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Certification rule change reminder



New certification rules went into effect in January. The substantive changes that took effect include:

The amount of professional library work done in the normal course of the librarian's daily activities which triggers the need to be certified is now 75%. So, if an individual is doing professional

librarian work 75% of the time or more, they need to be certified. This includes if they are part time and they spend 75% or more of their part-time hours doing professional librarian work.

Individuals who have a first temporary permit, and are applying for a second, may use LEUs earned not only during the effective dates of the first temporary permit, but also up to six months prior to the effective date of the first temporary permit. This captures the LEUs earned during the period when the person is first hired but has to wait the six months to get their first temporary permit. The same is true for individuals earning LEUs under their first five-year certificate. They may count LEUs earned between the time they were hired into that position and the effective date of their first five-year certificate, up to a maximum of a six-month period prior to the effective date of the five-year certificate.

Technical Library Education Units, known as TLEUs, are no longer required for any temporary permit or five-year certificate renewed going forward. This is true even if the effective date of the temporary permit or five-year certificate was prior to Jan. 1, 2023.

The LC 4 and LC 5 certificates no longer require specific library courses. Separate library courses of any titles taken at an accredited college or university will now be eligible for librarians to use to qualify for the LC 4 and LC 5 certificates.

2023 EBSCO Solar grant submissions now open



EBSCO Information Services has announced that submissions are now being accepted for the 2023 EBSCO Solar grant program. This year, EBSCO is providing \$300,000 in grants to libraries looking to fund a solar project to offset electricity costs.

All academic, school and public libraries that are current EBSCO customers are eligible to apply for the EBSCO Solar grant program. EBSCO will provide the winning institutions with a check for the full amount of the grant. A grant agreement form will be agreed upon between the winning library and EBSCO and a timetable for the project will be shared.

A number of criteria will be used to assess the viability of each submission. For instance, a site with a large roof surface and a roof that is new enough to last 20 years would make an excellent candidate. A library that has already started to investigate solar as an option or one that could support a solar array large enough to offset its electricity costs would be viewed favorably. An institution

World Poetry Day was celebrated on March 21. While the day was marked with celebrations across the country, the federal government was not the host. It may surprise the reader to learn that aside from 11 federal holidays, the government has no part in the designation of national days, which are entrepreneurial endeavors.

For example, the Institute of Museum and Library Studies, which is federally funded, helps finance the <u>National Student Poets Program</u> - a program of the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards - but it does not directly sponsor World Poetry Day. Indianapolis Public Library seeks community input for Pike Branch renovation project



Residents of the Northwest side of Indianapolis are invited to offer suggestions for the renovation of the Pike Branch of the Indianapolis Public Library via interactive meeting, offered both in-person and remotely, taking place on May 23 from 7-8 p.m.

In addition to the meeting, a survey allowing patrons to share how they typically use library services and what they would like to see in the renovated library is currently available both <u>online</u> and is private funding that pays the poet's stipend. Six poets have been tapped by presidents to read works at their inaugurations, and five of the poets wrote poems specifically for the event, though Robert Frost recited "The Gift Outright" from memory at John F. Kennedy's inauguration, as the glare from the snow prevented him from reading the poem he had written, "Dedication." The poems of these poets, however, do not become government documents. Also, representatives and senators regularly reference National and World Poetry Day from their respective floors. This is evidenced in the Congressional Record.

Still, perhaps this porous border between poet and state is a good thing. The poet's perspective might not encourage government workers in their daily production of thousands upon thousands of pages of information. Consider Alfred Lord Tennyson's remarks on the matter in his poem "Vastness:"

"Raving politics, never at rest - as this poor earth's pale history runs,--What is all but a trouble of ants in the gleam of a million million of suns?"
