St. Joseph County Library holds student photography exhibit St. Joseph County Library internationally-honored artist and author from London, England, is the 2023 recipient of the Indiana Early Literacy Firefly Award for her book "A Good Place," published by Candlewick Press.

Cousins is currently traveling and could not be reached for comment, however Candlewick Press said they were "thrilled to hear the news."

"A Good Place" is the story of four insect friends on the hunt for a good place to live. The book shares a gentle message about taking care of the Earth, while describing the specific things that certain insects need to live (e.g., clean water, green leaves, healthy flowers and dead wood).

This is the ninth year of the Indiana Early Literacy Firefly Award. Votes were submitted from 55 Indiana counties and over 2,500 Indiana children ages 0-5 voted. The Indiana Early Literacy Firefly Award is an initiative of the Indiana Center for the Book to promote early childhood literacy in Indiana. The nominees are chosen by the Indiana Early Literacy Firefly Committee from a list of books nominated by library staff who work with children all over Indiana.

The nominated books are chosen for their ability to encourage parents and children to use the Every Child Ready to Read® practices of talking, singing, reading, writing and playing together. Caregivers can use the Firefly books as a quality go-to resource for having fun and learning with their young children.

The committee is currently accepting nominations from Indiana for the 2023-24 award. more details can be viewed on the Firefly Award website.

Online court records

mycase.IN.gov

Members of the public may wonder how and why some Indiana court records are available through MyCase online while others are not. Here is a summary to help understand legal reasons and requirements.

The MyCase website includes basic civil and criminal case information from courts that use the state's Odyssey case management system. The Access to Public Records Act (Indiana Code 5-14-3) and Indiana Supreme Court rules determine the public availability of records maintained by a court or court agency. The Rules on Access to Court Records explain which records are public and which are confidential.

Local courts are responsible for updating the case information in Odyssey, and once a case is updated, the new information is immediately available on the website. See the list of courts that use Odyssey and MyCase here. Click here to learn tips, and more information, about the three types of access: Public access, party access and attorney access.

How far back records go varies by county or court and depends on when the court began using Odyssey. Keep in mind that some courts are still adding old cases to MyCase. Phone numbers for all courts and clerks' offices across the state are available in our court directory.

IPS students join the Indianapolis Public Library's Shared System, gaining access to physical and digital resources



More than 2,780 Indianapolis Public School students will have easier access to physical and digital resources in the classroom as eight new IPS schools will join The Indianapolis Public Library's Shared System in the fall of 2023.

The IPS libraries entering the Shared System are Francis W.
Parker Montessori #51, Center for Inquiry #70, Theodore Potter #74, Carl Wilde #79, Merle Sidener Gifted Academy, George Washington Carver Montessori School #87, Harshman Middle School and Thomas Gregg Neighborhood School. By December 2024, 32 more IPS schools are slated to become members of the Indianapolis Public Library's Shared System.

The Shared System is an interlibrary collaboration between The Indianapolis Public Library, 59 schools and five special libraries, including three museums. The schools function as a branch of the library, allowing students to use the library's catalog to request books, DVDs, and CDs owned by IndyPL or other Shared System members to be delivered by The Indianapolis Public Library to their school libraries. In addition, students at Shared System member libraries have access to their own library's collection as well as over 2 million additional IndyPL books, resources and databases.

Free training for librarians and library employees on LinkedIn Learning

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Newer library staff and directors are encouraged to attend, as well as anyone who would like a refresher. Hensler will also be available to answer questions and troubleshoot specific issues.

The training sessions are eligible for two LEUs for Indiana library staff. "The Indianapolis Public Library and Indianapolis Public Schools are linked by our similar missions and by our long history of providing educational resources to the Indianapolis community," said Gregory Hill, CEO of The Indianapolis Public Library.
