### GreatStories Club

The American Library Association Public Programs Office is seeking library workers to serve as peer reviewers for applications for Great Stories Club: "Deeper Than Our Skins" and "Finding Your Voice" series grants.

# The Occupational Outlook Handbook

When one hears the term "career guidance," the Occupational Outlook Handbook should come to mind. Produced by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, it is a formidable resource and a free one. While its reputation as a place to go for job descriptions and growth rates is unparalleled, there is so much more to be discovered, including CareerInfo, the OOH app.

Want to know what field is expected to grow more than in any other in the next decade? Healthcare and Social Assistance. Want to know what field will likely lose the most jobs? Office and Administrative Support. Not sure how many cartographers will be needed in Tulsa, Oklahoma? Consult the handbook, which presents users with information and trends on the market, job salaries by region, education levels, growth rate and onthe-job training. If one is interested in state and local projections, then one might start with **Projections** Central.

For all its practical career guidance, the handbook is also a resource for up-to-date economic reports and analysis. One can read the most recent editions of publications such as the Consumer Price Index and The Monthly Labor Review, online and in their entirety. There is also raw data to be interpreted and crunched. Databases, tables and calculators can be found in the Data Tools section. Here, one might delve into workplace injuries or peruse a map of regional employment or explore trends in the cost of tomatoes.

Grants for Libraries Program, the partners are increasing the flexibility, accessibility and usability of Hyku, a multi-tenant repository platform system.

Repositories are a critical piece of library infrastructure, enabling access to many types of digital materials created by an institution's students, faculty, staff and researchers. Libraries, cultural heritage institutions and other organizations also use repositories to provide access to digitized special collections.

Due to costs or other constraints, those unable to deploy institutional repository services are increasingly looking to consortia to serve this role. This project specifically advances Hyku to support the repository needs of library groups by increasing affordability and flexibility in a scalable, multi-tenant environment.

"This grant has provided the foundation for PALNI and PALCI to apply open source software, new business models and collaboration to remove barriers to widespread adoption of repository software," says Kirsten Leonard, executive director for PALNI.

The partners completed extensive user experience research with UX firm Samhaeng. Pilot participants identified barriers and had a central role in defining, reviewing, prioritizing and approving the features of the Hyku service that are being developed.

The project's next phases include continued UX research and data collection to identify and assign priority to other gaps in functionality, especially those that present a barrier to Hyku adoption. Emphasizing the goal to help other consortia and library groups stand up a Hyku instance,

Not surprisingly, as is the case with many sites maintained by government entities, there is a strong education component to the handbook, which includes everything from games for young children to data and analysis for high school seniors.

For the recent graduate wanting to know what skills are needed for a job, the mid-career individual thinking of changing jobs or a lover of labor and economic stats, the Occupational Outlook Handbook is an informative resource.
