Is your library making news? these educators to develop open textbooks that are freely available online, making them part of a statewide effort to reduce the cost of course materials for college students. Financed with <u>support from Lilly</u> <u>Endowment Inc.</u>, authors will receive up to \$6,500 per project.

The grants - awarded as part of the <u>PALSave: PALNI Affordable</u> <u>Learning</u> program - are given in overlapping two-year cohorts.

"I am honored to receive this opportunity from PALNI. It is a gift to receive support for writing a textbook that will synthesize the presentations, resources, lectures and assignments I have crafted throughout my teaching career. I am most encouraged by the opportunity this will provide for students across the globe with little to no access to academic resources. Providing a digital textbook free of charge is something I could not do without the support of the PALSave Textbook Creation Grant" said Karen Jones of Huntington University.

"I believe that OER textbooks are the future. And it is a good future - as much as possible, people should not have to pay to learn. My goal is to produce a fully interactive text that uses lots of examples and links to a wide variety of online sources. The end result should deeply engage anyone who is interested in understanding the foundations of law, and ways of morally evaluating specific laws," added Peter Murphy of the University of Indianapolis.

"PALNI is excited to award these grants, as they recognize the unwavering commitment of faculty authors from our supported institutions toward enhancing the affordability and accessibility of education for students," said Amanda Hurford, PALNI's scholarly communications director and PALSave project lead. Springfest



Springfest was the annual event hosted by the Ball State Gay Alliance, originally the Gay Activists Union, formed in 1975. Springfest was an informal cookout and gathering with a guest speaker. The <u>photographs in</u> the Indiana State library's digital collection are from the 1985 Springfest, featuring guest speaker, Craig Covey. That same year, he went on to work for the Michigan Organization for Human Rights, eventually becoming the mayor of Ferndale, Michigan and the first openly gay person to run for that office in the state. In 1986, Springfest became "Gay Awareness Days" and the Speaker Panel Program initiated by the group still exists today.

The Ball State Gay Activists Union was responsible for promoting a hotline, awareness events, newsletters, a library and conferences that were implemented <u>Email</u> news links for inclusion in the Wednesday Word's "In the news" section.

IndyPL receives traveling lunar exhibit



The Indianapolis Special Collections Room at the Central Branch of the Indianapolis Public Library has been selected to host the traveling exhibition "<u>Moon Views: Rabbits in</u> <u>the Rocks</u>," courtesy of the Center For Lunar Science and Exploration and the <u>Lunar Planetary Institute</u>, out of Houston.

"Different cultures have seen different figures when they looked at the Moon. Learn how lunar scientists use modern tools to look beyond the 'rabbit' in the Moon to discover its history," said the Lunar Planetary Institute.

The Indianapolis Special Collections Room, located on the sixth floor of the Central Library, will host the exhibit through July 31.

Additionally, a free program titled "Apollo 13: 1/2 Way To The Last Man On The Moon" will be presented at the Central Library from 6:30-7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 18. The program will feature an illustrated presentation exploring NASA's Apollo 13 Mission with aviation on campus in the 1980s and 1990s. The group disbanded in 1988 due to loss of membership and lack of university support. However, in 1990 renewed interest in a supportive organization led to the creation of the Lesbian and Gay Student Association which became Spectrum in 1998.


Solar eclipse workshop set for August



On Tuesday, Aug. 15, the Indiana State Library will present "Solar Eclipse Activities for Libraries (SEAL) Workshop." This free inperson event will take place at the Indiana State Library from 9:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

This workshop will prepare and empower public library staff to facilitate meaningful solar and space science programs for their patrons that build curiosity, knowledge and inspiration. Attendees will receive hands-on training on operating solar telescopes and other methods for direct and indirect solar viewing; best practices for developing and facilitating STEM programs; and how to engage with community partners and library-specific digital resource networks.

Attendees will also be able to sign up for free solar eclipse glasses to distribute to their communities in advance of both eclipses, the annular eclipse on Saturday, Oct. 14 of this Wednesday Word | June 14, 2023
