Resources Available to Support TASC/GED Transition



As most of us know by now,
Indiana recently debuted its new
high school equivalency test, Test
Assessing Secondary Completion
(TASC), for Indiana's 15,000 annual
test takers seeking a high school
equivalency credential. TASC is

aligned to the College and Career Readiness Standards over the next few years and will gradually increase in rigor to better meet industry demand. Hoosier test takers will also pay considerably less for the TASC than the GED® exam.

In order to maintain accessibility, the new exam is offered in both paper and computer-based formats, ensuring Indiana's current network of providers, including correctional facilities, will not be disrupted. It is also available in English and Spanish, as well as braille and audio versions for Hoosiers with visual impairments. Click here for a directory of official public test centers in Indiana.

There are hundreds of items about GED preparation in Indiana libraries so it may be time to update your catalog and perhaps weed related titles. Indiana libraries can begin building a TASC resource collection by ordering TASC study guides. The State Library is also currently working with the DWD and its INSPIRE database vendors to prepare resources for Indiana libraries, which are often at the forefront of adult education in their communities. The TASC also has several resources for test takers on their website.

Indiana Authors Award 2014 to submit nominations for the sixthannual Eugene and Marilyn Glick Indiana

Authors Award. Any living published

writer who was born in Indiana or has lived in Indiana for at least five years is eligible for nomination. A statewide panel will select a national, regional, and emerging author from nominations sent in by the public. Winning authors will each receive a cash prize ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 and will be able to designate their hometown Indiana public library as the recipient of an additional \$2,500 grant.

On October 25, 2014, the Indianapolis Public Library Foundation will host the annual Indiana Authors Fair and honor the winning authors at an Awards Dinner at the Central Library in downtown Indianapolis.
