Makerspace programming can address inequities in underserved communities - including youth with disabilities - by providing access to various making technologies, skill acquisition through training and peer and professional mentoring, each critical to today's youth with disabilities who plan to move into the workforce, but also essential for improving each youth's quality of life. The purposes of the study are to learn more about the prevalence of makerspaces or maker programming for youth with disabilities in public libraries; the role of parents, caregivers and youth with disabilities in maker programming decisions; the barriers encountered by both libraries developing the programs and those of youth with disabilities who participate; the accessibility of makerspaces or maker programming - both physical and learning-enabled design - for youth with disabilities; and the best practices being applied to ensure accessibility of makerspaces and maker programming for youth with disabilities.

The survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete. The researchers plan to present the results of the survey at a future ALA or PLA conference and to share their findings widely on social media and on their project website. The Frankfort Community Public Library inducted new members to its Teen Advisory Board on Monday, Feb. 27 in the library's Skanta Theatre.

The students joining the board are all in grades 9-12 and hail from local schools and homeschools. Michaela Jacobs, Teen Advisory Board president and a junior at Clinton Central, led the induction. The students joining the board include Anna Cari-Taylor of Frankfort High School; Hannah Jacobs of Clinton Central; Kaleb Jacobs of Clinton Central; Levi Jacobs of Clinton Central; Maggie Dieterle, homeschooled; Ruby Wells, homeschooled; and Tabby Walters, homeschooled.

Members completed an application process that included employment-style interviews with library staff. The students answered questions about leadership skills, advocacy and their hope to serve the community. Each agreed to fulfill four hours of volunteer service a year, attend regular meetings, plan teen department events and to serve as library leaders.

Past members of the board have volunteered in Harry Coffee Bar, at summer reading events, for the Family Literacy Program and for the Annual Art Show. Some past members have translated their work into employment at the library.

Indianapolis Optimist Bowlers



This photograph of the Indianapolis Optimist Bowlers standing outside a train car while en route to Dayton, Ohio provides a snapshot into what public transportation looked like in Indiana in 1930. The group stands in front of a Terre Haute, Indianapolis and Eastern Traction Company car. The second-largest interurban in Indiana at the time, it would only operate for another year before becoming incorporated into the Indiana Railroad. The electric lines that powered the interurban railways can be seen above the car.

One might find the fact that this image features the Indianapolis Optimist Club interesting because the organization was formed as a service club specifically to combat perceived social problems brought on by industrialization and urbanization, at which interurban railways and railroad expansion in general were central. This club formed in Buffalo, New York in 1911 and Indianapolis became the second chapter, and the first to make it a nationwide institution, in 1916. By 1930, their focus was serving underprivileged youth - particularly boys - and bowling was a popular club activity.
