Every five years, each state library administrative agency in the nation is required to conduct an independent evaluation of its implementation of the Library Services and Technology Act Grants to States program. This evaluation must be submitted in order to qualify for ongoing federal funding, as LSTA funds are distributed by the Institute for Museum and Library Services.

Following the evaluation is the requirement for the submission of a new state-level five-year plan for the LSTA program. QualityMetrics is assisting the Indiana State Library with this year's evaluation.

The J.D. Larkin Company was founded in Buffalo, New York in 1875, by J. D. Larkin. His brotherin-law Elbert Hubbard joined the company soon after its founding and helped come up with the advertising, promotional and merchandising schemes that help put the company on the map. "It struck me that we have not done any soliciting of historical items from the community... ever?," Spurgin said. "Then it struck me that people probably don't know, firstly, about the library's archives' existence at all, and secondly, that they can contribute to the historical record with their own artifacts."

The library's Indiana Room is home to a 1,656 sq. ft. climate-controlled archive with over 20,000 historical documents, maps, photographs, books and artifacts. Recording and preserving history is one of the main objectives of the library.

The public is welcome to stop by the Indiana Room anytime during library hours from Jan. 21-23 to share their historical items. The items will be photocopied, photographed or scanned into the library's database and added to the digital collection, along with the story and any other information behind the item. Participants are welcome to bring a flash drive if they would like to have a digital copy of their historical item. The library will return the physical items to the patron.

Customers could also order a combination box of different Larkin products which became very popular. Groups of women were encouraged to form clubs, order these combination boxes and take turns picking a premium.

At the turn of the 20th century, the Larkin Company was second only to Sears & Roebuck in size, its catalog reaching 1.5 million homes. The company had grown so large they needed to build a new administrative building. On the recommendation of Darwin Martin, an employee, Larkin hired Frank Lloyd Wright to design the new building. Completed in 1906 at a cost of \$4 million dollars the building was considered among Wright's finest works.

The Larkin Company struggled after the deaths of the founding owners and the Great Depression. The company was unable to keep up with the changing retail landscape and their mail order business suffered. The Larkin Company closed their doors in 1942.

Boraxine was a powdered soap made by Larkin. In each box of soap, a chrome picture was inserted as a bonus. The company also produced several cards with various images along with a company slogan. Larkin also made Sweet Home Laundry Soap, Crème Oatmeal and Pure White toilet soaps.
