finish. From January through May, the library will offer one class per month, as well as one Open Art Studio per month that will focus on the project. The residency will conclude with an art exhibit in the Anna and Harlan Hubbard Gallery during the month of June. This exhibit will showcase the created children's book. A reception will be planned for the end of June, with more details to come.

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Classes are free and open to all ages and abilities, however children under the age of 8 need to be accompanied by an adult. It is encouraged, but not required, to attend every class. The first class, "Let's Write a Story," takes place on Thursday, Jan. 19, 4-6 p.m. in the Art Room 204 in the Frankfort Community Public Library. The community will come together to write a children's story inspired by Frankfort and Clinton County that will be the source material for the next four months.

Orozco was born and raised in Lafayette. She earned a BFA in drawing and illustration with a minor in art history from Herron School of Art and Design. She worked as an artist in residence in the Frankfort community from 2016-20 at Ability Services, Inc. 

# **Research on race and** ethnicity data in the U.S. census



In honor of the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and his efforts toward racial equality, it is an appropriate time to look at the definition of race as used historically and currently by the U.S. Census Bureau via their About the Topic of Race website. Race and ethnicity data on the U.S. population has been collected since the first census in 1790. For Indiana specifically, those interested can begin their research using the 1820 Census and move forward from there. The digitized volumes are available on the Census Bureau's website.

For 1820, visit Decennial Census Official Publications 1820, then Census for 1820 and finally Schedules, Oaths, List of Manufactures, and Aggregate of Enumerations.

Pages 143 and 144 of this PDF will show Indiana's 1820 census counts. The race and ethnicity information on early censuses like this one is limited. Here in 1820, researchers will see "white," "slave" and "free colored" as descriptions, terms that are now outdated. The term "slave" is now referred to as "a formerly enslaved person" or "a formerly enslaved individual." As one progresses through their census research, however, they'll find more

# BCALA seeking focus group volunteers



The University of Michigan, in partnership with the <u>Black Caucus</u> of the American Library

<u>Association</u> and the Public Library Association, has been awarded an Institute of Museum and Library Services research grant to continue exploring Black History Month programming offered at public libraries.

While virtually every public library across the U.S. conducts some program during Black History Month, there has never been a systematic study to assess the content, scope, target age groups and focus of that programming. This grant will allow the group to explore programming with a representative national sample of public libraries via focus groups. detailed descriptions of race and ethnicity.
