opportunity for all libraries and cultural heritage to get involved and connect with other institutions, professionals, and volunteers that are devoted to preserving historical collections for generations to come.

The Association for Library Collections & Technical Services (ALCTS) has great event-planning toolkits and preservation resources available online and also offers these easy tips to get involved:

- Create a display about preserving and collecting personal, family, or community heritage;
- Offer a preservation workshop or event;
- Highlight Preservation Week on your website with a link to ALA's Preservation Week resources;
- Get updates on Preservation Week events on Facebook and Tweet about Preservation Week using the #preswk hash tag.

Tip 1: Watch the 3-minute overview video about the newly enhanced TeachingBooks.net.

Tip 2: Give all teachers instructional materials about the books and authors they are reading. Ask a colleague what book they're reading, and quickly give them lesson plans, book trailers, author interviews, and more. Simply do a search from the top of any screen on TeachingBooks.net, then click on "Email" or "Share" from the gold bar at the bottom of your browser window to send a link to relevant resources.

Tip 3: Host your favorite, award-winning author in your library or school anytime with projectable movies filmed in the author's home. For example, lay out Kevin Henkes' books, show his Meetthe-Author Movie—and learn about his art and creative process.
