

The 2014 ILL Workshop Was a Success



On Monday, November 17, nearly sixty people attended the <u>Fall Interlibrary Loan</u> <u>Workshop</u>. Attendees learned about the many services of the <u>Indiana State Library</u> including <u>InfoExpress</u>, how to use the <u>Indiana SHARE</u> (IN-SHARE) interlibrary loan service for smaller libraries, <u>Evergreen Indiana</u>, and the <u>Book Club</u> catalog. Presenters included D. Michael Hicks, Sarah Damery, Tatiana O'Neill, Suzanne Walker, and Anna Goben. Brent Abercrombie offered a tour of the building during one of the breaks.

During the morning, many of the institutional libraries took advantage of a special INfoExpress pickup at the nonprofit day at the <u>Indianapolis Public</u> <u>Library Book Sale</u>. Terry Black, from the ISL and <u>Project Search</u> intern Kory Williams helped the institutions package nearly three hundred parcels, representing over 1,400 books which were then delivered to their libraries. to interact together with exceptional picture books.
