

Indiana Libraries and Literacy Symposium's "Civic Literacy" scheduled for April 12



On Friday, April 12, from 9:30 a.m.-3 p.m., the Indiana Libraries and Literacy Symposium will present "Civic Literacy." This free event is for school, public and academic librarians; civic and community organizations and service providers; educators and civic and community engagement enthusiasts; and all who care about civics and civic literacy in Indiana. The symposium offers an opportunity to network with civicminded professionals from across Indiana.

Libraries serve a critical role in citizens' literacy development from birth to adulthood as conveners of communities and providers of democratic spaces for gathering and learning. The 2024 Indiana Libraries and Literacy Symposium will focus on the ways libraries can support their communities' understanding of, and engagement in, their civic duties. Included is a hands-on workshop for enacting local change through civic awareness and action and a replicable curriculum kit for offering the same workshop at one's library or organization.

The event includes a total of three sessions: "Civics Curriculum: Development, Implementation and State Standards Alignment," presented by Elizabeth Osborn, of the Indiana University Center on Representative Government and codirector of iEngage; "My Rolodex Workshop: Developing (and Teaching) Strategic Outreach to Tackle Community Concerns," presented by Mary Evangeliste, Library Science professor at the iSchool at San José State University; and "Panel: The Intersection of Libraries and Civic Literacy: Applications and Insights from the Field and Community." featuring Terri Jett of Butler University, Raenell Smith of Whiteland Community High School, Zoe Mayhook of Purdue University Libraries and Jos Holman of the Tippecanoe County Library.

County histories at the Indiana State Library



In Indiana, huge county histories packed with biographical sketches, early history, lists of names, events, schools and more - were published from the 1870s to the 1910s. Beginning in the 1990s, new updated county histories were published. The Indiana Division of the Indiana State Library is working to fill in the gap between the old county histories and the newer ones.

#### The Indiana Historical Print

<u>Collection</u> not only contains the odds and ends items that don't fit into any of the library's specified categories, but it's also morphed to become the focal point for the county histories. The collection contains travel brochures, chamber of commerce pamphlets and publications that were created for centennials and celebrations of small towns and communities across Indiana's 92 counties.

## What's Up Wednesday yoga webinar announced for April 24



As part of the Indiana State Library's free What's Up Wednesday online series, "We Need More Than Just Yoga and Meditation: Really Supporting the Mental Health Needs of Librarians and Library Workers" vill be presented on Wednesday, April 24, from 10-11 a.m.

In everyday library work, staff focus much of their time and energy on patron services, ways to improve these services and innovative ways to support their patrons and communities. Yet, they regularly neglect one significantly underserved population themselves. Specifically, the mental health needs of librarians and library workers. These needs, alongside support, are rarely addressed in conference presentations or continuing education programs. In the presentation, Abigail Phillips, assistant professor in the School of Information Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, will discuss practical and meaningful approaches to help librarians and library workers manage emotional labor, triggering service experiences and compassion fatigue, thus preventing burnout or furthering of mental health issues. Additionally, the webinar will offer ways in which management and colleagues can compassionately and respectfully support those who are experiencing a mental health crisis.

The webinar is eligible for one LEU for Indiana library staff. Click <u>here</u> to read more and to register. One example is <u>A Tale of Tell City</u>, a 1960 brochure prepared by the Tell City Chamber of Commerce in Tell City. These general information pamphlets, brochures and booklets were published to attract businesses and newcomers to the county.

The State Library has added materials for 54 counties to the collection and plans to keep adding more. Researchers may also see the huge county histories there, but they will be leaving since the are often easier to use on Internet Archives or Google Books. Researchers can still find links to those huge county histories online through our <u>county history holdings</u> <u>guide</u>, as well as our <u>city directories</u> and telephone book guides. Additionally, the State Library has a <u>telephone directory inventory</u>.
