# McCray Refrigerator Company



The McCray Refrigerator Company was incorporated in Kendallville on Dec. 1, 1890, but the start of the company goes back even further. Hiram McCray and his sons ran a dairy and egg business using horse drawn wagons to gather cream, eggs and butter. Wanting to cut down on spoilage Hiram and his son Elmer started experimenting with ways to keep their products cool.

McCray received his first patent in February of 1882 for a refrigeration car. Hiram along with Elmer McCray, Henry and Barclay Moyer and A.T. Ross filed the articles for incorporation for the Kendallville Refrigerator Company in March of 1884 with \$10,000 in capital. Their first factory was on Mitchell Street in Kendallville.

Their products were initially refrigerated train cars and smaller chests for households, but the bulk of their business was for commercial products, like storage rooms for companies to store their meat, dairy and other products. For a time, the McCrays still ran their egg and dairy business alongside their refrigerator business.

McCray opened a new larger factory in 1892 on Mill Street in Kendallville. At their height around WWII, the McCray Refrigerator Company employed 600 men. In March of 1966, the company was sold to Litton Industries. In June of 1973, Litton announced the factory would be closing and in 1974 the factory permanently closed.

# 2024 PALNI Library Innovation Grants application deadline is March 15



The application deadline for the Private Academic Library Network of Indiana's Library Innovation Grants is March 15.

The funding provided by PALNI Library Innovation Grants aims to optimize library resources and services in ways that significantly expand the ability of supported organizations to support teaching and learning at PALNI institutions. Funded programs, projects and initiatives must align with PALNI strategic priorities and support PALNI deep collaboration.

Up to \$20,000 will be awarded per year and there are no matching requirements. Any employee from a PALNI-supported organization library may apply. Collaborations between PALNI libraries or between the library and other areas in the PALNI supported college, university or seminary, are eligible and encouraged.

PALNI restricts use of grant funds solely to the purpose of the grant. Funding must be utilized as proposed in the application unless written adjustment is requested by grantee and approved by the PALNI Executive Committee, Grantee will maintain accounting and financial records and shall furnish copies of bills, invoices, cancelled checks, receipts, etc. to the PALNI contact upon request. Under no circumstances may Grantee expend, borrow, pledge or transfer grant funding for reasons unassociated with the stated purpose, Grantee may reallocate budgeted items up to 10% of individual line item amounts provided that prior written notice is given to the grantor. Any other changes in budget require prior written approval of PALNI. Any portion of the grant remaining unexpended at the completion of the project or at the end of the period shall be repaid to PALNI
