The Indiana State Library has announced the formation of a new statewide e-book consortium, the Indiana Digital Library, launching on March 1. Nearly 200 public libraries in the state will all share the OverDrive platform to create a statewide consortium of e-books and magazines. This new consortium - made up of libraries that serve populations under 150,000 - will benefit libraries, taxpayers and library users. Patrons of consortium member libraries will have the ability to borrow materials from both their own library's collections and the member library collections. The <u>Dubois Branch Library</u> of the Jasper-Dubois County Public Library has been awarded a Community Read grant of \$750 from Indiana Humanities to participate in a statewide read of Aimee Nezhukumatathil's "World of Wonders: In Praise of Fireflies, Whale Sharks, and Other Astonishments." Thirty other communities will be reading the book as part of <u>One State / One Story</u>: World of Wonders.

The "Circle for War Relief" essay is part of the Indiana War Records, Colored Section (ISL\_RBM\_S0730) documents from the Indiana State Library's Rare Books and Manuscripts Division. This compilation was written by Indianapolis educator, social activist and officer, Lt. EW Diggs, and is part of the World War I and the Hoosier Experience digital collection.

Diggs begins with an essay about the Senate Avenue YMCA, which at the time was the hub of African American society in Indianapolis. Next is a history of the DuValle Red Cross Unit of Indianapolis and a page describing War Work information. There are also lists of African American Army training attendees, and a list of military servicemen sent to Fisk University for training. Diggs then includes lists of African American military servicemen sent to Camp Zachary Taylor, Camp Dodge and Camp Custer, as well as of those who enlisted outside Indianapolis.

The "Circle for War Relief" essay recounts the 1917 organization of women's Circle groups that sold Liberty Bonds, sewed comfort bags and other duties for the Indiana

Nezhukumatathil's collection of short essays explores the wonders of nature which defy easy depiction.

"We are excited to have selected 'World of Wonders' for our third One State / One Story," said Keira Amstutz, president and CEO of Indiana Humanities. "We think Nezhukumatathil's beautiful and thought-provoking essays will spark conversations among Hoosiers about our natural world and our place in it."

The dates for the book discussions are Monday, March 28 at 6:30 p.m. and Thursday, March 31 at 11 a.m. Stop by the library to sign up for one of these sessions and to pick up a copy of the book. Anyone in the county may take part. Other events that go along with this grant include "Falling Blossoms: Exploring Environment though Haiku" on Monday, March 14 at 6:30 p.m. and "Native American Plant Traditions: Plants for Food, Medicine and Technology" on Friday, April 22 at 6:30 p.m.

One State / One Story: World of Wonders is an initiative designed by Indiana Humanities, in partnership with the Indiana State Library and Indiana Center for the Book, to encourage Hoosiers to read and engage deeply with a book as part of a statewide conversation tied to Indiana Humanities' current theme.

The Dubois Branch Library is part of the Jasper-Dubois County Public Library system in Dubois County. It was funded and built through grants and donations and has been serving

and Emma DuValle, the Circle for War Relief in Marion County was very successful in gathering women from local organizations, such as churches, lodges and embroidery leagues to help with war relief.

Further on in the collection is a list of Indianapolis African American individuals and organizations who purchased Liberty Bonds. Because the lowest denomination for Liberty Bonds was \$50, some chose to buy 25 cent thrift stamps to save up to buy a bond. There is a handwritten note before the lists indicating that the list is not comprehensive but is instead an attempt to recognize every possible contributor to the war effort. The formation of the Circle groups and the lists of Liberty Bonds purchasers speak of the true devotion the African American women's community had to their troops and to Indiana's war effort.
