the fourth Indiana Public Library to receive the grant since its inception.

"I'm thrilled that our application was successful," says Sarah Morbitzer, Children's Department manager. "The kits will be available to homeschoolers, daycare providers, Head Start, public school classrooms and individual patrons. Robotics, electrical circuitry, green energy, forensics, genetics and physics will come alive with handson experimentation in the home, at the library or in the classroom. We've already received the first installment of funds and ordered our first batch of kits. We'll need some time to get them cataloged and ready for circulation, but we plan to have them ready for checkout by the end of the summer."

"One of the benefits of this grant is that financial barriers will not be an issue for STEM learning and experimentation," says Diane Randall, director. "Thanks to IEEE - Region 4, we can offer free access to the community through library checkouts. Library led programs will open doors to learning for those who are initially hesitant to test the kits on their own or who simply enjoy learning in a group setting."

The grant will be used to purchase nearly 30 different science kits for grades ranging from kindergarten through high school. Several of the kits purchased will be classroom packs for group instruction.

"We are proud of our tight knit community, but also intensely aware of the fact that many of our patrons lack easy access to science museums, zoos, etc. These extras provide many advantages to residents of big cities," says Jeanna Hann, Adult Department manager and marketing coordinator. "As a community center, we seek to close those gaps by providing as many

PALNI awards innovation grants to Butler, UIndy and Wabash College

Fred and Iva Roach Benton



Fred Coleman Benton was born in Gibson County in 1875 and lived there his entire life. He opened his first photography studio in 1891 in Oakland City while he was still a teenager. Benton later took over a studio in Princeton and ran it from 1899-1900. He was involved with the Photographers Club of Indiana, Illinois and Kentucky, serving as a treasurer-secretary. He also served as a secretary in the Indiana Association of Photographers in 1912. Benton established the Oakland City News with Josiah DeLong. The paper was published for 11 months before suspending publication due to lack of subscribers. He was also considered to be a talented cornet and trumpet player, performing in and leading a few local bands while also performing at his Methodist church.

Iva Roach was born in Boone County and lived in Hamilton County, where she first started

Library Fund competitive grant cycle opens Aug. 1

These grants will fund the libraries' proposed initiatives in areas that meet students' evolving needs, including artificial intelligence literacy and digital literacy.

Proposals are evaluated and selected for funding based on their creativity, clearly defined and measurable objectives, replicability by other PALNI institutions and long-term sustainability. The projects are supported for up to one year, with recipients expected to present their results and share ideas for further collaboration and innovation across PALNI forums at the end of the granting period.

This year's funded proposals include: Butler University's Irwin Library's "PALNI Open Repository for AI Class Activities;" the University of Indianapolis' Krannert Memorial Library in Partnership with the Faculty Academy for Excellence and Innovation and Faculty Learning Community's "Micro-Lectures: A Key to Student and Faculty Success;" and Wabash College's Lilly Library's "Beyond the Research Paper: Supporting Digital Media Creation at Wabash College."

ALA's Thinking Money for Kids Program Kit grant available



Thinking Money for Kids, an initiative of the American Library Association and the FINRA Investor Education Foundation, strives to teach children and their parents, caregivers and educators about financial topics - like saving, spending, sharing and budgeting -

teaching before moving into painting and photography. She owned studios in a variety of places in Indiana including Indianapolis, South Bend, Huntington, Warsaw and Bloomington. An article from the Bloomington Evening World on Nov. 15, 1915, mentions that she previously had studios in Cincinnati; Memphis, Tennessee; and Chattanooga, Tennessee. They also reported that she was a past president of a ladies' organization of photographers in Indiana and was a student at the John Herron Institute in Indianapolis. Her first marriage to James Collopy ended in divorce in 1915.

In June of 1922, Iva Roach married Fred C. Benton and joined him as a partner running a newly built studio in Oakland City.

ALA and the FINRA Foundation invite public libraries to apply to receive a Thinking Money for Kids Program Kit, a collection of expertly vetted resources to help libraries offer financial education for children ages three to 12, both in the library and in children's homes.

Approximately 200 public libraries will be selected to receive a Thinking Money for Kids Program Kit, with an estimated value of \$2,000. Libraries will keep all kit contents after the grant period ends.

ALA will accept online applications for this opportunity until Sept. 8. The programming period will run from September 2024 through December 2025.
