Author Helen Frost will speak at Petersburg Elementary School in Petersburg on April 23 at 1 p.m. The conversation with the Eugene and Marilyn Glick Indiana Authors Award honoree is part of the Indiana Authors Awards Speaker Program is hosted by the Pike County Public Library.

For younger readers, Frost has written 11 novels-in-poems, and seven nonfiction picture books. Her picture book, "Hello, I'm Here," was shortlisted for a 2020 Indiana Authors Award, and her middle grade book, "All He Knew," is the subject of the current award. "All He Knew" also won the Scott O'Dell Award for Historical Fiction. Her work for adults includes two collections of poetry, two anthologies and two plays. In 2010, she received a National Endowment for the Arts Literature Fellowship in Poetry. Her latest book, "The Mighty Pollinators," is due out in March 2024.

During her presentation, Frost will discuss her children's books, including "Blue Daisy," a charming and straightforward story about a stray dog.
