I was counsel of record for a firetruck manufacturer in a product liability case that was tried before a Marion County jury in the summer of 2009. In addition to attending portions of the trial, my behind-the-scenes responsibilities included: securing and coordinating the attendance of witnesses, including experts; preparing exhibit notebooks for jurors; drafting outlines for witness examinations; and researching issues that arose throughout the trial. I was also involved in the appeal of this case—as referenced in Section 6.A. below—which addressed the trial court's giving of jury instructions and exclusion of evidence.

Through early, careful, and impartial analysis of the facts and applicable law, the vast majority of cases I have litigated have been resolved through dispositive motions or settlement before trial. To the extent my practice involves transactional work, I do not see the inside of a courtroom.

As a Summer Associate, I participated in a federal court jury trial in which our Firm defended a claim of employment discrimination. From Monday's opening arguments to Saturday's closing arguments, I heard testimony of the witnesses and arguments of attorneys to the jury as well as to the Court after the jury was dismissed for the day, drafted responses to trial motions, participated in strategy meetings with the client, and assisted in drafting our closing argument. I have also attended other trials in which our Firm's attorneys are involved, observing examination of witnesses and closing arguments.

to serve as intervenors in the global AIDS crisis, including through a case study of Cummins, Inc.

- D. Identify the five most significant legal matters entrusted to you, whether as a judge or lawyer, and describe why you believe them to be so.

I selected the five legal matters described below because of their significant impact on: Indiana law, Indiana citizens and property, and my personal calling as an Indiana lawyer.

1. Negligent Misrepresentation: An Issue of First Impression for the Indiana Supreme Court

In *U.S. Bank, N.A. v. Integrity Land Title Corp.*, 929 N.E.2d 742 (Ind. 2010), the Court of Appeals upheld the trial court's entry of summary judgment in favor of our client—a title company—on a lender's claims of breach of contract and negligence arising from the title company's failure to discover a prior lien. However, the Supreme Court granted transfer and held that as an issue of first impression, the title company could be found liable for the lender's losses under the tort of negligent misrepresentation. *Integrity Land* has been cited more than 100 times and provides the Court's elaboration upon this exception to the economic loss doctrine under Indiana law.

This matter was also professionally rewarding. As a fourth year lawyer, I presented my first appellate oral argument as part of the Court of Appeals' Appeals on Wheels held at the Conrad Hotel for an appellate bar continuing legal education program. I again argued the case before the Supreme Court, an opportunity I thoroughly enjoyed. While the decision favorable to our client was ultimately reversed, the experience only enhanced my appreciation of the quality of our Indiana judiciary and its role in creating certainty and guidance for Indiana's citizens.

2. Protection of Property Rights: Obtaining Just Compensation for an Indiana Business

Our Firm was approached by a local business owner whose valuable property was being considerably impacted by a road expansion project. The State relied on an existing right-of-way for authority to make improvements on our client's property. At the same time, the insurance company denied our client's claim under the owner's policy. We accepted neither party's position. Instead, we carefully analyzed and articulated governing Indiana law and the policy's applicable language to the involved parties. By understanding and effectively communicating the legal consequences, we successfully secured compensation of six figures for our client for the loss of property use.

### 3. Facilitating Settlement of a Class Action: Recording Over a Thousand Easements

Our Firm was asked to undertake the recording of permanent telecommunications easements against 1,257 impacted Indiana properties following the settlement of a federal class-action lawsuit. I led this project, which spanned the course of 22 months, and coordinated efforts with: a title insurance company to obtain necessary deeds; lead counsel for the purpose of securing accurate legal descriptions; and Recorder's Offices in 22 counties across the State to ensure we were complying with the court's order as well as varying local rules and requirements for recording.

Given the number of properties at issue, we were focused on finding ways to record the easements as inexpensively as possible. Several counties were initially resistant to permitting the recording of the easements in bulk, notwithstanding the court's directive. However, as a result of detailed planning, effective communication, and collaboration, we successfully overcame obstacles and efficiently accomplished all recordings.

### 4. Maintaining the Landscape of Indianapolis: Securing Key Financing for a Hotel Purchase

Our Firm was retained to serve as local counsel on behalf of a borrower securing a loan in excess of \$40 million for the acquisition of a large downtown hotel. I initially reviewed relevant title work as well as mortgage loan documents to ensure compliance with Indiana law and protection of our client's interests. Given the magnitude of the transaction, we were asked to provide our legal opinion and verify the enforceability of the loan documents under Indiana law. I was tasked as the principal drafter of this critical opinion letter on behalf of the Firm, and subsequently, the substantial loan timely closed.

### 5. Helping in a Time of Need: Affirmation of My Professional Calling

This matter began as an offer for a cup of coffee and ended as a life-changing experience in my legal career. When our family's former pastor returned with the coffee, he described to me how Harold—one of the church's long-standing elders—had been brutally attacked and robbed. In the aftermath of the attack and required medical treatment, Harold had learned he did not have appropriate Medicare coverage in place. In addition, Harold did not possess the necessary paperwork to enroll for the coverage he needed and had been unsuccessful in his attempts to obtain it. Our pastor asked if I would be willing to talk to Harold and assist him if possible, and I agreed to help on a pro bono basis.

Over the following weeks and months, I made numerous telephone calls to track down the paperwork to remedy Harold's situation. With patience and the helpfulness of others, I succeeded and Harold was able to secure insurance coverage. During that time, I also communicated with counsel for the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department and staff of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute. These communications resulted in review and reversal of an initial denial of Harold's application to recover from the Indiana Violent Crime Victim Compensation Fund.

In early December 2015, I was contacted by Harold's daughter who informed me that Harold had recently been diagnosed with a terminal illness. Harold was in urgent need of legal assistance to ensure his children could make necessary decisions, and Harold had asked his daughter to reach out to me for help once more. With the assistance of others at the

Firm, I prepared the documents needed. The following day after work, I traveled to the hospital along with my legal assistant and another legal assistant who agreed to act as notary. Through shared tears, we reviewed and Harold executed documents, stating that God was very much in control. When we left that night, it was with satisfaction that we had provided Harold and his family with some peace of mind during this difficult time.

My daughter and I visited Harold several weeks ago and, as expected, his face lit up when I shared with him my aspiration to serve our State as a Supreme Court Justice. Harold holds a special place and he will forever remind me of my very powerful calling as a lawyer. I am privileged to be part of a profession through which I can positively impact the lives of others.

### Involvement in Mentorship

I am fortunate to have been surrounded by several exceptional mentors over the last ten years. Because I believe in paying it forward—and because it is my nature—I serve as a mentor for younger attorneys at our Firm. I have consistently mentored through the Firm’s formal program. I am equally committed to acting as a mentor on an informal basis. My door is always open as substantive and procedural legal questions arise. My colleagues also know that I am quick to lend an ear and offer assistance with professional, or personal, opportunities and situations.

As a young partner in the Firm, I strive to lead by example and work to bridge the gap between the senior and more junior attorneys. Two years ago, in coordination with a senior partner and at the request of associates, I helped establish the Partner Speaker Series. Through the Series, each partner has an opportunity to share with our associates his or her personal story and advice regarding the practice of law. When I spoke to the group this past Fall, my theme was the importance of relationships with: attorneys at the Firm; our clients; opposing counsel, including civility; internal and external resources; and other members of the Indiana Bar.

Last year, I responded to Justice David’s request for 60 mentors in 60 days to serve in the Indiana State Bar Association’s Mentor Match program; I remain ready to fill a mentorship role as the need arises. During an October meeting of the IndyBar Professionalism Committee, my name was mentioned as a possible mentor to participate in the IndyBar Mentor Connect program. After being approached about the opportunity, I readily agreed. Although this year’s program has just started, the experience has already been rewarding.

Over the years, I have also met informally with several law students to discuss educational and professional opportunities. Shortly after graduating, I returned to Indiana University Maurer School of Law to assist with judging the moot court competition. In Spring 2014, at the request of the Career Services Department, I participated in a three-person panel to

discuss work-life integration. The session was offered as part of the Practitioner-in-Residence program included in the first year professionalism curriculum. The discussion was full of many amusing, as well as serious and enlightening, points of reflection. I will be returning again next month to share with the law students about deliberative leadership, as discussed in Section 7.E below.

However, my most meaningful investments of time have been those spent in the classroom reading to students. Last year, I chose to read "Oh, The Places You'll Go!" by Dr. Seuss, which led to an impromptu class discussion of my educational path and occupation as a lawyer.

My husband and I both felt it was important not only to give back ourselves but to ensure our children could as well. In addition to providing food for the event, we coordinated schedules so that our two oldest children could participate in the preparation by helping to cut and plate hundreds of pieces of pie and other desserts.

In 2013, I participated in a fundraising event and also donated clothing to Dress for Success Indianapolis, an organization that seeks to help women thrive through providing support, professional attire, and development tools.

### Preparing Meals for Families in Need

In September 2014, my daughter and I volunteered with the IndyBar's Women and the Law Division, preparing meals for families of The Julian Center and Eskenazi's EMBRACE program.
