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

University of Wisconsin-Madison iSchool is currently accepting proposals for its Back In Circulation conference to be held on Oct. 7-8 in Madison, Wisconsin. Back In Circulation is a conference for managers and staff in access and circulation services. Circulation managers and staff from public and academic libraries of all sizes attend this conference.

The committee is seeking ideas about best practices in access services and circulation. Topics may include but are not limited to: customer service; staff training; ereserves; stacks management; change management; physical space design; keeping up with technology, diversity, equity and inclusion topics; and innovation.

Conference sessions are one hour in length, including presentation and Q&A. Priority will be given to sessions that include interactive elements and audience participation. Speakers will receive free conference registration. The University of Wisconsin-Madison iSchool encourages presenters representing a variety of personal and professional backgrounds, perspectives and voices. The aim is for conference presenters to be as diverse as the communities they serve. Submissions are welcome from anyone who is interested in presenting, including students, new professionals, first-time presenters and representatives of allied professions.



1939-40 Negro Directory, Indiana



The first publication of its kind in the state of Indiana, <u>the Negro</u> <u>Directory</u>, compiled and published by prominent Indianapolis businessman Ivory L. Johnson, was created to focus on African American owned businesses in both Indianapolis and Terre Haute.

A prime motivation for this type of publication was to highlight local businesses people could use without fear of being refused service due to the color of their skin. As explained in the preface: "Companies employing colored people or part of whose customers are colored are listed also, in order that buyers may know that they may expect friendly service and appreciation."

Note on terminology: Language used in the primary sources shared does not reflect language that would be used today.

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Government Information Day conference schedule

The Government Information Day Planning Committee has released its 2024 conference schedule. The free biennial conference for librarians interested in learning about government resources and improving information literacy will take place on Friday, May 17 at the Indiana State Library in downtown Indianapolis. The conference will be a one-day event, with attendees now able to attend in-person or virtually.

This year's keynote speaker will be Scott Matheson, Superintendent of Documents with the Government Publishing Office. In addition to the keynote address, three concurrent sessions will be offered. Individual sessions include "Legal Resources, "ILOHI in Review," "Consumer Protections," "Escape Room!," "GPO's Collaborations" and more. Sessions are subject to change. Two registrations, one for in-person attendance and one for virtual attendance, will open in March. Please note that only sessions that are scheduled to take place in the History Reference Room will be available virtually.

The American Library Association is inviting school librarians to apply for the Sara Jaffarian School Library Program Award. The \$5,000 award recognizes outstanding humanities programming in kindergarten through twelfth grade. Previously awarded to school libraries serving grades K-8, this year's Jaffarian Award is the first to include eligibility for school libraries also

recognize humanities programs that expand student horizons beyond "basic education." A humanities program can be focused on many subject areas, including but not limited to social studies, poetry, drama, art, music, language arts, foreign languages and culture. Programs should focus on broadening perspectives and wider world and their place in it. The humanities program should be initiated and coordinated by the school librarian and exemplify the role of library programming in advancing the overall education goals of the school.
