

The survey is not required, but CSLP would appreciate the input. Every library that responds helps CSLP get a more accurate picture of overall satisfaction with the program.

For the purposes of the survey, CSLP uses the phrase "summer library program" in equivalence to summer reading program or summer learning program.

The lecture will investigate the origin of the book, including production techniques, as well as the manuscript's movement from medieval Spain to Indiana.

Presenters include David T. Gura, curator of ancient and medieval manuscripts at the Hesburgh Library at the University of Notre Dame and concurrent associate professor at the university's Medieval Institute; Seth Irwin, conservator at the Indiana State Library; and Marcia Caudell, supervisor of the Reference and Government Services division at the Indiana State Library.

Extreme weather resources



Several states in the U.S. are experiencing drought conditions this summer, so the time is right for a reminder of actions one can take over extreme weather conditions in Indiana. State agencies like the Department of Natural Resources' Division of Water issue useful <u>tips</u> <u>for the public</u>.

The **Drought Information** page provides advice for dry weather conditions and links to other state agencies like the Department of Homeland Security, where one can check for advice on extreme summer weather and dry weather safety. See also the Extreme Heat page, which features a statewide **Burn Ban Map** by county. The state's portal to **Drought Conditions and Impacts** points users to other federal sources such as the National Weather Service and the National Integrated Drought Information System, plus local information from the Indiana State Climate Office.



The Glendale community is invited to sign a steel beam that will be used in the construction of the new Glendale Branch Library of the Indianapolis Public Library. The beam is available to sign at the current <u>Glendale Branch</u> location at 6101 N. Keystone Ave. until Aug. 31.

Judy Gray, branch manager, hopes this opportunity will help the community get excited about the new branch.

"We are preparing to move to have a stand-alone building after being in the Glendale Shopping Center for more than 20 years, and we want our patrons and the community to be a part of this exciting new chapter," Gray said. "Now everyone who calls Glendale their home branch can leave their mark on this new space that will meet the needs of this community for years to come."

The \$15.3 Million project is funded by bonds approved by the Indianapolis City-County Council that will be assessed without any increase in IndyPL's current debt service tax rate. Powers & Sons Construction Co. is managing the construction and krM Architecture+ is the architect for the project.
