

The Fourth of July of 1862 was an exciting Independence Day for Elizabeth Hobbs Keckley, author of "Behind the Scenes: Thirty Years a Slave and Four Years in the White House." Rather, she imagined it would be. It was the summer before President Lincoln would issue Proclamation 95, stating people who were enslaved in states that had

Encyclopedia of Indianapolis displays Murals for Racial Justice on new exhibit module



The Encyclopedia of Indianapolis, a free-access, web-based encyclopedia that tells the stories of the people, organizations, places and events that define Indianapolis, is sharing <u>Murals for</u> <u>Racial Justice</u> on the Encyclopedia's newly-launched exhibit module.

The Murals for Racial Justice project was a response to protests that erupted in downtown Indianapolis and worldwide after the death of George Floyd in seceded from the United States were now free, enabling more Black troops to fight for the Union. That April, Lincoln had signed the <u>D.C.</u> <u>Compensated Emancipation Act</u>, which abolished slavery in Washington, D.C., as a predecessor to the Emancipation Proclamation. In Keckley's book, she describes the experience of freedmen in Washington D.C. in the summer of 1862, with words that sound like a foreshadowing of The Great Migration:

"They came with a great hope in their hearts, and with all their worldly goods on their backs... they came to the Capital looking for liberty, and many of them not knowing it when they found it. Many good friends reached forth kind hands, but the North is not warm and impulsive. For one kind word spoken, two harsh ones were uttered.

"The bright dreams were too rudely dispelled; you were not prepared for the new life that opened before you, the great masses of the North learned to look upon your helplessness with indifference – learned to speak of you as an idle, dependent race. Reason should have prompted kinder thoughts."

It was her experience that summer that led her to found the <u>Contraband</u> <u>Relief Association</u>, an organization both the President and Mrs. Lincoln contributed to, and eventually Frederick Douglass and Boston philanthropists. She was re-elected president of the association the next year.

Black troops were also assisted by a national organization, the National Freedman's Relief Association, which held its first annual meeting one year later on <u>April 10, 1863</u>.

On Tuesday, Aug. 29, the Indiana State Library will present "Dyslexia and the Public Library" from 1:30-2:30 p.m.

The webinar will include a quick overview of the science of reading and dyslexia. Attendees will learn how to apply best practices to create a welcoming place for all brains, including people with dyslexia. The webinar will also explore ways that public libraries can serve as a dyslexia resource center for children and parents and help promote awareness in local communities.

The webinar will be presented by Shaiya Badgley, literacy specialist, and Josiah Colombo-Espinosa, senior dyslexia specialist, both from the Indiana Department of Education Literacy Center.
