The Harrison County Public Library has reported that employee Diana Lasky passed away on Tuesday, Feb. 11 after a months-long battle with acute myeloblastic leukemia. Youth in the community knew and loved Lasky as "the Library Lady" from her work at the Harrison County Public Library and the Corydon Elementary School library.

Lasky joined the Harrison County Public Library staff in August of 2007 as a library assistant in youth services. She assisted in all capacities and started a teen program that she called TAG, an acronym for Teen Activity Group. Under her direction, teens took

The roundtable offers an opportunity for youth service leaders to connect with their peers throughout the state and to discuss topics relevant to their job. The roundtable will be moderated by Indiana State Library's youth services consultant Beth Yates. Attendees' ideas, concerns and

The pictured handwritten copy of Indiana's Law of Descents, by author Robert Dale Owen, drastically changed the apportionment of estates in Indiana, specifically as it applied to widows.

Before 1852 in Indiana, if a man died without children and his parents were also deceased, the rights to his property would go to any other blood relative before his wife. A widow was allowed to remain a tenant on her deceased husband's property, but not to be the majority owner. Despite this lack of ownership, the widow would be compelled to pay her portion of taxes levied on that property and maintain its upkeep. If the marriage resulted in children, they would receive full rights to the property. Owen's new law, passed on May 14, 1852, divides the property between widow and child. The revision excluded anyone other than the husband's parents from inheritance and the widow would receive the majority.

Owen served in the Indiana House of Representatives from 1835 to 1838 and from 1851 to 1853. He also served as a member of the 1851 Indiana Constitutional Convention and as member of the United States House of Representatives from 1843 to 1847.

Applicants must be capable of matching the grant amount dollar-for-dollar. A cash match is required and can come from private or public sources, or from cash on hand or fundraising activities.
