## MCLS wants to engage with Indiana library communities

Collaborative Summer Library Program seeking executive director with roads suitable for horses, then stagecoaches.

This hand-drawn, vellum map of southern Indiana circa 1847 depicts three types of roads and their suitability for four-horse coaches, two-horse vehicles and horseback riders, indicating the sort of transportation utilized by post riders and drivers to deliver the mail. The map is believed to have been the property of Elisha Embree, a Dubois County Circuit Court judge from 1835-1845, who was later elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. Embree served as a member of the Committee on Post Offices and Post Roads during 1847-1849. Over time, as railroads expanded east to west, mail delivery shifted from road to rail, when possible. The map also shows an additional transportation route -Indiana's rivers - which were used to deliver mail as early as the 1830s when steamship service began on the Ohio River.

The American Post Office consistently embraced new transportation technology throughout its history: from steam engines by rail and ship to automobiles to airplanes. Some technologies tested to transport the post proved less successful or costeffective, such as <u>air balloons</u>, pneumatic tubes and <u>even missiles</u>.
