information, contact Athletic Director Dave Brown at dbrown@isbvik12.org. Participating on our athletic teams is a great way to build discipline and teamwork. It also looks great on a job or college application.

Together, these initiatives reflect our mission to prepare students for a confident, independent future.

This fall, we're offering **virtual family sessions** on the Expanded Core Curriculum (ECC) and Orientation & Mobility (O&M)—two important areas that help children build independence and confidence. Looking ahead to February 2026, we are thrilled to be hosting a Family Resource Fair on campus - a chance for families to meet community partners, explore services, and discover tools that can support your child's growth at home and at school. Virtual series continues: Does your child receive Orientation and Mobility services? Our October session is designed to equip parents and caregivers with practical strategies, hands-on skills, and confidence to support their child's safe, independent navigation at home, school, and in the community. Participants will gain an understanding of basic Orientation & Mobility techniques, the role of O&M in the Expanded Core Curriculum, and ways to integrate these skills into daily routines to promote independence, confidence, and exploration.
