Indiana State Library and IndyPL team up for book giveaway



Several times throughout the year, the Indianapolis Public Library (IndyPL) holds a public book sale to dispose of duplicate, discarded or unneeded materials from their collection. On the Monday following the public sale, the library offers the remainder of the collection to nonprofit organizations, including libraries and correctional facilities.

Twice each year, in April and November, on the nonprofit day, the Indiana State Library's (ISL) Library Development Office (LDO) are on hand to bag up and prep the materials for shipping.

This year, on April 17, 2017, ISL staff helped bundle and label 211 bags, containing 25 books each. NOW canvas bags held an

additional 200 books. That equals roughly 5,500 free books that were made available to underfunded libraries around the state and to institutional libraries. Look for the next workshop in November of 2017.

E-Rate internet connectivity filing due on May 11



In the budget recently passed by the general assembly, libraries will see increased funding for the non-E-Rate portion of their internet connectivity bills. Many libraries still struggle to provide adequate bandwidth at peak usage times and the spike in usage during after school hours is especially taxing for libraries that serve communities with one-to-one programs.

The Pew Research Center recently released a report that indicates that even though low-income Americans are experiencing greater levels of connectivity, it is still significantly different from the adoption rates of middle to high income households. As more patrons have adopted the use of more devices, the libraries' Wi-Fi can be easily overloaded. Adequate broadband delivery to the library is just the first step in helping to alleviate this issue, but one that has been recognized by the state as a service that would benefit everyone through increased funding.

With two weeks left to complete your filing for E-Rate this year, libraries have an opportunity to increase the "ask" for connectivity for next year. Filing is due on or before Thursday, May 11, 2017 at midnight. The additional \$500,000 dedicated to support library connectivity is a great tool

IndvPL releases local teen's poem for **National Poetry Month**



In honor of April being National Poetry Month, the Indianapolis Public Library (IndvPL) has released an original poem from local teen, Justis Sanderson.

At IndyPL, through the annual Slammin' Rhymes Challenge presented by the African-American History Committee, youth from Marion County submit poetry in which the top ten poems receive prizes, perform their works at the annual Fall Fest at Central Library and are presented with an award by the keynote speaker. The opportunity allows youth to write based on an inspiring topic. Last year's theme was "Dare to Dream."

As a first-year participant, 15-yearold teen Sanderson didn't expect to win. "I heard about the competition, but didn't think much of it," said Sanderson. "I was pretty excited about finding out I won, but it was about more than winning. My poem had a message, and I was glad people cared about what I had to say. I would encourage other teens to be involved in order to learn that they have the power to make a change."

GPO visits Indiana libraries



Last week, staff from the Government Publishing Office (GPO) visited libraries from around the state. Thirty-two libraries in Indiana participate in the Federal Documents Library Program (FDLP), a program that ensures public access to information published by the federal government. The Indiana State Library (ISL) serves as Indiana's regional depository, which means the library collects everything published by GPO. The other thirty-one libraries are considered selective libraries. which means they select certain titles for their collections.

Outreach staff from GPO visited libraries in Indianapolis, Richmond and New Albany to offer training and guidance for maintaining their FDLP collection.

IndyPL launches projects to reach new immigrants



Newly-arrived immigrants and individuals with limited English proficiency can receive assistance on using library resources and improving their English language skills through several new initiatives at the Indianapolis Public Library (IndvPL).

As part of a two-year, \$192,200 grant from The Indianapolis Foundation Library Fund's Innovation Fund, IndvPL is partnering with the Immigrant Welcome Center in Indianapolis to have the Center's Natural Helpers assist individuals with library card applications and connect them with other library resources. Known as the Immigrant Welcome Center Neighborhood Branch, this free assistance is available for Spanish-speaking patrons on Tuesdays from 5 p.m to 8 p.m. and on Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the East Washington Branch, 2822 E. Washington Street in Indianapolis. Assistance for speakers of Urdu, Hindi and Punjabi is provided on Saturdays from 11 a.m. - 2 p.m. at the Pike Branch, 6525 Zionsville Road, where assistance for French speakers is offered on Thursdays

A separate project allows individuals of all languages to improve their English speaking skills in a comfortable, welcoming environment. IndyPL's free "English Conversation Circles" are hosted by trained English as a Second Language tutors and are presented on Mondays at 6 p.m. at the Nora Branch, 8625 Guilford Avenue; Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. at the Haughville Branch, 2121 W. Michigan Street; Tuesdays at 6:30

from 2:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m.

ISL reference librarian and regional depository coordinator Brent Abercrombie accompanied GPO on their tour of libraries. The library visits provided GPO a chance to see how FDLP collections are managed and provided customized training for each individual library.

GPO provides several training sessions to better understand and utilize government information. On April 26 and 27, 2017 GPO will be hosting their 2017 Spring Depository Library Conference. The virtual conference is free to attend. Click on this link to register for the event.
