On Feb. 15 at 1 p.m., the State Library will present "Getting Started with the Overdrive Marketplace." This hourlong webinar is an introductory session on the OverDrive Marketplace and is geared toward those who will be managing their library's OverDrive account. Emma Dwyer, product trainer at Overdrive, will explain the difference between a consortium and advantage account and provide an overview of shopping, purchasing and reports in Marketplace. The live training session will help account managers differentiate publisher lending models; browse and search for content; create and purchase carts; review billing options; run common reports; and access additional help and training resources.

The webinar is eligible for one TLEU for Indiana library staff. Click <u>here</u> to register. Registered participants will receive a link to a recording of the session in addition to follow-up materials.

The deadline to join the statewide public library Overdrive consortium is Jan. 31. The new consortium will begin on March 1. The form used to join the consortium can be downloaded <u>here</u>. 

IndyPL welcomes diversity, equity and inclusion officer Keesha Hughes



The Indianapolis Public Library has announced Keesha Hughes as its new diversity, equity and inclusion officer. Hughes most recently worked as the communications director and Anti-Racism Committee leader at Perry Township Schools.

"We live in a city with people representing various races, ethnicities, gender identities and expressions and socioeconomic backgrounds," Hughes said. "To best serve diverse employees and patrons, we need to make every effort to help everyone feel welcome and included. It is a privilege to lead this effort in such a pivotal organization in Indianapolis."

"The library has an important role in the community and being a leader in diversity, equity and inclusion is critical to our organization and the community as a whole," said John Helling, IndyPL interim chief executive officer. "In this role, Keesha's contributions will resonate throughout the city."

Hughes, a Certified Diversity Professional, began her career in broadcast journalism. As IndyPL's diversity, equity and inclusion officer, Hughes will help the library assess, design, develop, implement, research and evaluate diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives appropriate to organizational The Indianapolis Benevolent Society established the Charity Organization Society in 1879 and kept offices in Plymouth Church on Monument Circle. With the Indianapolis Benevolent Society providing the aid, the Charity Organization Society screened clients.

With the height of their work being between 1891 to 1911, the Society focused on relief to the poor, reducing the causes of long-term dependency on charity, substituting work for relief, helping their clients avoid the abuses and fraud of charity and encouraging thrift. During that time, they formed sub-groups to focus on specific areas of need, such as: children, widows, mothers, health, the organization of community gardens on vacant lots, crime reduction and money management and savings. In 1922, The Charity Organization Society, Indianapolis Benevolent Society, Children's Aid Association and Mother's Aid Society merged into the Family Welfare Society and refocused on family problems.

Patrons can now find materials about the Charity Organization Society of Indianapolis in the Indiana State Library's digital collections. The collection includes their 1880 constitution, their 1902 articles of association and their annual reports, as well as a 1905 pamphlet called "What is the Charity Organization Society and what is it doing?" which details their work in the community.

values, goals and strategic priorities of the library. 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hardcover children's books to rural public libraries across the United States.

The grant allowed NMPL to add 75 new books, worth \$1,257.78, to the Children's Department collection.

One of the stipulations of the grant was that the home community contribute towards the grant. When local business owner Tammy Seifert passed in 2020, her family and friends created a memorial fund in her name for the benefit of the library.

"\$200 from her fund covered the community contribution and made us eligible for the award," shares Sarah Morbitzer, children's department head. "On their end, Pilcrow generously promised to provide us with an additional \$400 of books. With Pilcrow, we were able to select the exact books we needed for the department, completing several series and ordering new releases from popular authors. Imagine my surprise when I opened the shipment and found 38 extra books!"

The books are available for checkout from the library. They can be found on a special display, set up across from the children's circulation desk. Each book has a bookplate acknowledging Seifert's memory and the generosity of her friends and family and the Pilcrow Foundation.
