Applications now being accepted for the Sara Jaffarian School Library Program Award



The American Library Association Public Programs Office is now accepting applications for the Sara Jaffarian School Library Program Award for Exemplary Humanities Programming. The \$5,000 annual award is sponsored by the American Library Association's Cultural Communities Fund in cooperation with the American Association of School Librarians.

The intent of the award is to recognize humanities programs that expand student horizons beyond "basic education." A humanities program can be focused in many subject areas, including but not limited to social studies, poetry, drama, art, music, language arts, foreign language and culture. Programs should focus on broadening perspectives and helping students understand the wider world and their place in it. The humanities program should be initiated and coordinated by the school librarian and exemplify the role of library programming in advancing the overall education goals for the school.

U.S. school libraries, public or private, that serve children in any combination of grades K-8 are eligible, provided the library is staffed by a state-certified librarian. Libraries are encouraged to selfnominate. Nominated programs must have taken place during the current 2022-23 school year.

Athletics and basketball at Crispus Attucks



High school basketball is synonymous with Hoosiers and Black athletes are icons of championship teams. The all-Black high school basketball team from Crispus Attucks in Indianapolis in the 1950s embodied both of these things. The team was 1950-51 state finalists, 1951-52 city champions, 1955 state champions, 1956 state champions and again the 1959 state champions.

Celebrated coach, Ray Crowe, penned this booklet in 1952 as a response to what must have been an overwhelming number of letters of interest he was receiving about the team and their success in those years under his leadership. With race relations at the front of his mind, he writes about his coaching philosophy, "It was not my job to build basketball teams with boys, it was my job to build boys with basketball teams. It suddenly became very important to me to make sure that while I was preparing them to win, I must also prepare the boys for winning."

The booklet goes on to express the pride the school had in all their athletic programs and the value those programs brought the school. Athletics at Attucks was a hugely visible and positive representation

Text and Learn for Kindergarten program information



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"The Bible and Music" is the first open textbook published by the Private Academic Library Network of Indiana with a grant from the <u>PALSave: PALNI Affordable</u> <u>Learning</u> program. In the book, author James McGrath the Clarence L. Goodwin Chair in New Testament Language and Literature at Butler University explores the intersection of faith and music, while inviting readers to experience the material firsthand through interactive video and audio clips.

Offered digitally, it is the first textbook of its kind to engage readers in actively listening to the subject matter as they follow the readings. It does this as an open educational resource, meaning it costs readers - primarily college students and their instructors nothing.

McGrath was one of the first open textbook authors to apply for and receive a PALSave Textbook Creation Grant from PALNI in 2021. Offered to faculty from PALNI-supported institutions, the grant allows educators to develop open textbooks that are freely available online, making them part of a nationwide effort to reduce the cost of course materials for college students. Financed with support from Lilly Endowment Inc., each grant provides a maximum of \$6,500 per project or \$5,000 per author.

As an inaugural grant recipient, McGrath agreed to have his book serve as the pilot project for the entire Textbook Creation Grant program. Since the release of McGrath's book, there are now eight grant-funded titles in production with seven additional titles to be selected for creation in March 2023.
