Milford Public Library welcomes Stevens Puppets



On Friday, June 16, the Milford Public Library welcomed Stevens
Puppets as a guest storyteller for the library's Family Summer Story
Time, as they presented their "The Wizard of Oz" puppet show. In their 90th year of operation, Stevens
Puppets has been entertaining since 1933.

Created in 1966, their "The Wizard of Oz" puppet show closely follows both the book and movie versions. The marionettes were authentically created in the traditional old world style, specialized for classic children's literature and classic fairy tales. Mack Raynor, son of current owners Dan and Zan Raynor, was the puppeteer for the show.



Indiana State Library telephone books and directories



The Indiana State Library has a large collection of city directories and telephone books from across the state. The difference in the two is that the telephone book is essentially a listing of phone numbers, where a city directory may give broader information about the city and the personal entries can be more robust. Telephone books are free, and city directories are published for profit. They may be used interchangeably. Today, the Indiana State Library highlights the phone book.

proud to announce the launch of a redesigned <u>Hyku for Consortia</u> website and new <u>collaborative</u> repository toolkit.

Developed as part of the **IMLS** grant-funded Hyku for Consortia <u>initiative</u>, these resources provide new assets and best practices to assist consortia and groups of libraries in creating and managing their own digital repositories. The revamped website offers information and demonstrations for those seeking to deploy institutional repository solutions, while the toolkit provides guidance on communication and engagement, documentation and training, staffing and service models, governance and technical support.

"Our goal in launching the new Hyku for Consortia toolkit and redesigned website is to provide consortia and library groups with a replicable model for shared repository services," says Amanda Hurford, PALNI scholarly communications director and Hyku for Consortia project and product manager. "These tools are designed to help groups tackle the challenges that come with establishing and facilitating an effective shared repository. The toolkit offers practical examples from our project that can be applied to any platform, such as staffing and workflow management, collaborative leadership and funding and user sustainability. The website complements the toolkit by providing detailed information on the Hyku for Consortia initiative and further opportunities for participation."

The Institute of Museum and Library Services awarded a grant to PALNI and PALCI in 2021 to enhance the affordability and flexibility of Hyku adoption in a scalable, multi-tenant environment. Hyku for Consortia expands on the Some of the Indiana State Library's older telephone books have been made <u>available online</u>. Telephone books, once ubiquitous and extremely useful, are now rare, and rarely useful for current information. However, consider the historical uses.

- Are you looking for someone between census years?
- Do you have a zoning dispute and need to show there have been businesses in the area for years?
- Are you writing a novel and need to flesh out the setting?
- Do you wish to settle a family dispute about where that dry cleaner was that mom was always complaining about?

How does one use a telephone exchange? Take this advice from a 1958 phone book: "Don't listen to your neighbor's conversations, and don't bang the phone down." If you lived in <u>Portland, Indiana</u> in 1920, you'd know that "no person will be permitted to use a telephone longer than five minutes".

The Indiana State Library also offers a telephone book holdings guide and a city directory holdings guide.

Ancestry and Archive.org have many city directories online as well.

Telephone books and city directories can be wonderful resources that can answer quite a few questions.

existing Hyku software, which was developed by the <u>Samvera</u> community. It continuously integrates feedback from Hyku Commons users, with development support from <u>Software Services</u> by Scientist.com.

These advancements are then shared back with the open-source community.

The Hyku for Consortia toolkit and new website follow a recent major system upgrade, which included enhancements in areas such as reporting analytics and metadata flexibility. The next phases of the Hyku for Consortia project will focus on user experience research and data collection to identify and prioritize additional functionality improvements, particularly those that may hinder Hyku adoption.
