

The Allen County Public Library will welcome authors and podcast hosts Sarah Stewart Holland and Beth Silvers for an author visit on Wednesday, April 26 at 6 p.m. at the main library in Fort Wayne. Stewart Holland and Silvers host the Pantsuit Politics podcast, featured in the New York Times and the Atlantic; picked by "Good Morning America" as one of their Podcasts of the Month; and named by Apple Podcasts as one of the best shows of 2021.

Stewart Holland and Silvers are also the authors of "Now What? How to Move Forward When We're Divided (About Basically Everything)" and "I Think You're Wrong (But I'm Listening): A Guide to Grace-Filled Political Conversation," which was featured on MSNBC's Morning Joe, received starred trade reviews, and continues to be in demand with readers, book clubs and libraries. The hosts speak frequently to universities, businesses and civic organizations about improving political dialogue.

To begin with, researchers can check the <u>PopClocks</u> provided by the Census Bureau for national-level data. These clocks give a quick glance at the world's most populous countries and top trading partners, provided by the <u>International</u>
<u>Database</u> and <u>USATrade Online</u>.

For more detailed international data, see the <u>Data.UN.org Explorer</u>. <u>UNData</u> gives direct access to international datasets organized by topic. The <u>UN Statistics Division</u> is the standard source for global nation-level data. To highlight one

On April 3-8, the Milford Public Library will be offering Spring Activity Packets. The packets courtesy of a generous donation from Leon Newman - contain craft kits and a treat. \$10,000 in prizes available for libraries via 2023 ELC pitch competition



Applications are currently being accepted for the third annual Entrepreneurship and Libraries Conference pitch competition. The competition - funded by the American Library Association's Libraries Build Business initiative and EBSCO - will disseminate \$10,000 of total prize money to the top five libraries that submit an economic development pitch for a project that demonstrates how their library could contribute to local entrepreneurship, job creation and nonprofits.

ELC will be giving away one \$4,000 first-place prize, one \$2,500 second-place prize, one \$1,500 third-place prize and two \$500 prizes for fourth and fifth place.

The target audience for the pitching will be stakeholders in economic development, not librarians.

Therefore, ELC's three judges, who will rank the top five submissions on the pitch day in May, will be economic development officers.

Applicants are required to submit a 400-600 word entry responding to prompts addressing problems, solutions and resources. Click here to read the prompts and to apply.
