Portage Public Library set to break ground on new garden tomorrow



The Portage Public Library, part of the Porter County Public Library System, is set to break ground on a new library garden. Portage mayor Sue Lynch is encouraging the public to attend the groundbreaking for the new Portage library garden tomorrow, July 20, at 1 p.m. Central Time.

Being built in collaboration with the City of Portage and the Porter County Government, this new space will provide an outdoor gathering area that is open for the entire community. The library hopes the garden will open to the public in 2024.

During the pandemic in early 2020, a spark was ignited by a conversation between Porter County Public Library System director Jesse Butz and Mayor Lynch. The two wanted to come together to create an outdoor space near the Portage branch of the Porter County Public Library System so patrons would be able to access free Wi-Fi provided by the library while also remaining safe.

The two continued to collaborate on the project, further expanding it, until it evolved into what it is now an engaging outdoor space where children and adults alike can gather to learn and grow as a community.

"We are so thrilled to be working with Mayor Sue and the City of Portage to bring this garden to life, knowing it'll create another enriching, enjoyable outdoor space for our community to share," Butz said.

Primarily community-driven, the garden is being made possible by financial support from the City of Portage's Redevelopment Commission, City Council, the Porter County Council and Commissioners and the Porter County Auditor, as well as public sponsorship opportunities.

The Frankfort Community Public Library invites the public to attend its Hoosier Storytellers program, scheduled for Saturday, July 29 at 2 p.m. in the Skanta Theatre. As part of celebrating Frankfort's Hot Dog Hall of Fame 2023 induction, the library is excited present a panel consisting of honored guests to be interviewed by the library's Mike Clossin. The Frankfort Hot Dogs Alumni Hall of Fame recognizes graduates of Frankfort High School who have achieved extraordinary lifetime accomplishments.

Hot Dog Hall of Fame Board president Don Rusk will discuss how the community can nominate deserving members of the Hot Dog family. Kevin Schindler, a historian from Lowell Observatory, will speak on behalf of posthumous honorees and astronomers, Vesto Melvin (V.M.) Slipher and Earl Carl (E.C.) Slipher. Honoree Nicole Rudolph will be in attendance to discuss her career in the fashion industry and content creation.

V.M. Slipher, class of 1897, was director of Lowell Observatory in Arizona from 1926-1952. By measuring red shift of distant stars, V.M. discovered stars moving away from Earth which eventually led to Georges Lemaitre's theory that has become known as "The Big Bang Theory."

E.C. Slipher, class of 1902, an astronomer at Lowell Observatory, became one of the first to standardize photographic plates for photometric measures, a procedure which is now universally used. He published two books, "The Photographic Story of Mars" and "A Oppenheimer's name occurs in an array of government documents. Most notably, as the head of the Los <u>Alamos Laboratory</u> and then in 1954 as a threat to security in a highly publicized trial before the Atomic Energy Commission after which the decision was upheld to restrict his access to classified information. From Einstein to Fermi to Oppenheimer's Princeton colleagues, the scientist was held to be above reproach. The politics of the hydrogen bomb are credited with playing a part in his "guilt."

So controversial was the trial that the <u>unredacted transcripts</u> were not released by the Department of Energy until 2014 and only after a Freedom of Information request. Oppenheimer's earlier appearance before the Committee of Un-American Activities was also behind closed doors.

Oppenheimer's treatment was seen by many as the nadir of McCarthyism and proof of the witchhunt hysteria that defined the early 1950s in the United States. The trial affected Oppenheimer deeply, and even though in 1963 he was awarded the Enrico Fermi Award, it was not until December of 2022 that the Department of Energy Secretary issued a <u>Secretarial Order</u> stating that the "decision rendered on June 29, 1954, in the matter of J. Robert Oppenheimer be vacated."
