out the needs of each new resident they are caring for and how to best work with their co-workers for the day. This constant changing is hard for both residents and staff. Most of the care being done is very intimate personal care. Residents find it hard to have strangers caring for their intimate needs, and having to explain their needs time after time to new caregivers. When staff is unfamiliar with each other it is often harder for them to have good teamwork.

The goals of consistent assignment are to:

What is consistent assignment?

Consistent assignment (also called primary or permanent assignment) refers to the same caregivers (registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, CNAs) consistently caring for the same residents almost (85% of their shifts) every time they are on duty. The opposite of consistent assignment is the practice of staff rotation. With rotation, staff are often moved from resident to resident, caring for different residents throughout the nursing home. Rotation of staff results in poor continuity of care and lowers staff accountability of resident care. Nursing homes who have adopted consistent assignment rarely rotate their staff.

How can consistent assignment help my friend or loved one who lives at this nursing home?

When nursing home staff are not given a consistent assignment, they find it difficult to build relationships with their co-workers and with residents. Rotating staff means that each time there is a change in assignment, the staff person has to take the time to figure

- Strengthen relationships among those who live and work at this nursing home
- Stabilize staffing through increased job satisfaction
- Improve quality of care by improving stability and familiarity in caregiving

What can family and friends do to help consistent assignment be successful?

Get to know the people who provide care to your friend or loved one. If your friend or family member is unable to communicate with their caregiver due to an illness or condition, talk with the staff about details of the resident's daily routine and what the resident's life was like prior to entering the nursing home. You can help your resident's caregivers in making this nursing home "home."





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
