Winners, Finalists Announced for 2013 Indiana Authors Award

The Eugene & Marilyn Glick Indiana Authors Award recently announced the winners and finalists for the 2013 Award. The National Author Award will go to Michael Martone, along with a The Eugene & Marilyn Glick Indiana Authors Award

\$10,000 cash prize. Indiana University Professor and renowned historian Dr. James H. Madison was named as the Regional Author Award winner and will receive a \$7,500 prize. Tricia Fields, Mike Mullin and Kelsey Timmerman were selected as finalists in the Emerging Author category. The Emerging Author winner will be named at the Award Dinner and will receive a \$5,000 prize.

Each winner will select a public library in Indiana to receive a \$2,500 grant as part of their prize. An eight-member, statewide Award Panel determined the winners and finalists from more than 130 nominations received for this year's award. The winners and finalists will take part in the Indy Author Fair held on Saturday, October 26, 2013. That evening, they will be honored at the ticketed Award Dinner. Both events are held at the downtown Central Library in Indianapolis.

Pew Internet Report Studies Library Habits of Young Americans

Pew Internet

A recent Pew Internet study (*Younger Americans' Library Habits and Expectations*) shows that young Americans from the ages of 16-29 have an interesting mix of habits when it comes to libraries and library resources.

Although the youth of America is greatly technologically oriented and rely heavily on the internet, 75% of young Americans say they have read at least one print book in the past year.

This statistic implies that young Americans are still tied to libraries, print books, and the library experience. According to the study, American youth feels that it is "very important" to have librarians and traditional library services such as renting books. Very few feel that these services should be automated. Although these figures reflect the importance of print books and traditional library services to American youth, the study also revealed that this demographic is much more likely than people over 30 to access a library's online and database resources.

This study gives an insightful viewpoint of youth in an age where technology is quickly evolving and challenging libraries to stay current for the digital generation. According to Pew Internet, "This report explores the changing world of library services by exploring the activities at libraries that are already in transition and the kinds of services citizens would like to see if they could redesign libraries themselves."
